# To Our WBPOA Community:

Hello, everyone! We hope all in our community remain masked up for safety and that your families are keeping safe and healthy.

Given the continuing COVID-19 issues, the tennis court, Kittybrook and Ludington Parks remain closed, as do both clubhouses. We also continue to strongly encourage everyone to keep away from and avoid using the tennis court, parks and the playground equipment in order to avoid close contact with crowds and avoid touching items which can carry and hold the COVID-19 virus germs.

Should you or anyone with you elect to enter the tennis court, Kittybrook or Ludington Parks or play on any playground equipment against the Board's advice, you do so at your own risk; anyone who may accompany you does so at their own risk as well.

The summer is coming up fast, and with that in mind.....Your WBPOA Board and Sterling Management continue to monitor the guidelines established by the City of Houston, the various health departments and the CDC in relation to the opening of the public facilities, including the pool. The good news is....at this time, it is anticipated that we will be able to open the pool on Memorial Day Weekend this year! Pending any regulatory issues that may arise, the WBPOA will be handing out pool tags the following weekends with the anticipation of opening the pool on Memorial Day Weekend:

- Saturday and Sunday, May 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> from 12pm to 3pm
- Saturday and Sunday, May 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> from 12pm to 3pm

HOWEVER, we must continue to follow city and health guidelines as to timing. We remain in contact the pool company and Sterling Management to ensure all City and Health Department guidelines and rules are in place to allow proper opening of the pool. Homeowners will receive a pool schedule in the mail as soon as we have official word on the opening date.

Similar to last year, when the pool is allowed to be opened, strict City and Health Department rules and regulations will be in place, including limiting the number of people allowed in at any given time. Although a bit inconvenient, the system worked very well last year once the pool was allowed open. As such, we appreciate your continued understanding and adherence to the regulations as they will be strictly enforced in order that we may legally keep the pool open.

In the meantime, please remember you MUST be current on all outstanding WBPOA fees in order to use the pool when it does open, so please use this time to bring your accounts current if necessary. Please do not show up at the pool tag handout times with payment receipt in hand – the volunteers cannot give out tags without Sterling's specific clearance, as it can take a few days for your payment to process.

IN OTHER NEWS: IT IS NOTICED THAT SOME HOMEOWNERS ARE NOT BRINGING THEIR BINS IN FROM THE STREET AFTER GARBAGE OR RECYCLE PICKUP. THIS IS A DEED RESTRICTION VIOLATION AND IS SUBJECT TO FINES. PLEASE BRING YOUR BINS IN FROM THE STREET ASAP ON PICK UP DAY AND STORE THEM OUT OF SIGHT.


## Volunteers Needed to Serve as Block Captains

### Important Recycling Info:

- Recycle Schedule A every other week
- Pickup on Thursdays
- Bins may be put at the curb late Wednesday evenings and must be at curb by 7:00am Thursdays
- Bins MUST be removed from the curb on Thursday evenings
- Bins MUST be stored out of sight.
- Recycling may also be taken to:
  - Westpark Consumer Recycling Center, 5900 Westpark, Houston, TX 77057

### **Important Trash Facts:**

- Regular pick up every Thursday
- Bins may be set out at the curb the evening before
- Bins MUST be removed from curb by Thursday evenings
- Bins MUST always be stored out
- TREE / YARD waste is every "odd"
- JUNK / HEAVY trash pickup is every "even" month
- Junk / heavy trash can be taken to: **Southwest Trash Depository / Recycle Center** 10785 Southwest Freeway Hours: Wed - Sun, 9am to 6pm Accepts junk and tree waste and recyclables

If for any reason a household has too much trash to fit inside the black garbage bin, residents can purchase city stickers to place on the outside of large plastic garbage bags. The stickers can be purchased from Fiesta or Seller's Brothers customer service windows or at hardware stores. stickers MUST be visible street side, or the bags will not be picked up.

