Hello to all members of the Beehive A's!



I had the necessary funds, so I decided to have the Pickup torn down and repainted. Finding a worthy place was difficult, but eventually I found a nearby paint and restoration shop.

After sandblasting, what lay under the old paint was not pretty. I was confronted with much Bondo, rusted areas I could put my hand through, a lot of fiberglass, and more Bondo. The shop's professionals undertook the serious metalwork repairs.

To match the anticipated exterior appearance, the engine was been completely rebuilt, the brakes redone,

and new wiring installed throughout.

Now to repaint the truck. Being a retired firefighter, I decided to have it painted with a fire truck theme. That would represent the fire department to honor the past, present, and future firefighters who serve our local communities.

The truck was painted, then pinstriping and decals were placed with the fire department in mind. I added some firefighting equipment

to the back wood panels by fabricating a ladder and pike pole. I then added a fire ax, fire hydrant wrench, and an emblem to accent

the new paint job. Since having this done, I have had nothing but accolades and requests from local

fire departments to participate in local activities. This truck is now a show piece at car shows and parades, representing the men and women who serve their communities.

And the fun of being able to drive my very own fire truck is a plus. Θ

INSTALLING NEW BRAKE DRUMS

Unlike modern brake drums, which are made of cast iron, and modern brake shoes in which the linings are molded to the shoes, the Model A Ford had brake drums made of pressed steel and the brake linings were riveted to the shoes. The brake shoes worked okay, but the steel brake drums were less than optimal. When stopping hard, or when applying the brakes for long distances, such as going down long inclines, they had a tendency to get hot and expand, losing their ability to stop. Applying a steel band around the outside of the drum, as some Model A owners do, helps some, but does not eliminate brake fade. And to make matters worse, many of those old Model A brake drums were turned over-size, making the already thin brake drum even thinner—making the brake system even less efficient and dangerous!

The new brake drums that are available, however, are made of cast iron, like all modern brake drums, and are far superior to the original steel drums. They are machined to an 11-inch inside diameter and have a nice, thick wall. When the brakes are adjusted properly, you can achieve much better stopping, without fadeout.

The new drums look like the originals, but they come unpainted and without grease seals. You will need paint the drums, grease the bearings, and install new grease seals and cotter pins. You will also need a brake drum puller in order to get the old rear brake drums off the axle, and a grease seal installation tool.

You may have other things to look at, too, while you're replacing the brake drums and brakes shoes. Check the brake pedal bushings for wear and looseness; check the brake rods for straightness and wear; and make sure the emergency brake shoes have plenty of lining on them. And take a look at the backing plates. Over years of use, the brake shoes wear a groove or notch in them, causing the shoes to make clicking noise as the brakes are applied. So the backing plates may need to be reconditioned as well.

Overall, it's not a really hard job; it just takes time. If, at 88, I can do it, so can you youngsters.

ENGINE R&R

There had been talk for months about how club member, Bill Wiser, had ordered a rebuilt engine for his 1930 Model A Tudor, and that he was going to have an engine pull party at his home garage. Well, after a few months of waiting, his new engine finally arrived and it was time to get to work. His new engine, by-the-way, was built by Bert's Model A Parts Center in Denver, Colorado, and it is a beauty, with a counter-balanced crankshaft and high-compression head.

A slew of club members showed up at Bill's garage at precisely 9:00 AM for the big event. Bill had the car all ready—the hood off, grille shell and radiator removed, and the headlight bar removed, as well, for easy access to the engine. And his beautiful, new engine lay on the floor, ready for installation.


With some guys on the top and some under the car, they soon had the old engine unbolted from the frame and transmission, and using a "cherry picker," removed the engine from the car. And as the old saying goes, "While you're in there, you might as well...." In this case, they cleaned the inside of the transmission bell housing, and installed a new clutch throwout bearing. The last thing you'd want is to do all this work and then have the throwout bearing go out a month later. So a new bearing would prevent all that heartache.

With a lot of work from a lot of people, Bill had his new engine in his car by 3:00. Unfortunately, they couldn't get the engine running that afternoon, but Bill got it all back together by the end of the week and drove it to work! "It's running quite well," he informs us.


Bill wants to thank everybody who came by and helped him put his new engine in. "That's what the club is all about!" he said.
