"Waiting for the Storms to Pass" Genesis 8:1ff

Apollo 13 was NASA's third moon-landing mission, but the astronauts never made it to the lunar surface. On the evening of April 13, 1970 when the crew was almost 56 hours into the flight and about 200,000 miles from earth and closing in on the moon, mission controller Sy Liebergot noticed a low-pressure warning signal on a hydrogen tank in Odyssey.

The signal could have shown a problem, or it could have indicated the hydrogen just needed to be resettled by heating and fanning the gas inside the tank. That procedure was called a "cryo stir" and was supposed to stop the super-cold gas from settling into layers; however, when Astronaut Jack Swigert flipped the switch for that procedure the entire spacecraft shook. Alarm lights lit up in Odyssey and in Mission Control as oxygen pressure fell and power disappeared. The crew notified Mission Control, with Swigert fa-

mously saying, "Houston, we've had a problem."

As such the crew was forced to abandon all thoughts of reaching the moon. Their spacecraft was damaged but the crew made major adjustments in everything and adjusted to life in the cramped shelter they discovered in the lu-

to earth and an uncomfortable splashdown. And now, though more than 50 years have passed, that mission stands as a great example of the dangers of space travel and also of NASA's innovative minds working together to save lives during stressful, chaotic moments such as those experienced by the Apollo 13 crew. Yes, much was learned during this incident. Now that's a great story with an even greater ending, is it not?

Let's take a moment and focus on cramped quarters and chaotic storms. As such, who might have more insight on these subjects than the man we know as Noah? According to theologians Noah and his family spent approximately 364 to 377 days aboard the ark. Can you imagine spending that much time alone with your immediate family and a bunch of smelly animals? How cramped do you think Noah and Mrs. Noah were for personal space, time alone, and a "date night"? And we've got to remember, even though they were occupying the most luxurious suite on the cruise it rained for the first 40 days and nights of their maiden voyage.

Imagine, if you will, the discomfort they experienced? I think Brooks Faulkner put it best in the "Introduction" of his devotional book entitled *Cabin Fever on Noah's Ark* wherein he said, "After 150 days, Noah and his family were sick of each other. They were confined. They had 'cabin fever.' But, it was better than the storm and flood outside. They had to adjust. They needed patience and tolerance. They also needed a change …" (*Cabin Fever on Noah's Ark*, Copyright 1991, Broadman Press).

Before we go any further, let's take a moment, breathe deeply ... and focus on these words, "And God remembered Noah ..." Now let me ask, do you feel close affinity with Noah just now? Can you relate to Mrs. Noah and the kids? As we enter our 4th month of lockdown we need to be honest with God and ourselves. Are we as happy as we were after a week of disrupted living? Or, are we feeling somewhat cramped? But you say, that Mrs. Noah was really blessed ... after all she was married to the perfect husband, wasn't she? Does the bible not say that Noah was righteous, blameless, and that he walked with God? Well ... yes, it does (see Gen. 6:9) but we need to remember that Noah, Mrs. Noah, and all of their family were still human beings, living in cramped quarters to which some might speculate, "If not for the storm outside, one just couldn't stand the smell inside."

I think Noah, Mrs. Noah, and all of their family learned invaluable lessons during the storm. Lessons that stayed with them the rest of their lives even though Noah apparently chose to have a "snoot-full" of wine shortly after exiting the ark (see Gen. 9:20-24). That was certainly a bad decision that cost he and his family dearly. But what were some of the things they learned while confined to the ark? Well let's just say they learned to wait patiently on the Lord ... with the full assurance that God would ... remember them. And might I add, this is an area in which all of us could use a little bit of encouragement.

In the midst of a nationwide pandemic when each of us were suffering immensely from cabin fever, social distancing, and looking somewhat like Jesse James with our masks along comes the Sahara Dust Cloud that was the worst we've experienced in decades. Yes, scientists and health officials dubbed this year's dust cloud as "Godzilla" or the dust storm that literally threatened the

health and wellbeing everyone in America and covered everything in dust throughout our region.

Relax, take a deep breath and focus on these words, "And God remembered Noah..." But let's take it a step further

the circumstances which we often create ourselves. Again, focus on these words, "And God remembered Noah ..."

Let me extend a word of caution at this point because if we're not careful we tend to think the central focus of the entire narrative is Noah but that's not the case. Throughout the story the central focus is God and his faithfulness to Mr. and Mrs. Noah, their family ... and all of his created order for the verse says, "Then God remembered Noah, and every living thing, and all the animals that were with him in the ark. And God made a wind to pass over the earth, and the waters subsided." (Gen. 8:1, NKJV). Did you get that? God's providential care overshadowed everyone and everything aboard the ark. In other words his faithfulness to his created order is unshakable and everlasting.

But how does this apply to us. Well ... let's just everything is going to be alright. Yes, we might be suffering greatly from cabin fever. Yes, it's hard to see the sunshine and not long to feel the gentle breeze of the saltwater in our faces as we sit on a relaxing beach basking in the sunlight. Yes, the kids get on our nerves. Yes, the litter boxes seem to stink more than usual. Yes, we wonder how a household pet could actually need to relieve themselves that often. Yes, we long for less stress filled moments and yes, we finished every "honey-do" job on the list and still find ourselves twiddling our thumbs. But let's get back to Mr. Noah and his family. What did they do to occupy themselves, after they had finished all of their daily jobs of feeding, caring for the animals, and shoveling manure, even though it stormed for 40 days and nights? Well it's simple: They learned to dance in the rain.

We would do well to look at our children and grand-children and learn invaluable lessons. How so? What's amazing to me about kids is that they always adapt, regardless of what's happening around them. They make the best of every situation. If the sun is shining they enjoy life



and dance. If the rain is pouring down they enjoy life and dance. Sadly and strangely enough, when we reach adulthood we fail to hear the music of our Father and take life far, far too seriously. As such, we stifle the momentum of the Spirit and focus heavily on the negative issues of life. And, before long we wake up only to discover that we are miserable indeed because the music from Heaven no longer resonates within us. And, if we're not extremely careful we make life miserable for everyone around us.

Let us learn from Noah, his family, and also from the children that God has placed in our lives. Let's learn to dance ... in the rain ... in the Sahara dust clouds ... in the midst of a worldwide pandemic ... never giving a second thought to getting wet ... catching a cold ... getting a little dirty ... or caring what the neighbors might think. Let's learn to trust the Lord our God ... in the full assurance that he will always do what's best for us as his children.

Whether we realize it or not God is waiting, patiently at the door of our hearts ... inviting each of us to join him in the rain ... that we might experience the dance of a lifetime. The choice is ours ... and ours alone. What will we choose?




Looking forward to school opening back up we sure miss seeing the GA'S.
