A winter snow storm left the Louis Krubsack home looking like a Christmas card. The home is on Wickerd road, north of Scott road.






Photo date: early 1900's

Christmas at the Newport ranch. Adults watching the youngster playing with his new train. William Newport is in the back row on the left.






Photo date: July 1944
