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WHY SOME DON'T BELIEVE

Have you ever asked yourself "Why some people don't believe in Jesus Christ to the point they allow Him to change their lives?" It is a good question.

I read an illustration that might shed some light on the matter. The illustration, as I recall goes like this: A husband invited an out-of-town friend to dinner at his home. The wife understandably was nervous since she had never met the guest. As it turned out she was delighted to find the gentleman intelligent, engaging, and personable. She also discovered he was the author of a book her husband had given her some years earlier which she had stored away.

A few days later her husband noticed that every time his wife found a free moment she was reading the book. Finally the husband asked her, "Why, after letting the book gather dust in the closet, she was finally reading it?"

Her reply was the comment that got my attention. She said, "It was only a book until I met the author." A book is always more interesting if you know the author or the one whose life the book is about.

From Genesis to Revelation the Bible contains an unbroken theme about the Lord Jesus Christ, inspired by the Holy Spirit. Jesus Himself said that all the Scriptures speak of Him, Luke 24:27. This truth includes all the Old Testament books and certainly all the New Testament books as well. The very book the world attacks today. Yet it is true Jesus knew this would happen.

He said to unbelieving Jews, "But do not think I will accuse you before the Father. Your accuser is Moses, on whom your hopes are set. If you believe Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote about me. But since you do not believe what he wrote, how are you going to believe what I say?"

We need never to apologize for the Bible stories, for Jesus gave His complete endorsement to what Moses,



Daniel, Noah and the other prophets wrote.

Some so called intellectuals and theologians mock the idea of the literal interpretation of the Bible. Yet there is no evidence for their reaction to the Bible.

However, the mature Christian can say with Paul, "...will their lack of faith nullify God's faithfulness? Not at all!" Romans 3:3. But how do we account for persons who are highly educated refusing to believe? Jesus's conversation with Nicodemus sheds some light on the answer. He pointed out Nicodemus was viewing things from a worldly perspective and needed to be "born again" of the Spirit. This statement flows into other obvious reasons some don't believe. Some reasons are because they:

- 1. Think there is no evidence...but there is.
- 2. Are influenced by the ungodly associates.
- 3. Have life experiences that made them bitter.
- 4. Are cursed with intellectual egotism.
- 5. Fear the emotional challenges.
- 6. In love with their independence.
- 7. Have morality issues.

The Scriptural reason some reject the Gospel is "the god of this age has blinded the minds of unbelievers, so that they cannot see the light of the gospel..." 2 Cor. 4:4.

Satan's tactics are the same now as it was in the Garden of Eden. First he suggested the Word of God couldn't be believed. Second he got Adam and Eve to believe they were smarter than God, and third he encouraged them to do what God had told them not to do. He uses this same pattern today.

When the foolish say in their heart "there is no God," Psalm 14:1, "God uses the foolish things of the earth to confound those who are wise in their own eyes," 1 Corinthians 1:27.

If those who think they are smarter than God are fooled by Satan, the God uses foolish things to

confound them. His purpose is not to keep them from learning but uses their own foolishness to confound them.

There is one common denominator in these three tactics Satan uses. He is smart enough to know that all three work only if man thinks he's more than he really is. If men think they are wiser than God, then his ego takes over and, who knows, some may become a college professor. Many college professors are ego-maniacs, but all critics of the Bible do trip over their own egos. This would answer the question about why some don't believe, If we go back to the opening illustration about the woman who read the book her husband gave her, after she met the author, it might be helpful.

Before the introduction to the author she didn't see the need to read the book. She may have had other books to read, but after being introduced to the author, she was drawn to it.

Most people won't just pick up a Bible and begin to read it. It is thick, has some big words, and the educational level of its content is above that of the daily newspaper (6th grade level). What will encourage them the want to read it? The world wants evidence and we Christian ought to know some things about that.

Nicodemus was attracted to Jesus and engaged Him in conversation. Nicodemus was a very educated man, a Pharisee and a member of the Jewish ruling council. Jesus appealed to his condition (lost) not his status in life. Jesus talked to him about the evidence he could observe, changed lives.

