Congresswoman Joyce Beatty, the wife of Otto Beatty, Jr., is continuing the family legacy, as she breaks barriers while advocating for many people. She is the first female Democratic House Leader in Ohio history, Chair of the powerful Congressional Black Caucus, while serving on

Committee on financial services, and Chairing the Diversity and Inclusion Committee. Joyce was recently named by Ebony magazine as one of the 150 most powerful women in the United States.

CHARLES TENNANT: Creator and Founder of Africentric Early College School



Not many educators, authors, and philosophers can say they conceptualized and orchestrated the founding of a school, particularly one that promotes a pedagogical system of education, designed to empower the African diaspora in line with educational modes in contact and in line with the cultural assumptions common to African Traditional rituals, values, and symbols that provide a learning environment that is more congruent with the lifestyles and values of African American communities. Such a person is Charles E. Tennant, a native of Asheville, North Carolina, and graduate of Winston-Salem

State University (HBCU), in Winston Salem, North Carolina, where he earned a degree in education with a minor in art. For more than 40 years. Tennant was and Educator for the Columbus City School system, working in various capacities. In 1998 Tennant received national acclaim for working with "at-risk" youth who were potential drop-outs, in an occupational work adjustment program, which placed students in meaningful jobs in banks, insurance companies and other none dead-end jobs. Tennant has been employed as a consultant by The Ohio State University, where he earned a graduate degree, and the Ohio Department of Education. In 1993 Tennant presented a proposal for an Africentric School (K thru 12), to the Columbus Board of Education, which was accepted. Sometime during 2016-2017, a forty two million dollar School was opened to one thousand students (Pre k thru 12 and early college program), on fifty acres of land on the cities Eastside.

EMILY SPECTOR: Early Passion for Reading Begets the Read to Succeed Foundation



The Greater Columbus Basketball Legends Association salutes Emily Spector for her contributions to youth literacy. One of GCBLA'S mantras is "what will happen once the ball stops bouncing". However, reading is imperative before, after, and beyond sports. At the age of 12 she had a passion for reading and learned that the there were children who did not have their own books. Emily knew how book ownership made a significant impact on her love for reading and she wanted to do what she could so that other children could have the same experience.

In 2013, at the age of 12, Emily formed The Read to Succeed Foundation and began to accomplish her goal. Since that time the foundation has collected new and gently used books ranging from infant to high school, organized and labeled them in specific categories and reading levels and made deliveries to schools, food pantries, organizations.

The Read to Succeed Foundation expanded its initiative as Emily began to mentor other youth to assist her. She strongly believes that you are never too young to make a difference. Her mentees are Abby Worly (New Albany High School/10th grader), Eve Zaczepinski (New Albany High School/9th Grade), Emmet Zaczepinski (New Albany High School/9th grade), Juliet Zaczepinski (New Albany High School 6th grader) Arnav Nawani (New Albany High School 9th grader) Mirabella Tempesta (New Albany High School 9th grader) and Mackenzie Duff (Dayton, Ohio 10th grader). All of these outstanding students are presently assisting her in keeping the foundation going while she is currently attending The University of Georgia. "I am incredibly grateful to my new leaders and their families, incredible donors, the New Albany community, and Big Lots, for their contributions. Without their amazing generosity and support, none of this work would be possible. I am also grateful to the Raines Group that cares about programs like The Read to Succeed Foundation through their charity program which The Read to Succeed Foundation is currently a finalist. "Together we make a difference!" said Emily.

When asked about future plans for the foundation, Emily said "My new initiative is to launch four Little Free Libraries in targeted areas serving underprivileged youth. I currently have three locations that will be benefiting from this initiative made possible by a gift from Big Lots and includes The New Albany Food Pantry, NNEMAP food pantry and The Center for Healthy Families. I also am waiting to hear back from a community center where I mentor elementary students in Athens, Georgia".

It is amazing to see what the compassion of a 12 year old has done for many. Emily's dream seven years ago is a reality today. To date Read to Succeed Foundation has delivered 107,500 beautiful childrens books to communities around the world and it is expanding. Impact and Influence of HBCU's

Historical Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) impact and Influence on sports has been kept "Invisible", yet this phenomenal story is nothing short of miraculous and parallels the principle attributes that made America Great. HBCU's were forged like metal that is placed in an extremely heated fire to develop its character, the hotter the fire the brighter it becomes. The brightness of HBCU's has illuminated our communities for years.

