## '22 Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony - MORE THAN BASKETBALL -

Many people who attended The Greater Columbus Basketball Legends Hall of Fame Enshrinement Ceremony on August 20, 2022 are commenting on how much love was in the room. It was inspiring to hear how basketball has transformed the lives of former players and coaches.

2022 Hall of Famer Jerry Saunders jokingly said how he got started playing basketball in his back yard. "It started with the NBA (National Backyard Association," he said. This led him into a world of social justice where he is presently the CEO of The Africentric Personal Development Shop and serves on many boards that help a lot of families in our community facing abuse issues.

As this year's Hall of Famers accepted their awards, you heard messages to never give up. Many of them ranked high in the field of basketball but it didn't last forever. Clark Kellogg played for the Indiana Pacers, and he got hurt. His love for basketball and his desire to continue took him into another part of basketball where he became one of the leading sports analyses in the country working for ESPN and CBS. He presently serves on the board of



trustees at The Ohio State University where he graduated 1996 in marketing.

The same is true of Reggie Rankin who played for the Ohio University Bob Cats. Although he did not make it to the National Basketball Association, he helps many get there as being a scout for the Golden State Warriors. As one of the scouts he assisted the Warriors in recruiting championship teams. The Golden State Warriors has four NBA championships.

Todd Penn was one of the herald basketball players in the country when he played high school basketball at Linden McKinley High School. He loved basketball so much that he did not have a plan. When he attended college

all he wanted to do was play. He never thought about studying and started using drugs. This caused him to become homeless. In 2008 he prayed and asked God to help him and He did. Todd said this experience makes him grateful



for things he would normally take for granted. If he had to live his life over again, he would study hard and make good grades. "I realize God has a purpose for my life. I want to share my experience with the younger generation." Todd said. "Both me and my wife spend our weekends visiting homeless camps feeding them and telling them God loves them." Todd stated. "We hug them. It is probably the only hug they will have for a while. I been there and can identify with their pain. God saved me. I am so grateful." Todd said.

Ray Miller, owner and publisher of The Columbus and Dayton African American Journal challenged the men in the audience to connect with their families even if they are not in the homes as he accepted his award. And the audience heard him. Many men came up to him and said let's do it. 2022 Hall of Famer Adam Troy and former GCBLA



inductees Senator Herschell Craig and Don Sellers were some of them.

Skip Young, President of the Greater Columbus Basketball Legends Association, believes there is a positive change coming to Columbus, Ohio. "I was glad to see this type of event make things happen, he said. It creates a synergy in the room of sisterly and brotherly love," he said.

Young's statement is true. A change is occurring right on right now. 2022 Hall of Famer Fran Frazier who is the recipient of the S. Yolanda Robinson Humanitarian award is spearheading "Love Letters to Black Girls starting the last week in September and ending on October 2, 2022. Jerry Saunders



received the Curt Moody Leadership Award. Earlier in 2022, Hall of Fame Inductees Classics of Columbus sponsored a highly successful All Star Basketball event where they raised \$400,000 to go toward HBCUs. They have presently given \$28,000 in contracts to minority business and are planning a larger event in April, 2023.

# Remembering JOE Roberts

Indeed being a legend goes beyond performing physical feats. Every athlete does that, it's their business. It's the ones who are heroic away from their respective sport, the ones who sacrifice their time, money, and sometimes even personal well-being for the betterment of others, that are worthy of our admiration. Joe Roberts was such a legendary hero.

Joe Roberts (86) transitioned on Monday, October 11, 2022, at his home, with his wife (Celia), by his side in Oakland, California. Joe was a stand-out at East High School and later played and captained the 1960 Ohio State University NCAA championship basketball team, which included the likes of Jerry Lucas, John Havilicek, and Mel Nowell. Joe was drafted by the Syracuse Nationals, now the Philadelphia 76er's, playing four (4) years in the NBA, and one (1) year with ABA Kentucky Colonels. Joe later coached in the NBA with the Golden State Warriors, he acted as Head Coach during the 1975 NBA Finals, when Al Attles was ejected from game four (4), and led the team to a sweep to clinch the title. Joe is a 2013 GCBLA inductee, and has been a keynote speaker at one of Hall of Fame events.

We send our deepest condolences to his family during the passing of a true legendary coach/player and more importantly an extraordinary human being.
