Dear Parish Family,

Firstly, let me say how much difference our volunteers make to the life of our Parish Community. Our parishes couldn't survive without your generosity in sharing your gifts and talents. We wouldn't be anywhere nearly as successful without all of you. There is always room for more people on our rosters and in our groups.

These are some of the **truths about volunteering**, and almost every community-based organisation including the government website dedicated to volunteering NSW say the same things. Volunteering is **good for your health** both physical and mental – volunteering **helps with happiness**. Every person in the world is gifted and talented and volunteering **helps to share some of those skills (gifts) for the betterment of others** – it doesn't matter what you see your gift as, the community and others need it. Volunteering is a **great way to meet people** and especially people you may not have normally associated with. It helps **build friendships** and **gets us out**. Helps all of us **to belong**. Many volunteers tell us they get more out of it than they give, often reflecting they **learn new things and skills** every day. Being part of an organisation that seeks to build a better world gives a **sense of purpose** – we all need a reason some days to get out of bed. And volunteering **can be fun**, helps us get out of our comfort zone and **deepens the connections we all need** to each other.

I recognise that the process, no matter where you volunteer can be a 'bit' off putting. I have been working for years with our agencies, People and Culture (HR) and Safeguarding, to develop and simplify the process to help volunteers get on with the ministry they are volunteering for more quickly. There is always room for improvement. You do have to be computer literate but if you are not, don't let it put you off. Our office staff are very adept at negotiating the forms. Everyone who signs up to be a volunteer has to go through our process. It is part legislation and part local church law and part Church Australia wide. The process does take a little bit of time.

Not everyone will need a National Criminal History Check or a Working With Children Check. If, however, you need one or other of these checks you can't volunteer till they are done. Depending on a number of factors this can be a 24 hour wait or an up to 6 weeks wait from the time you submit the proofs of identity forms.

Only one person sees the checks and that is the person who clears for volunteering **That person is in our offices in town.** All I, we, get is that you are clear to volunteer.

You might have noticed that most of our emails come out to you without any email addresses. They are almost always Bcc (Blind Carbon Copied), that is the recipient addresses are hidden. The Privacy Act is particularly strict in what data and information can be given out. We are obliged but also want to protect your privacy and personal information. As an organisation and parish, we should always seek your permission to share information. We don't share it otherwise. I prefer that permission in writing by the way.

Don't forget volunteering helps our sense of wellbeing and can be fun!!

On Wednesday 27th March I was invited to visit Rosary Park Catholic School Branxton, where the Year 4 students enacted the last supper of our Lord Jesus Christ. (20:19-31)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.'

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.



t John Baptist de la Salle was born of a noble family in 1651 and from a young age was destined for the church. He was ordained a priest in 1678 and with the help of a layman he opened two schools for poor boys and dedicated the remainder of his life to education. Some of his initiatives included the establishment of the first training-college for teachers and the division of classrooms into separate grades. Through his work he founded the Order of the Brothers of the Christian Schools; today there are approximately 20,000 members of the 'Christian Brothers'. Because of John Baptist de la Salle's pioneering efforts, he was declared the patron saint of all school teachers.


