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TIPS TO MAKE FOR A FUN DAY AT THE WATER PARK

hen summertime temperatures are hot and climbing, people look for ways to cool off. Trips to the beach or a pool often top the list of ideas, but water parks also make for great places to spend a hot summer

Water parks may be stand-alone facilities in town or components of larger amusement parks. They often feature a combination of wading pools, slides, lazy rivers, and splash zones to cater to visitors of all ages. Water parks can be great family fun for those who do their homework and prepare for visits accordingly. Certain tips can make the experience that much more enjoyable. 1. Pack light. Belongings can be tricky when it comes to water parks because most items cannot get wet. Leaving them beside rides also leaves you vulnerable to theft. Bring only the essentials and plan to stash car keys, mobile phones and minimal cash in lockers. Lockers in many modern facilities are paid for with your credit card and work by entering a self-generated code. This way there are no keys or locks to worry about.

2. Bring three bags. Bring a backpack or a tote bag that is filled with a change of clothes. Unless you dry off for the last hour by walking around the park, you likely will not want to get in your vehicle in your swimsuit. Leave the clothes in the aforementioned locker. Stash a plastic shopping bag or garbage bag inside the backpack, as it can hold wet swimsuits and other damp items after you've changed. Bring a mesh or breathable shoulder bag that can hold a few essentials, like towels and water bottles. The mesh will enable air flow so that you don't end up with a sopping, mildew-riddled towel by the end of the day.

3. Wear comfortable swim gear. It's hard to get out of the sun at a water park, so covering up is key. A rash guard or swim shirt can be paired with swim trunks or one- or two-piece swimsuits. Avoid any swimsuits that have flimsy straps, as they're more likely to come undone while crashing through waves or during high speed water slide excursions.

4. Plan locker trips strategically. Aim to

visit your locker at least two or three times if you're spending a full day at the water park. This gives you chances to reapply sunscreen (which you should always wear at the park) and grab a few dollars for snacks and beverages. Remember to stay hydrated while out in the sun, even if you are in the water most of the time.

5. Utilize water shoes. Water park pavement can get hot and slippery. Water shoes are ideal so that you do not injure your feet. Many rides prohibit flip flops, but secured water shoes are allowed.

6. Arrive early. Try to get to the water park shortly after it opens. Crowds will be sizable on hot days. You don't want to waste all of your time waiting in line for rides. Plus, the earlier in the day you arrive, the less steamy and the greater chance you will find parking near the entrance.

7. If budget allows, rent a cabana. Some parks rent cabanas. A cabana can be a family's home base and a place to cool off and relax. For an extra cost, some cabanas come with food service.

8. Have extra adults on hand. When the kids outnumber the adults, it can be

tricky keeping eyes on everyone, especially in larger attractions like wave pools. Plus, there's bound to be some kids who are more adventurous than others. An extra adult or two can wait with children who do not want to go on particular slides or other rides.

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STAY SAFE AROUND THE POOL AND SPA

arm weather often leads to more time spent outdoors. For homeowners lucky to have a backyard pool, hot tub or community water amenities, these spots can be great for relaxing, cooling off, exercising, or spending enjoyable times with family and friends.

While pools and spas are ideal spots for family fun, they're not without their dangers. The American Red Cross warns that 69 percent of young children who drown were not expected to be in or near water. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advises that drowning is the leading cause of injury-related death among children between the ages of one and four. However, anyone can drown or suffer a water-related injury - even people who are strong swimmers. Let's dive deep into pool-related dangers and how to avoid them. **Pool chemical injuries**

Pools and spas need to be sanitized for safe use. Mishandling pool chemicals can cause serious injuries and leads to roughly 4,500 emergency room visits in the United States each year, says the CDC. More than one-third of these preventable injuries affect children or teens. All product instructions should be followed carefully. Chemicals should be stored out of reach of children or pets. Ample time should be left between adding chemicals and swimmers returning to the water.