Residents with physical limitations can contact 311 and complete a Solid Waste Pickup Request Form (for either regular trash or recycles, or both) to qualify for special pick up services. If qualified, city services will then pick up from the residents' specified locations and return them to the same location when emptied. The location MUST be out of sight from the street, but accessible to the city services (ie, behind unlocked fence gate).







# City Of Houston's Solid Waste Management Department Launches A Pilot Education Campaign To Improve Curbside Residential Recycling

**HOUSTON, TX (April 28, 2021)** - The City of Houston is launching a curbside recycling cart-tagging pilot program modeled on The Recycling Partnership's successful Feet on the Street campaign. The cart tagging initiative is aimed at improving the quality and quantity of recyclable materials collected in the single-stream curbside recycling program. The education project is funded by a grant from The Recycling Partnership and a solid waste reduction grant provided by the Houston-Galveston Area Council from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

The cart-tagging recycling education program will provide residents personalized and real-time feedback on the contents of their recycling cart. It is intended to educate residents on how to recycle right and how to recycle more, thereby increasing the number of quality recyclables collected. Quality recyclables include the list of Houston's accepted items – empty and dry aluminum and tin cans, food and beverage cartons, glass bottles and jars, paper, cardboard, and plastic bottles, tubs and jugs – that can circulate back into the economy to become new products or packaging.

Developed by the national nonprofit The Recycling Partnership, the Feet on the Street cart-tagging program helps communities improve the efficiency of their recycling programs, reduce the number of new resources used in packaging, and improve the health of communities.

"Recycling is not only the right thing to do; it is the smart thing to do," said Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner. "Recycling properly will save our taxpayers money by reducing the cost of dumping at the landfill, and it gives residents the ability to directly participate in driving a local circular recycling economy to combat climate change. We know Houston residents want to recycle the right way, and through this cart-tagging campaign, we are providing them personalized, real-time feedback to do just that."

The City of Houston cart-tagging pilot program will sample 60,000 of the 390,000 homes that receive City-provided solid waste services. The six-month program will include a comprehensive education and outreach strategy that involves a team of observers who will visit each resident's location on collection day and provide tailored feedback on how to improve the contents of their recycling cart. If non-accepted items are found in the recycling cart, observers will leave an "Oops" Tag on the cart. The "Oops Tag" left on the cart will notify the resident of corrections that need to be made to the contents of their recycling cart, specifically identifying non-compliant items that need to be removed. If non-compliant items are found on a subsequent visit, another tag will be left for the resident, and the cart may not be serviced. The tag will be left for trash items with food residue, batteries and electronics, long tangler items such as cords, hoses and chains, yard waste, household items, scrap metal, scrap wood and shredded paper.

The City of Houston reminds residents to keep recyclables loose and unbagged in their recycling cart. Plastic bags are an absolute NO for recycling carts as they impact the recoverability and sale ability of other recyclable items. Residents may visit HoustonRecycles.org for more information on how to properly dispose of plastic bags and other items. "The Recycling Partnership's Feet on the Street program works by giving households instant feedback on what is and is not recyclable," said Chris Coady, Director of Community Programs at The Recycling Partnership. "Through this personalized and real-time recycling education initiative, we are helping communities like Houston capture more quality recyclables which are then transformed into new materials, creating a more circular economy, a less wasteful planet, and stronger, healthier communities." Now, more than ever, Houstonians view recycling as an important daily routine. During a time of social distancing where many non-essential employees are working remotely and commercial recycling is near an all-time low, producers see residential recycling programs as a critical supplier of essential materials manufacturing feedstock and the City of Houston's recycling program helps supply that need. ### **DEED COVENANTS & RESTRICTIONS**

WBPOA is a deed restricted community and its Board is responsible for ensuring the restrictions are followed by all homeowners and / or their tenants. Real estate agents are required to provide copies of deed covenants to all home buyers. Homeowners are legally responsible for any non-compliance of the restrictions by tenants. A summary of restrictions is attached to the newsletter. For a full list of restrictions, please refer to the WBPOA Deed Covenants provided by your realtor; alternatively, the deed restrictions and other association documents may be found at www.westbellfortpoa.com (under "Documents") or please contact WBPOA's property management company, Sterling Association Services, at 832-678-4500, or contact any of your Board Members. Non-compliance of WBPOA's Deed Covenants allows the WBPOA to implement fines, fees and other rights to enforce deed restrictions; non-payment of such grants additional rights and powers to the WBPOA.