Some are never won to Jesus because they don't read the Bible, and they don't read the Bible because they are not attracted to Jesus by His followers. Think back to your own conversion. Were you simply attracted to a book on the coffee table and began reading it? Or was it perhaps someone, a real person living and talking about Jesus Christ as their Savior? I would guess it was the latter.

Paul wrote to the young man Titus to teach the people behave in a manner to "make the teachings of our Savior attractive," Titus 2:10. Peter wrote for us to be able to give Bible answers to questions, 1 Peter 3:15-16 and Jesus said that if we loved each other, the lost would know we are His.

Why do some not believe? Besides their own ego, it might be because our lives do not attract the lost and do not talk about Him in the market places or even that we show little or no love for each other.

WHEN SCRIPTURE COMES ALIVE

I am sure I am not the only person that this has happened to but recently some scripture just came to life for me. I have read these verses many times and preached on them or referenced them in messages but in February they made me realize just exactly what they said and meant.

The second week of February each year we have a gathering in Pigeon Forge that is hosted by Barnabas Ministries and it is called Winter Worship and Workshop. This isn't something new because this past February we celebrated our twenty - first anniversary. The thought I am trying to introduce is this verse found in *I Thessalonians 5: 16* "Rejoice always". It is a little verse with big implications. This is a hard command especially since Paul adds the word "always." It would be easier to rejoice sometimes but always? How does one go about doing this? Paul gives us the solution to this in the verses that go with this passage. He says "we should rejoice always, pray and give thanks in without ceasing, circumstances". The explanation for this command is that this is God's will. God wants us to have these aspects in our lives. If we don't, could we be in spiritual rebellion or just not listening to God's instructions. To do God's will becomes very difficult when we have our own agenda and we start to be unhappy if we don't get our way.

Yes, there will be tribulations in our lives. Satan will do everything he can to make our lives a turmoil. But *I John 4: 4* gives us great insight into how we can rejoice as it says, "You are from God, little children, and have overcome them; because greater is He who is in you than he who is in the world". We can rejoice in this truth! God is still in charge.!

I am rejoicing about the meeting and the deep feeling it has given me. Also, what transpired at the meeting gives me joy and I continue to recall what took place at WWW when I get discouraged and down. May we rejoice even in tribulations because God wants that for our life.

LEARN ING with Larry

I recently preached from Matt. 25:31 about when Jesus comes and He will separate the goat from the sheep. That seems to be the first thing He does. This made me think: "Have I separated myself from the things of this world?"

To answer the question I had to look at two words in the text that are similar in some ways. The first is APHORIZO meaning "to divide, or end a relationship, or set apart." In 2nd Corinthians 6:14-18 we are told not to be yoked together with unbelievers. "For what do righteousness and wickedness have in common?" The same is asked of "light with darkness," "Christ with Belial," or "believer with unbeliever?" agreement is there between the temple of God and idols" For we are the temple of the living God. As God has said: "I will live with them and walk among them, and I will be their God, and they will be my people. Therefore, come out from them and be separate, says the Lord. Touch no unclean thing, and I will receive you and I will be a Father to you and you will be my sons and daughters, says the Almighty."

The second word is "sanctifying" (HAGIASMOS) meaning "to cleanse or set apart for use, or to be declared holy." We find the word in 1 Cor. 6:9-11. After listing all the sins of the flesh, Paul ends with, "And that is what some of you were. But you were washed, you were sanctified, you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and by the Spirit of our God."

These two words speak about coming out of the worldly ways and building an intimate relationship with Jesus. The problem I see is that the evil of this world didn't hit us all at once, no the devil slowly brought into this world slowly so we would not be shocked but gradually accept these things as normal. We know these things are not normal, so by this gradual means Satan has caused them to not bother us as they should.

So as I evaluate my relationship with the Lord, I realize I must separate myself from the things of this world that would jeopardize the sanctification that I desire to live.

A song titled "Mercy Me" states with these words: "Separated; until the veil was torn; the moment that hope was born; and guilt was pardoned once and for all; Captivated; but no longer bound by chains; Left at an empty grave, the sinner and the sacred resolved." Jesus has saved us and set us apart to go into the lost and dying world to bring them to Him. Jesus did not come to this world to make bad people good; He came to

make dead people alive. So as I strive to separate myself from the evil of this world there is a simple chorus I love to sing: "Lord, prepare me to be a sanctuary, pure and holy, tried and true. With thanksgiving, I'll be a living, sanctuary for you."