Stay away from drains

Children and adults should not swim or hang around near drains or suction outlets in pools and spas. In addition, drain covers should be installed over all drains and returns. Hair, limbs, jewelery, bathing suits, and more can be sucked into these openings and cause serious injuries, according to PoolSafely.gov.

Supervision is key

Swimmers should not venture into the water without a buddy present and children should never be left unattended around the water. Homeowners can install safety fencing and self-latching gates around pools to prevent youngsters from wandering into the water. All items that can be used to climb fencing should be kept away from the pool. Consider putting locks on gates on fences around the perimeter of the yard. This way no one can wander into the yard and into the pool when homeowners are not home.

Dive safelyNo one should ever dive into shallow water, advises Poolonomics. Water depth should be tested prior to any


diving, and generally pools with depths of eight feet and up are considered safe for diving. Do not dive into inner tubes or into shallow ends or spas.

When jumping into the pool, try going feet-first or doing cannonballs. Avoid flips or positions that will result in landing flat on the back, which can injure the spine.

Teach kids to swim

Swimming knowledge can keep children more secure in the water. Basic competence of simple swimming strokes may help to avoid drowning. Relying on water wings or flotation devices that are not U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets can be risky.

Summertime is pool and spa time. Safety is paramount around the water.









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

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TOP PLACES TO FISH NEBRASKA

Tith about 450 lakes and streams open to public fishing, deciding where to fish in Nebraska can sometimes be challenging, but the following water bodies have proved to be Nebraska's best fishing spots year

MERRITT RESERVOIR

With the variety of fish and habitats, there is something for every angler—regardless of their favorite fish or favorite way of fishing. Merritt is the home of the hook & line state record muskellunge and channel catfish, and fishing on Merritt is equally good on the ice or open water. LAKE MCCONAUGHY

Lake McConaughy is the state's largest reservoir and has been the fishing destination for untold numbers of Nebraska anglers over generations. As the reservoir has aged, its habitat has changed and so has the fishing. Historically it offered excellent panfish, rainbow trout, and striped bass. Currently, McConaughy is perennially one of the best walleye waters in the state, and usually one of the best for trophy

LEWIS AND CLARK SRA - GAVIN'S POINT DAM

Many people believe that all of the Missouri River reservoirs belong to the Dakotas. Most of them might, but the last one, Lewis and Clark Lake, is on the Nebraska/South Dakota border. Lewis and Clark Lake itself is an excellent fishery for catfish, walleye, sauger, smallmouth bass, big white bass and who knows what else that might swim down the Missouri River.

Walleye and sauger fishing are excellent and

Way

fishery. There are acres and acres of backwater habitats to explore and catch crappies, largemouth bass, rock bass and northern pike. A person could spend years exploring and catching fish on this stretch of water and never get bored with the fishing or the scenery.

BOX BUTTE RESERVOIR

Way out west in the Nebraska panhandle sits Box Butte Reservoir. Another irrigation reservoir, water levels do fluctuate on Box Butte and during droughts can be relatively low. However, even then there is enough water to support fish, and the water in Box Butte is excellent quality. Couple that with hard, even rocky bottoms, aquatic vegetation, and at times flooded timber and you have another reservoir that provides great

habitat and a variety of species of fish.

Box Butte has a high density of northern pike, along with walleye, bass, and large channel caffish. A variety of panfish, bluegills, yellow perch, crappies, rock bass and even pumpkinseeds are found in its waters. SANDHILLS LAKES

Already mentioned were the uniquely Nebraska sandhills in the north-central part of the state. The natural lakes nestled in those sandhills are also unique. Nebraska has few natural lakes. not created by man, and that alone makes these waters special. Their incredible productivity

makes them outstanding fisheries.

A number of sandhill lakes can provide some of the best panfish fishing to be found anywhere. These lakes are known for producing bluegills as

big as any place. The yellow perch fishing can be excellent as well as black crappies as big as garbage can lids. That is not all. Some sandhill lakes support northern pike in abundance and can produce some of the fattest, prettiest

largemouth bass you've ever seen!

