What can Paramedics do in YOUR community?

Paramedics in BC provide a variety of services to support community health and safety. Through a multitude of specialties and licence levels BC Paramedics are there for you ensuring province-wide service access to healthcare, even in hard to reach communities.



Primary Care Paramedic PCP

Training : 1 Year

Services: Trained to work in unpredictable and dynamic environments while ensuring safe, proficient and efficient patient care and transportation. PCPs are able to perform a variety of skills and procedures ranging from symptom relief to critical lifesaving interventions.



Advanced Care Paramedic ACP

Training : 3 Years

Services: Possess a technical skill-set of advanced procedures that enable them to effectively manage critically unstable patients and conditions. They are targeted to the highest acuity calls.



Critical Care Paramedic CCP

Training : 5 Years

Services: These paramedics operate with the goal of instituting and maintaining tertiary-level emergency and ICU care for the patients with the greatest need while facilitating their transport by air, land, and sea to the appropriate medical facility.

Paramedic Specialists

ACP-PS / CCP-PS

Training : 3 1/2 - 5 1/2 Years

Services: Provide clinical support both on scene in Metro-Vancouver and to the entire Province through our dis-patch centres. Paramedic Specialists receive extra training to manage complex situations such as hazard-ous events and are able to triage events and ensure optimal resource management and patient care.



Community Paramedics

PCP-CP / ACP-CP

Training : 1 1/2 - 3 1/2 Years

Services: At their respective license level provides community-based care for elderly, indigenous, at risk or vulnerable populations. Community Paramedics function in a non-emergency setting and provide a variety of services ranging from home visits to blood pressure and diabetic clinics.



Emergency Medical Dispatcher and Call-Taker

Training : 1 Year

Services: Call-Takers provide over the phone medical assistance un-til resources arrive at the patient's side. Dispatchers provide vital in-formation to paramedic crews and hospitals while managing resources in the region.



Our resources are available by land, sea or sky.



Ambulances

Annually ambulances in BC drive over 2,000,000 KM arriving to emergency 911 calls and transporting patients between health facilities.



Paramedic Response Units

PRUs are smaller vehicle such as an SUV. These units are staffed with one equipped paramedic who can undertake full paramedic care when they arrive on scene. The PRU has all the same equipment on board, but no stretcher.



Fixed-wing aircraft

A fleet of seven fixed-wing aircraft based in Vancouver, Victoria, Kelowna, and Fort St. John transport patients from every corner of the Province. Patients in the North account for approximately 40 per cent of all air transports, and patients in the Interior account for approximately 25 per cent.



Helicopters

A fleet of four helicopters based in Vancouver, Kamloops, and Prince Rupert arrive to emergency 911 responses. Approximately 35 pre-qualified air carriers throughout British Columbia can also provide charter aircraft as needed.



Boats

Working alongside the coast guard and search rescue organisations, Paramedics join these first responders to stabilize patients while they are transported to the closest health care facility.