Study Number One Hundred Twenty-eight – Get Your Eyes off of Yourself

"If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from His love, if any fellowship with the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose. Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interest of others," Philippians 2:1-4.

The desire for self-esteem is a highly personal, intensely subjective, even narcissistic activity. Such intense self-preoccupation and introspection may be permitted and required for the person who in seeking healing but it should never be a way of life. Psychotherapy is a permissible and necessary regression to the nearly total self-preoccupation of infancy, but not for the growing Christian. Such a journey down the river of self may be needed to repair personality damage, healing of old wounds and perhaps to experience unconditional love of the therapist. Some have never experienced unconditional love, but this certainly is not true of any redeemed person, for that is what Christ gives.

If there were one piece of advice I'd give someone to help them overcome discouragement, it would be to become actively involved in helping other people. I believe this advice is given in our text, not to overcome discouragement in particular, but as a life style that honors our Lord and is beneficial to both the one helping and the one helped.

It seems to be a paradox but in looking to the interest of others we are freed from self-interests. Unless someone serves my need, I can't serve the need of others; but in serving the need of others, my own need is served. Self-esteem flourishes in the interplay of serving and being served, of giving and receiving.

Jesus was exalted because he "made himself nothing," verses 5-11 of our text. Those who seek encouragement for its own sake will never find it. Those who seek encouragement for their own need and the needs of others, however, will find it. The phrase "look not only to your interest" implies that we are permitted to fulfill our own needs and that our own needs are legitimate. It is good and right and healthy to do all we can to build our own self-worth. It is superficially unhealthy and unethical, on the other hand to seek self-esteem as an end in itself.

The best "adjusted" person is the person who has reached the place where he cares not a whit about his own self-esteem but cares intensely about encouraging others. Such a person may be rare, but there is no inherent reason why such an attitude is not within the reach of every person, for this attitude is the essence of the Christian life. "Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus," verse 5. What was His attitude? He "made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant," verse 7.

Jesus emptied Himself. What does that mean? It means that He did not pursue all that was rightfully His. He was the Creator, John 1:3, who deserved praise and honor, yet He chose to serve the needs of others, others who could do nothing for Him. We are incapable of returning the favor, so He had nothing to gain by His actions, but His actions resulted in His exaltation. There is the paradox again

chose to serve the needs of others, others who could do nothing for Him. We are incapable of returning the favor, and He had nothing to gain in His actions, but His actions resulted in His exaltation. There is the paradox again. He would not have been worthy, as a man of this exaltation until He humiliated Himself for others sake. Notice His steps to "serving others."

- 1. He set aside who He was, He "did not consider equality with God something to be grasped," verse 6. We can't properly think of the needs of others while at the same time thinking about ourselves. Jesus' thoughts were of us, not for Himself.
- 2. He not only set aside His own importance, but He "made himself nothing," verse 7. Anyone who thinks he is "someone of importance," is really not. There is a humorous story of a preacher who said to his wife. "Honey do you know how many great preachers there are in this room?" To which she replied, "Probably one less than you think."
- 3. He desired to serve, by "taking the very nature of a servant," verse 7. It may be one thing to forget your title, office, or even becoming a "nothing," but it's another step to become a servant.
- 4. He "humbled Himself," verse 8. There are those who think some things are beneath their dignity, but when we serve others unselfishly, dignity is not a concern. Beyond that, in the eyes of God, dignity is gained in being a servant.
- 5. He became "obedient to death," verse 8. It would do no good for you, or me to actually die for another, in the sense that Jesus did. Such action, on our part would not improve their life. However, when we die to ourselves, give up our selfish ambition for the sake of others and to praise God, everyone benefits. God is glorified in us, the one we serve is encouraged, and we ourselves are more Christ-like.
- 6. He left it in the hands of the Father to determine the result of His actions, and God "exalted him to the highest place," verse 9. No one, other that Jesus can fill this "highest place," nor should we try. However, God blesses those who bless others, and Jesus blessed all mankind by emptying Himself for our sake.

