in Lexington, KY and landed a position as the first Black female news videographer in Central Ohio at the ABC affiliate in Columbus, After my successful career in that field, I transitioned into public relations. **GCBLA:** Was this your original area of interest? **GS:** I have always been interested in writing and knew in the 8th grade I wanted to be a writer/journalist.

GCBLA: What do you enjoy most about what you do? GS: I enjoy doing work that has a positive impact on our community, particularly the Black community. I love working with such diverse people from every aspect of our demographic mix, working with the front line to the executive leadership and using my strategic communications, networking and connecting people, my organizational and creative skills help develop communications, and campaigns that change lives, save lives, move people. I love learning from others and in this line of work, I am blessed to be able to interact with the grassroots - to the grass tops and in my work I have an opportunity to help those who don't typically have a voice to be heard and am able to advocate to help drive change in marginalized communities that are often overlooked. I am so proud that in my business I am deliberate about helping other black businesses grow and prosper by supporting them and engaging them in my work.

GCBLA: What advice/insight would you give the next generation on how to navigate towards a successful and impactful career in Sports, Business, and Social Activism? GS: Believe in you, speak up and stand up for others and for what you believe in. when you fall down (and you will) get back up and learn from it and move forward, seek counsel from others who have skills and knowledge you don't have, be kind to others, protect your intellectual property, build up others and stay positive even when others aren't. Have faith keep the faith and lean in on your faith – stay prayed up.

As a native of Columbus so many years ago, I was bless-

ed to have been born on So. 22nd Street, which produced strong black families and their strength has served me well over my life time. That small block which included the: Towers, Watkins, Huckleby's and Sharp families. Those young men like their fathers were my big brothers and role models. My family moved to the West side however, my 22nd Street family relationships remains today just

as strong.

The three areas of questions relating to my career, my area of expertise, why was it selected and was it my original choice? I have found life's experiences are not that precise or that predictable. However, I have been blessed with many opportunities and challenges in my life's journey. The major opportunity began some sixty years ago as a result of the leaders and activist of the Columbus Urban League and the NAACP's work to address the segregation policies in the businesses and many institutions in our community. Because of their work, I was one of the first black's or females to be hired in a number of positions. My position in banking led to many other opportunities to break down barriers. As I look back each step was a process of preparing me for new challenges or opportunities. My choice was in the field of public service. One, of my most gratifying experiences was being apart of the first Collective Bargaining process in 1989, for the State of Ohio. It introduced me to the Labor Movement and the first labor contract for state employees. My years in public service was primarily in the field of employment and youth programs.

Your third and fifth questions regarding what I enjoy about what I do and what new endeavors that I am currently

involved? They are closely intertwined with one another. A little back ground. Again, I was blessed with ancestors and family that has had a major influence on my life and my life's work and activities. Some 40 years ago I was the president of my family, Adams Reunion and my Aunt Millie bestowed upon me the family documents and artifacts. I became one of the family's historians. Note; this year will be our 101 years of Adams Reunions. The unfolding of my families extraordinary history has redirected my life's work. My current activities has been for the last 13 years, working to save the historic Poindexter Village buildings and the subsequent development of a Museum and Culture Learning Center, to preserve the history of the African American story, which has been over looked and under valued. The museum will help to insure our future generations will come to know their roots and the successes and strength of those came who before them. As in the book of Joshua the Israelites were instructed to collect the 12 stones that were used to cross the River Jordan so their future generations would ask, "What Happened Here?" Rev. Poindexter taught his young ministers that they should learn the U.S. Constitution and governing principles as well as they learned the messages of the Bible. Our story is the life line for those who will

Dr. Schweitzer is a surgical oncologist, a surgeon who treats cancer. Training includes 4 years of medical school, 7 years of general surgery residency, and 2 years of fellowship in surgical oncology at the Ohio State James Cancer Institute.

Official titles now are:

- Associate Professor of Surgery at Duke University.
- Board certified in general surgery and surgical oncology.
- Assistant Director of the Duke Melanoma Program.

She enjoys treating early stage patients, curing patients of cancer with surgery and this has very meaningful impact. She also spends a lot of time doing research to improve the treatment for patients with more advanced cancers.

KW: What I enjoy most about both teaching and coaching is the joy in a person when they finally "get it". Whether it is a tough math concept that took repetition to understand or perfecting one's jump shot. I love helping young people persevere through adversity and overcome obstacles to achieve their goals. I would advise the next generation to pursue their dreams no matter what people might say. Often times it can be the people closest to you and the ones you love the most that hold you back. If you do what you truly love doing, you will never really "work" a day in your life. Colossians 3:23 tells us to work as if we are working for the Lord, not for man. I would also tell the next generation to stand up for what they believe in. GCBLA: What is your professional area of expertise? why did you select this area, and was this your original area of interest? DH: I am an artist's representative, an independent curator and Director of The Aminah Robinson Legacy Project at the Columbus Museum of Art.

I graduated from Howard University Law School in 1986 and practiced law with the Federal Government on and off until 2018, all the while working with artists and arts institutions. Seeing the value of the arts to uplift our people, challenge stereotypes and bridge cultures, I opened Peaceworks Gallery in 1990 downstairs from my father's dental office on Bryden Road. The first artist I represented, Queen Brooks, is a powerful figure in our community today. I engaged a process to understand arts administration and impact museum culture in 1992 and took positions at The Columbus Museum of Art and The Walker Art Center. 30

years from my start in the arts, I am back where I began, and proudly in a capacity to share one of the most magnanimous spirits in the art world that comes from my hometown, Aminah Robinson. I still assist family and friends with legal matters when asked.

GCBLA: What do you enjoy most about what you do, and what advice/insight would you give the next generation on how to navigate towards a successful and impactful career in Sports, Business, and Social Activism? DH: I enjoy the power of arts to open communications, impact hearts and change mindsets. I entered the field because I didn't see the same effectiveness in the law. I wanted to work closer to emotions, and the arts provide that immediacy, both for the artists and the audiences. I love to see young people express themselves freely, and experience the power of releasing their innermost desires through art. I love that what I do does not feel like work, but comes naturally. I liken myself to an artist, my palette is made up of people of many colors and my painting is the relationships they create.

I understand that art transforms and is also big business. There are many aspects young people don't grasp that are accessible if they knew. I enjoy sharing those aspects, opening them to new possibilities.

In Memoriam



GRANVILLE WAITERS, age 60,

transitioned on March 22, 2021.

Waiters was a vital cog in leading Columbus East High School to the 1979 State Championship as a 6'11" Senior Center. Granville played center for Ohio State University's men's basketball team and was drafted by the Portland Trail Blazers in the second round of the 1983 NBA Draft. The Blazers sold his draft rights to the Indiana Pacers, and Waiters spent his first two seasons in Indiana. He then played for the Houston Rockets and Chicago Bulls until leaving the NBA for Europe in 1988. At the time of his passing, Waiters had been assisting the basketball coaching staff at East High.
