
Past Events

JUNE MEETING

The group moved inside for the meeting at 7:00 PM with Dennis Thompson conducting. He thanked Heidi Pitkin for the seven-layer dip and commented that it was delicious.

He displayed a printed example of the benefits of parade sponsorship with a

breakdown of the pertinent information. Rick Berry suggested the information be placed on the Beehive A's website and Jim Brown agreed to get it placed there.

Member/Car Profile

DON NIEDERHAUSER, PAST NEWSLETTER EDITOR, SECRETARY/TREASURER

Don has been around Model A's since he was a kid. His father, Ed Niederhauser, was an A enthusiast and restored over 20 Model A's. Don was 13 or 14 when his father began restoring A's. Each of Ed's children got two of the restored cars. Don received a 1929 Phaeton and a 1931 Deluxe Roadster. The roadster is Washington Blue.

Don's dad was one of the five founding members of the Beehive A's along with current members, Randy Christiansen and Ray Wheelwright. Prior to the Beehive A's, Ed, Don and several others organized a Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) chapter in Ogden called Rumble Seats and Running Boards. Over the years the membership declined and the chapter dissolved. In the late 1980's interest increased, and the Beehive A's were organized.





Model A's were important to Don and his dad. As Don got into his late teens he began flying and his time for cars dwindled. He became a pilot for American Airlines. In the 1990's his found the time to renew his interest in Model A's and he became active in the Beehive A's. He wrote the newsletter for two years and served as Secretary/Treasurer for 11 years.

He has attended a National Convention in Riverside, California as well as several regional meets. Don especially enjoys the tours. He has toured locally as well as through Yellowstone. He married three years ago and took his wife, Colby, on the National Tour through Kanab, Utah.

Don has been involved for a long time. When asked what's changed, he noted that many of the cars we drive today are highly modified. He likes his A's to be like Henry built them. He understands that modern traffic is different than it was 90 years ago, and safety is important but likes to keep it real, meaning the way they rolled off the assembly line. He says, "The Model A is an incredible piece of machinery." After a small incident that ruined his wiring, he has added a fuse to his car.

Today Don still has the roadster, he's sold the phaeton. He has fond memories of the cars his father built and recalls his dad stopping at small rural Ford dealerships to loot the attic for new old stock parts. In fact, his roadster wears a pair of new old stock front fenders they found on one such trip.

When asked what car he would choose if he could have any A he responded, "A 31 Deluxe Roadster in Washington Blue." I guess he has his dream car. Don does say having a closed car would be nice for touring.

His parting wisdom after nearly 60 years in the hobby? Drive 'em when you can, enjoy them. He has enjoyed the hobby so much, but it's not all about the cars, it's socializing with the other A owners. The Model A is the catalyst for those friendships, a pleasure in his life and a blessing.

Tech Corner

WHAT CAN YOUR FRAME TELL YOU?

Ford specified the engine number as the official serial number for the car. The frame number is supposed to be the same as the engine number as manufactured. The engine number was usually stamped on the top of the left side of the frame flange at the vehicle assembly plant. To observe the frame number usually the body must be removed. Sometimes the frame number was not stamped. More frequently, if it's missing, it faded due to corrosion over time.

In addition to the frame serial number stamping, assembly plants often stamped an assembly plant number. These numbers usually consists of an alpha character followed by a series of numbers. They are commonly called body identification numbers an appear to have been used to track the vehicles completed by one of the 35 Ford assembly plants around the US. The stamping, if it exists, is located on the horizontal front body cross member, in the body side rails at the floorboard level or in the wooden cross member on some boy styles such as Cabriolets and Fordors. The size of the stamping varies between plants.

These are not the same as the body numbers affixed to the Briggs and Murray bodies.

When the plant city was a single word, usually they used for first letter of the city followed by the last letter of the city name. If the city name was two words, they usually used the first letter of each word.

Of the 35 assembly plants, 31 sites have been identified. They are:
