Author speaks to the Beehive A's Club

Henry Dominguez and his book about Edsel Ford

Henry Dominguez graduated in automotive engineering here in Ogden at Weber State University. He sought to get a job with Ford in Detroit for he liked the design of their V8s of the 1930s and 40s. Ford was not hiring at the time so he sought out General Motors, worked and retired there after thirty years. He established a home and family

in Detroit and in his spare time followed his passion to learn more of Henry Ford and his son Edsel. His research over the years produced books about Henry Ford, the Ford dealerships, and two books about Edsel Ford.

He combed through the newspapers, documents, viewed historic newsreels, and interviewed several dozen eye witnesses to weave together in detail the book: 'Edsel - The Story of Henry Ford's Forgotten Son.' He wondered why a son of Henry Ford and the president of the Company for a quarter of a century had

attracted no one's attention. His research ended up with this biography of Edsel Ford. Dominguez became essentially a historian of the Ford Motor Company.

A second book followed: 'Edsel Ford and E. T. Gregorie.' Here he characterizes the relationship between Edsel Ford and Mr. Gregorie as the company's first design chief as that of an artist. He analyzed how each model of the early Fords, Mercuries, and Lincolns were designed, based on first-hand discussions with Mr. Gregorie.

Upon retirement Henry returned to reestablish his roots here in Ogden where he was discovered by friends and classmates and as well invited to speak to our car club. He held us speelbound for an hour and a half with a visual presentation of Edsel Ford and his design chief Mr. Gregorie.



Henry will be giving a presentation on the last days of Henry Ford at April's club meeting. Who knew that we had such a patient, persistent talent residing right here in our own backyard.

It is with sorrow that we learn this past February of the passing of Rick and Craig Berry's dad Richard Berry, age 93 - an US Army Air Corps World War II veteran. We offer our condolences to the Berry family for their loss.

TINY TIPS



HOW TO DETERMINE YOUR REAR END RATIO

Here's one way to find out the ring and pinion ratio in your Model A. Park on a flat surface with several feet of clear space in front. Remove all four spark plus. Put a chalk mark on a rear tire at 6

o'clock as shown. Mark the front of the crank pulley at 12 o'clock. With the help of a friend, and the transmission in high gear, push the vehicle forward and watch the mark on the crank pulley. Count the number of times the mark on the pulley reaches 12




o'clock and stop when the tire mark is at 6 o'clock again. Note the position of the mark on the crank pulley. The mark you made will be at approximately the area of your gear ratio as shown.


With 411:1, the crank pulley will have made 4 1/8 revolutions.


The crank pulley will have made three complete revolutions, then a little past 3/4 of a turn with a ratio of 3.78:1

(standard).
