The King Is In The Field....

Elul, the month that precedes the High Holidays is a time of preparation. During Elul we get ready to receive G-d's judgment for the upcoming year. But beyond attempting to put ourselves in our Creator's good graces, it is also a time to spice up our relationship.

Jewish tradition speaks of a king who all year long is closed off in his palace and inaccessible. Even those lucky few who do get to meet with him need to follow a strict protocol, and only get to see the king for a short period of time. But once a year, the king dresses in civilian clothes, walks around the field – a place where ordinary folks frequent – and greets everyone with a smile.

This metaphor is a way of explaining what Elul is about. All year long, the nature of our relationship with G-d is one that is merit based. It takes special preparation and requires much effort to come close to our Creator. During Elul, however, no such efforts are necessary. There is no need to meet G-d on His turf; He's already come towards us. All that is required is our willingness to meet. And when we do, there is no awkwardness or feeling that we're being scrutinized. Meeting us on our level means that He embraces us just as we are and He makes us feel whole.

When it comes to reconnecting with G-d, we sometimes feel that we are not good enough. We might think that we've been out of touch for a while, and feel uneasy about renewing our bond. Elul strips away all those insecurities and sends a strong message that G-d is crazy in love with us, regardless of how many time we think we may have disappointed Him, and He is eagerly waiting for our advances.

So as we come closer to Rosh Hashana and spiritually prepare for the New Year, let's remember that as a loving father, there's nothing that G-d wants more than reconnecting with

us. He already did His part – doing His utmost to make our meeting as comfortable as possible. All we need to do is to walk over and say "Hineini – Here I am."

May you and yours be inscribed and sealed in the Book of Life, for a good and sweet year!



Dear Rabbi,

"Why do we start blowing the Shofar in the month of Elul <u>before</u> Rosh Hashanah?"

Many communities have a custom of sounding the Shofar following morning weekday services starting from the beginning of the Hebrew month of Elul. This is because there are numerous rules and customs on how to sound the Shofar on Rosh Hashana. Sounding the Shofar during Elul is a way of practicing the laws and techniques in preparation for the big day. Secondly, the sound of the Shofar elicits the feeling of Teshuvah, returning to G-d. Although this is crucial for Rosh Hashana itself, we do begin the process from the beginning of Elul. Having said that, on the day that precedes Rosh Hashana, we do not sound the Shofar, but I'll share the reason for that in a future installment, Please G-d.

Finding Your Happy Place By Lynda Sacharov

Humans aren't that complicated, our needs are simple...we want to feel fulfilled and be happy. Oh well... maybe that's where it gets complicated.

Mort Cohen had been married for fifteen years and has two children. His Mother, Rachel, was an Orthodox Israeli, his Father, Leon, was American. He and his family "pre-dated" the formation of Young Israel. His parents, along with other Orthodox families like the Haydens, Friedmans, and Yukowitz's all lived in the western section of Trenton, but decided as a group to move to Lawrenceville where they formed the "Minyanaires" so they could regularly conduct services.

The Minyanaires obtained a Torah and on a rotating monthly basis would have services in each others' homes. Over time, this became burdensome, and besides, they wanted to have a "real" Rabbi. Alternative locations were found such as the Lawrenceville Senior Center, Lawrence high school, a VFW Hall, and a small house on Texas Avenue with rotating Rabbis from out of town.

Ironically, it was at the Texas Avenue location where the Sacharovs came to know Young Israel. At the time, we were new to the area, my husband, Aaron, had to say kaddish for his Father, and was looking for an Orthodox shul. Although I'm embarrassed to admit it, I was on my way to the Acme one particular Shabbos morning and came across an elderly couple, who I "just knew" were Jewish, so I asked them...

As it turns out they were Mort's parents, Leon and Rachel Cohen...and invited me to attend services, even though I was in jeans at the time! They couldn't have been more gracious, and thus began our association with YIOL.

Mort became involved with Chabad, and was President of Chabad of Greater Mercer County for 18 years. He was instrumental in helping bring many of the present Chabad Rabbis to our area.

Mort's "day job" is running a "virtual" software company called Labcat, which creates and markets software used by the pharmaceutical and related industries during preclinical safety studies.

After being divorced for about 7 years, and as the "social being" he is, Mort got lonely and went online to meet someone. His "someone" turned out to be Judy Dogin, who had been divorced as well. After a few online chats and telephone calls, they decided to meet in Center City, Philly, where Judy lived at the time.

Upon entering the restaurant and spotting Judy, he summoned up his best "opening line", and asked her "where's the men's room?"....I guess it was that long ride from New Jersey!