From this point on in the text, we have the record of the enthronement of Jesus and that we should all bow and confess Jesus as Lord to the glory of the Father. This will never apply to us in the sense that it did Him. However, every Christian will receive a "crown of righteousness," are given the title of "kingdom of priests," and can bask in His glory. All of this takes us back to the point of the text.

When we forget ourselves, for the purpose and benefit of others, good things begin to happen. Selfishness, in any form, is harmful to self as well as to others. There are those who go through life leaving nothing behind but the debris of broken hearts, disappointment, and other manners of hurt for others. But for the self-emptying Christian the road behind and before them is filled with blessings, joy, and peace. So when the Scriptures state, "Each of you should look not only to your own interest, but also to the interests of others," it is giving a prescription for a purposeful and happy life.

Paul opens the second chapter of his discourse to the church at Philippi with the words, "If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from His love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete..." This is the third blessing of unselfishness for the benefit of others. Paul, a brother in Christ confessed that as an observer, he was blessed by witnessing such humility. Even those who are uninvolved are encouraged by seeing others forget themselves to bless others.

STRESS

Sermon by Denny Coburn

TEXT: James 1:2-12

INTRO: We need to be thankful for God-given stress because it is beneficial for spiritual growth. Stress keeps us motivated and keeps us from becoming bored. However, if not handled properly, it can become overwhelming. If it is consistent and unrelieved, pressure can cause us physical, emotional and spiritual harm.

Biblically, stresses are usually called "trials" "troubles," and "tribulations." 1st Peter 1:17, John 16:33, and Matthew 6:34. God has not promised us immunity from stress. In fact He has promised them, 2nd Timothy 3:12. However, we have a spiritual source for help, Hebrews 4:16; 7:25. Let's look at stress practically.

I. TYPES OF STRESS

A. OVERWORK – Moses

- 1. Demands in decision making, problem solving.
- 2. Assume too much responsibility, Ex. 18:13ff.
- 3. Solutions solving, Ex. 18:24ff.
- 4. Changed behavior can solve the problem

B. SUDDEN CHANGES - Job

- 1. It can be family, finances, health, etc.
- 2. Search for the purpose in the change, Job 1:21
- 3. Communication with God about it, 7:15-16; 13:24; 19:10.
- 4. Trust in God, 9:4; 8, 10, 42:1

C. UNESCAPABLE STRESS – Paul

- 1. Responsibilities, 2 Cor. 4:8, 9; 11:24-28; 12:7
- 2. Look at the positive sides, Romans 5:3
- He says "positional peace" "in Christ"
- 4. Saw the peace and righteousness that follows training by stress, Hebrews 12:11
- Paul knew: Stress leads to a strong productive Christian life.

II. THREE THINGS

There are three things we can gain from stress

A. PATENCE/ENDURANCE (v3)

- We are not as strong as we thought so we will depend on God
- 2. Teaching us God is faithful.

B. EXPERIENCE/CHARACTER (4)

- 1. We are tested to make us "complete"
- 2. We can demonstrate reliability by enduring.

C. CONFIDENCE (vs 4-5)

- 1. Confidence in God, He will see us through
- 2. Wisdom we ask for in handling stress

III. WHAT WE ARE TO DO IN STRESSFUL TIMES A. CHANGE OUR BEHAVIOR

- 1. As did Moses in getting more human assistance
- Learn God provides human help also.

B. CONFIDE IN GOD

- 1. God knows we are limited and expects us to ask
- 2. That is seeking help from the ultimate source

C. BE PATIENT

- 1. God's wisdom is involved, allow it time to work
- 2. He's working on us through stress
- 3. Develop patience as a mind-set (Spirit evidenced)

IV. <u>LEARN LESSONS FROM PAUL</u>

A. <u>HE EXPECTED STRESS – 9:16</u>

- 1. Peter knew it 1 Peter 1:7
- 2. James knew it Our text
- 3. Jesus obviously knew it and said "Don't be surprised" by it.
- B. HE DIDN'T RUN FROM IT Acts 21:10-14
- C. HE DID'T AVOID IT FOR MATERIAL OR PERSONAL GAIN Phil. 4:10-13
- D. **SET A CLEAR GOAL** Rom. 15:20
- E. SEE IT THROUGH ETERNAL PERSPECTIVE

WHAT MAKES A NATION GREAT?