### THE IMPORTANCE OF CURB APPEAL

Your home is one of the most major investments you will make in your lifetime. Maintaining a home from the inside out is critically important to retaining its value over time. The more mature your home becomes, the more important it is to maintain it. This applies to your curb appeal as well.

Curb appeal is very important, not just for the appearance of your home, but for the entire neighborhood. Keeping up the appearance of the exterior of your home may not be as exciting as decorating the interior, but in many ways it is much more important. If a majority of the homes in the neighborhood are allowed to fall into poor condition, this screams "we don't care about our homes".

Attached to this newsletter is some further information about curb appeal. It should start with the condition of your house, the grass, landscaping, plants, fencing, etc. Little things like keeping bins out of sight, cleaning leaves out of the gutters, power-washing mold and fungus off the bricks or hosing the driveway may seem insignificant, but it all adds up to an attractive, well-kept appearance. Things like loud exterior paint colors, broken down cars, piles of trash, boats in driveway, falling gutters, broken fences can make your house look trashy and ill-maintained... and makes the entire neighborhood look trashy and ill-maintained. Worn down houses invite things like rodents, snakes and .... crime!

Your POA Board is charged with protecting the overall value and appearance of the neighborhood. Their duty is to ensure all homeowners follow the deed restrictions. The Board and property management company are not being "mean" by enforcing the rules and regulations - they are doing it because they care about the community and wish to protect not only your home values, but our neighbors as well. A poorly maintained community is a magnet for the criminal element. So by simply maintaining your home, inside and out, you are actively participating in maintaining your home value, the overall home values in the neighborhood and helping to reduce crime. Therefore, please do your part by respecting the rules and regulations of WBPOA. **REMINDER**: any improvements or major exterior work to your home (front and back) including painting, landscaping, etc. must be approved by the ARC Committee. The ARC Committee approval form is located at the back of this newsletter.

## Texas Transportation Code - TRANSP § 545.302

## Stopping, Standing, or Parking Prohibited in Certain Places

The City of Houston and the WBPOA are very strict about enforcing the State's neighborhood parking regulations. Non-adherence to these regulations will result in a parking violations / fines from the City, as well as violation notices from WBPOA. The homeowner illegally parked or whose tenants are illegally parked will be financially responsible for any resulting fees incurred by the WBPOA to enforce the regulations.

Under 545.302(a), An operator may not stop, stand, or park a vehicle in the following manners:

- 1. on the roadway side of a vehicle stopped or parked at the edge or curb of a street;
- 2. on a sidewalk;
- 3. in an intersection;
- 4. on a crosswalk:
- between a safety zone and the adjacent curb or within 30 feet of a place on the curb immediately opposite the ends of a safety zone, unless the governing body of a municipality designates a different length by signs or markings;
- alongside or opposite a street excavation or obstruction if stopping, standing, or parking the vehicle would obstruct traffic;
- 7. on a bridge or other elevated structure on a highway or in a highway tunnel;
- 8. on a railroad track; or
- 9. where an official sign prohibits stopping.

(b) An operator may not, except momentarily to pick up or discharge a passenger, stand or park an occupied or unoccupied vehicle:

- 1. in front of a public or private driveway;
- 2. within 15 feet of a fire hydrant;
- 3. within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection;
- 4. within 30 feet on the approach to a flashing signal, stop sign, yield sign, or traffic-control signal located at the side of a roadway;
- 5. within 20 feet of the driveway entrance to a fire station and on the side of a street opposite the entrance to a fire station within 75 feet of the entrance, if the entrance is properly marked with a sign; or
- 6. where an official sign prohibits standing