Because of their shallow depths the sandhill lakes can be choked with an abundance of submerged aquatic vegetation during the summer. For that reason, fishing is usually best in spring, early summer and fall, but most Nebraska anglers will tell you the very best time to fish the sandhill lakes is through a hole in the

BURCHARD LAKE

The curse of Nebraska geography is that much of our fishing water is found "out west" while the majority of our population lives in the eastern part of the state. There is not a body friends in participal that is not fished. of water in eastern Nebraska that is not fished hard. In spite of that, Burchard Lake continues to consistently produce some of the best largemouth bass fishing in Nebraska. In addition to the excellent bass fishing,


Burchard offers good fishing for bluegills, black crappies and channel catfish. There are also remnant populations of yellow perch and a few walleve that continue to survive



THIS SWEET 'SANDWICH' IS A FAVORITE SUMMERTIME DESSERT

Ice cream sandwiches are a treat to enjoy a serving of ice cream, any day of the year, but can be ice cream sandwiches, food particularly refreshing when the mercury climbs. According to the ice cream novelty company Ice Cream Social, ice cream sandwiches may have evolved from a treat called "okey-pokey" that was once served by street vendors in London. historians believe, were invented in 1899 by an unnamed pushcart vendor in New York City's Bowery neighborhood. This vendor served vanilla ice cream between two graham wafers.

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

POPULAR INSECT REPELLENT PLANTS



omeowners choose plants for their properties based on a number of variables. Some may be into growing their own foods, while others desire their gardens to be an awe-inspiring mélange of bright colors and alluring scents. - Lavender: Fleas, flies, mosquitoes, and moths are not fans of this aromatic and colorful member of the mint family. Bees tend to be drawn to lavender, a durable plant that many garden centers recommend in areas prone to drought or hot summers without much precipitation.
- Mint: Mint is another plant that is instantly recognizable for its aroma. But mint lovers may not realize that it's also great for keeping ants at bay. Mint also can be used to repel mosquitoes, but gardeners with no experience

planting mint should plant it in pots. That's because the Farmers Almanac notes mint is an especially aggressive spreader that can quickly take over a garden. Separating mint in pots can prevent it from bullying its way into other plants' domains.


Lemongrass: Lemongrass is a tropical grass that's so fragrant it's often used in perfumes. Lemongrass contains citronella, which many people associate with repelling



mosquitoes. A potted lemongrass plant can repel these unwanted guests, keeping them away from decks, porches and/or patios all summer long.

recommends using chrysanthemums, which repel a range of insects from bedbugs to fleas to ants, as border plants around a home. That's because they contain the natural insecticide pyrethrin, which can serve as something of an insect-repelling boundary around a home.

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
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WHY YOU NEED A HAMMOCK OR HANGING CHAIR

recreational pursuits in North America. The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service says around 40 million people fish each year. Fishing can be an ideal way to spend time in the great outdoors, and people often bond with family and friends while fishing. As any angler can attest, there's a rush that comes from getting a small tug on the line and then reeling in a fish. At this point, fishermen must decide if the fish is a keeper or should be tossed back into the water. Sometimes the answer is very clear. Rivers and lakes across the world are managed by various organizations that serve to protect wildlife and natural resources. Rules may be in place regarding the sizes of fish that can

protected, and even when people can fish. In a study led by researchers with the U.S. Geological Survey that was published in the journal Fisheries, thousands of distinct populations of fish were studied. Researchers determined that as many as four out of 10 freshwater species in North America are in danger of approaching extinction. As a result, fishing is regulated by Fish and Wildlife officers and game wardens.

