

May 01, 2022: Third Sunday of Easter

When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread. Jesus said to them, “Bring some of the fish you just caught . . .” “Simon, son of John, do you love me?”

“Yes, Lord, you know that I love you.”

John 21: 1-19

Easter bread

Within hours of Russia’s invasion of Ukraine, World Central Kitchen was at work. WCK volunteers are serving 35,000 hot meals a day feeding hungry families in 12 Ukrainian cities as well as sites in Poland, Hungary, Romania, and Slovakia for refugees crossing those borders to safety. They’ve set up kitchens and feeding stations in basements, train stations and shelters; they’ve mobilized a number of local restaurants and food truck operators in Poland to assist in the operation.

Chef Jose Andres started World Central Kitchen to assist in relief efforts in Haiti after the devastating 2010 earthquake. Since Haiti, WCK has fed those left homeless and hungry in the wake of Hurricane Maria in Puerto Rico, the blast that devastated Beirut, and the bush fires that ripped through Australia. Andres’ organization has fed tens of millions struggling through the COVID epidemic in the United States, as well as asylum seekers in Texas and those whose homes were destroyed by tornados in Kentucky and hurricanes in Louisiana.

Chef Andres explains that “World Central Kitchen started with a simple idea at home with my wife Patricia: when people are hungry, send in cooks. Not tomorrow, today.

“Everyone knows that food is central to life and family all over the world. What we learned very quickly was that food is even more essential in a crisis . . . You see, food relief is not just a meal that keeps hunger away. It’s a plate of hope. It tells you in your darkest hour that someone, somewhere, cares about you. This is the real meaning of comfort food . . .

“After a disaster, food is the fastest way to rebuild our sense of community. We can put people back to work preparing it, and we can put lives back together by fighting hunger.

“Cooking and eating together is what makes us human.”

Today’s Gospel is the Risen Jesus’ third appearance to Peter and the Eleven as recounted in John’s Gospel. The Risen Jesus appears to them one morning after a long, futile night of fishing. He’s made a charcoal fire, has cooked fish and bread, and invites them to have breakfast. This Easter encounter defines the core ideas of Jesus’ teaching in the Gospels: Jesus’ call to share with the poor and needy from our poverty and Jesus’ example of bringing back the lost and healing the broken. Inspired by the work of World Central Kitchen and those who provide bread for the hungry, may our selfless generosity and humble forgiveness be the bread of Easter peace for those struggling through their own Good Fridays.

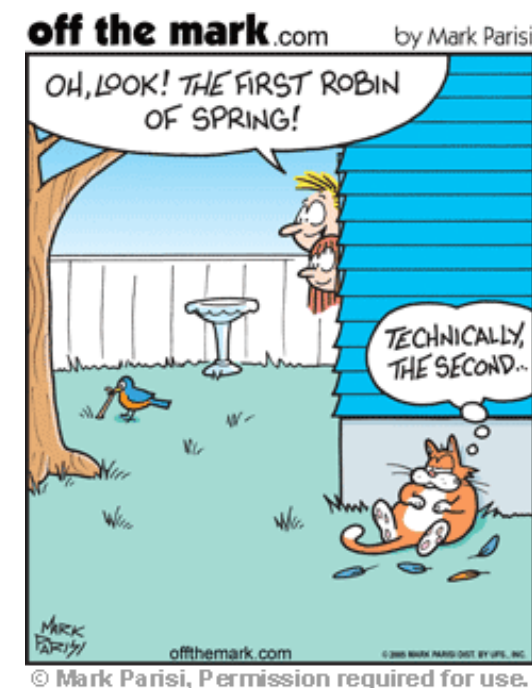