We intend to present some of that history through a series of articles that briefly provide and overview of past and recent athletes/coaches, particularly basketball from Metro-Columbus and surrounding counties, who attended HBCU's and returned to become contributors in our community in areas such as education, business, politics, and social activist.

Ohio has two HBCU's, Wilberforce University (1856), oldest private Black University in the United States, and Central State Umiversity (1887), both located in Wilberforce, Ohio. One of the Greatest Basketball teams ever produced in Ohio, too this day, was the 1964-65 Central State University (Marauders), who went undefeated (30-0), defeating top notch division 1 teams, like University of Dayton and others to win the NAIA crown, making them the only Division 1 team to win a crown with a perfect record, with Indiana University being the last in 1976. There were many admirers of this team, like John Wooden (UCLA) and Fred Taylor (Ohio State University), who is reported to have said, "he wished he had their second team". Several players from Columbus were on that 1964-65 team, Eddie Waller (East HS) (Deceased) and Avery Godfrey (East HS), and Charles Colbert, (HS unknown) (Deceased).

EDDIE CLARK - Executive Board Member

GCBLA: Are you a native of Columbus, Ohio? EC: Yes, I was born and raised in Columbus, Ohio.

GCBLA: What High School did you attend and what sports were you involved in?

EC: I attended Nort High School, were I played basketball, along with Jim Doughty, former Ohio State University standout, and Harlem Globetrotter. I scored the winning basket to give Middletown High Shool, and Jerry Lucas, future collegiate All-American at Ohio State University, and NBA legend, his only loss in high school. I received scholarship offers from NYU (New York City), University of Dayton, Villanova University, and Texas Southern University (HBCU), where I eventually attended on athletic scholarship.

GCBLA: Why did you choose an HBCU to attend?

EC: I needed additional assistance academically, although I wanted to attend Ohio State University with other Columbus standouts like Mel Nowell, Joe Roberts, and Doughty, I did not have the prerequisite grades and test scores to attend. During my first semester. I tore my achilles tendon, and was unable to return to play. I graduated from Texas Southern University in 1964, in Business Administration.

GCBLA: What is your professional area of expertise?

EC: I originally went to Los Angeles, California, following graduation and worked for the Industrial Commission of California, but eventually returned to Columbus, Ohio, were I went to work for Workers Compensation and retired in 1980. After retirement I worked part-time for the school board of Columbus as a substitute teacher and assistant girls basketball coach at Independence HS. While also working to diminish gang violence in the community.

GCBLA: Any advice on how gcbla can be more impactful as a organization moving forward?

EU: I think GCBLA is a great organization, that I relish being a part of and hope it continues to have an influence on the next generation.

GCBLA: Where Legends Are Remembered!



Hall of Famer McCampbell Succumbs

2014 Hall-of-Fame inductee Charles "Buddy" McCampbell passed away Wednesday morning, September 29, 2021 at home in Florida after a brief encounter with liver cancer.

Charles (Buddy) McCampbell was selected to the Columbus Citizen Journal All-City League first team as a 6'3" forward from the Central High School Pirates basketball team in 1955. McCampbell made the squad as a second teamer as a junior the previous season. Collectively, all members of this selected team were very balanced with size, shooting ability, defense and all members were better than average ball-handers. While at Central, Buddy was a scholar as well as a three-sport athlete and continued his academic/athletic endeavors at Bowling Green State University where he impressed the coaches and worked his way into the Falcons' starting lineup as a small forward. McCampbell became known as a poker-faced young man on the court and in social settings. At BG, he was captain of the undefeated freshman basketball team. As a junior, he was selected second team All Mid-American Conference and as a senior he was voted varsity team captain of BGSU's MAC championship team and selected to first team All-MAC basketball team. After college, Chuck enlisted in the U.S. Army where he served two years deployed to the Vietnam War, earning a Bronze Star and he continued his involvement in basketball and was selected to the All-Army Basketball Team in 1961. McCampbell retired from the U.S. Army in 1980 at the rank of Major after serving for 20 years. He is founder and current CEO of Heritage Paper Co. Inc. which markets paper and office supplies nationally. He now resides in Bradenton, Florida where he has coached boys and girls youth basketball and serves as a board member of the Team Success Charter School.

He was so blessed to have spent so many precious memories with his beloved wife, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, which were his pride and joy.