Those who are new to fishing or to a particular region must learn and follow the rules regarding fishing. Fishing licenses are typically required to fish in a given state or area. Always speak with a licensing agency



which methods of fishing are legal. Drag nets or other methods of mass fish collection or luring the fish with lights or other equipment

may be prohibited. Learning how to safely catch and release fish if the need arises also is an essential component of responsible fishing. When done correctly, catch-and-release methods can ensure high survival rates and preserve native fish populations. The National Park Service advises those who fish to follow these

- temperatures are high. • Use equipment that enables one to
- land the fish quickly without struggle Avoid the use of scents and artifical baits that encourage fish to swallow hooks. Learn which bait are prohibited in certain bodies of water. Artificial lures that hook the fish in the lip are
- Avoid playing with the fish to
- Keep the fish wet and calm, and
- treat it gently to remove the hook. Hold the fish underwater and allow it to ventilate before release so it can regain its swimming strength.

than two hours at room temperature. Items should be moved indoors or discarded even more quickly in especially hot conditions.


2. Learn how to smoke.





CAMPSITE SAFETY TIPS

he appeal of camping is undeniable. According to The Business Research Company, a market research and intelligence company, the market will grow from just under \$40 billion in 2020 to reaching \$56.6 billion by 2025.

Camping has long been a popular pastime for outdoor enthusiasts, but it may have developed an entirely new group of devotees in 2020. Traditional vacations may not have been possible in 2020, when governments across the globe urged citizens to avoid conventional travel as the world found itself in the throes of a global pandemic. In an effort to overcome cabin fever, many people viewed camping as a safe way to get out of the house while still limiting contact with people from other households. That no doubt inspired new generations of camping fans, many of whom will continue to pitch their tents and sit around campfires long after the pandemic has ended. The National Park Service recognizes the popularity of camping and urges people to stay safe. Veteran campers and novices alike can benefit from reviewing these safety tips, courtesy of the NPS.

Plan ahead. Camping trips may not require hours of scouring travel websites in an effort to find the best deals on flights and hotels. But camping trips still require ample planning. When planning a trip, take into account who's coming along. Assess their camping skills and physical fitness to determine the most appropriate place to camp. Campers with limited mobility may be best suited for accessible campsites. The NPS urges campers to consider if everyone in the group will be able to make a long hike from the parking lot to the campsite. If not, choose a site that you can pull right up to or is just a short, easy walk from the

parking lot.

• Research the campsite and surrounding area. Know as much as possible about the campsite prior to embarking on your trip. Learn about everything from the local wildlife you may encounter while camping to the condition of surrounding areas, including the altitude, the difficulty of nearby hiking trails and where to go in case of emergency.

• Develop an emergency plan. The NPS urges campers to develop an emergency plan, noting that it's always wise to expect the unexpected when camping. Bring a first aid kid along when leaving the campsite to engage in activities like hiking or fishing. Go over safety protocols before going on a hike, including the need to stay together and remain on the trail at all times. More



 Bring the right gear. The NPS notes that each camping trip will have its own equipment needs, which will be dictated by the setting, the time of year of the trip, the difficulty of the terrain, and the duration of the trip. Navigational supplies, sun and insect protection, insulation (i.e., extra clothing and blankets), shelter, flashlights and headlamps, first aid kits, extra food and water, firestarters, repair kits and tools, and a communication device like a smartphone or satellite phone are the essential necessities that should be brought along on all camping trips.



Fireworks traditionally are part of large celebrations, such as national holidays or grand opening events. Many individuals also take it on themselves to set off fireworks during block parties or other neighborhood gatherings. Though

fireworks are awe-inspiring, they're also dangerous, which is why it's best to leave them to the professionals.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that fireworksrelated injuries and deaths in the United States have risen by roughly 25 percent in the last 15 years. In 2021, nine people died in accidents involving fireworks, and 11,500 were injured.

"The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to watch the professional displays," said Alex Hoeh-Saric, chair of the CPSC.

