On the morning of September 28 a group of 28 volunteers provided a tour and educational program for over fifty children and adults as Tipton County Master Gardeners led members of the Tipton County Homeschool Social

Group through the Drummonds Park Arboretum in Drummonds, Tennessee. One half the crowd took a guided trek through the forest while the other half circulated among four "Learning Centers" stationed along a paved 1/3 mile walkway. Each center was manned by volunteers knowledgeable about the 3 to 5 labelled trees at that location, who led children in a variety of tree-related activities. After an hour or so the two halves of the group swapped places. Overall the participants had the opportunity to learn about the appearance, growth habits, fruit/seeds, bark, leaves, and benefits of over 36 species of trees, in addition to a variety of other plants, birds, animals and insects. The families appeared to enjoy it almost as much as the volunteers did!