Three-quarters of fireworks injuries occur the weeks before and following the July 4th holiday in the United States. The Canadian Government indicates twothirds of all fireworks-related injuries in Canada occur between May and August, with nearly one-third happening on days surrounding Victoria Day and Canada

Fireworks can injure any part of the body, but burns to the hands and fingers, trunk, and arms are the most commonly

Sparklers are not necessarily safe, either. The CPSC reports that 1,100 injuries result from sparklers each year.

As fireworks become widely available, it's imperative that individuals follow these crucial safety tips when using them.

- Never allow children to play with or ignite any type of firework, including
- Keep a bucket of water or garden hose nearby to extinguish fires or sparks.
- Only buy and use fireworks if they are

Mosquitoes make their presence felt in many areas each summer. These pesky, often hungry insects can carry disease, and their bites can be painful and itchy. Homeowners can try these three techniques to keep mosquitoes out of their backyards.

1. Remove standing water. Standing water is a breeding ground for mosquitoes, who don't even need a lot of water to successfully breed. A daily

Even clogged gutters can lead to the accumulation of a small amount of water, and that can be enough for mosquitoes to breed. Remove these potential breeding grounds when you find them, and do so each day, as mosquitoes mature from eggs to nymphs in roughly four days. Mow regularly.

Mowing the lawn so the grass never gets too high is another way to make a backyard less hospitable to mosquitoes. The pest experts at Terminix® note that mosquitoes seek tall grass to protect them from the elements, including wind and hot summer sun. Mowing enough so grass

never gets too high in summer can make backyards less inviting to mosquitoes. Plant with mosquitoes in mind. The home remodeling experts at HGTV note that plants can be part of homeowners' strategy to repel mosquitoes. Various plants have mosquito-repellant qualities. For example, bee balm releases a fragrance as it grows, and mosquitoes don't like that fragrance. Homeowners can speak with a local lawn and garden professional for recommendations about plants that can thrive in their region and repel mosquitoes at the same time Mosquitoes can make it hard to enjoy a backyard oasis. 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

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CELEBRATE THE START OF SUMMER WITH A PICNIC

This year the summer solstice, which marks the official start of summer, falls on June 21. During this time of year, schedules become lax and meals often occur on-the-fly - and usually outdoors. When firing up the grill or packing picnic essentials, home chefs should consider which dishes they'll serve alongside the main course. Of course, no summertime meal would be complete without a tasty potato salad in the mix. This recipe for "Potato Salad with Bacon and Parsley" from Allie Lewis Clapp, Lygeia Grace and Candy Gianetti's "Real Simple: Easy, Delicious Home Cooking" (Time Home Entertainment) offers a tasty take on this classic dish.



POTATO SALAD WITH BACON AND PARSLEY

Serves 6

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds new potatoes, about 15 Kosher salt and black pepper


- 4 slices bacon
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 1 cup fresh, flat-leaf parsley, roughly chopped

Place the potatoes in a pot with 1 teaspoon salt and enough water to cover and simmer until tender, 15 to 18 minutes. Drain and run under cold water to cool. Cut into quarters.

Meanwhile, cook the bacon in a medium skillet over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until crisp, 6 to 8 minutes. Transfer to a paper towel-lined plate. Let cool, then crumble.

In a large bowl, whisk together the oil, vinegar, mustard, 3/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Add the potatoes, bacon and parsley and toss to combine.

Tip: The potatoes can be cooked and tossed with the dressing and parsley up to 1 day in advance; refrigerate, covered. Bring to room temperature and add the bacon just before serving.





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BOAT SAFE WITH THESE 10 SAFETY TIPS

Take a boater safety course — Though it's only a legal requirement for those born after Dec. 31, 1985, consider completing the Nebraska boating safety course to learn the top things you need to know about navigating Nebraska waters, what to do in an emergency and more. Find an in-person or online class at OutdoorNebraska.gov; search for "boater education."

Check equipment — Before you launch, ensure your boat or kayak is in good running condition and all essential equipment is present, including a life jacket for every person on board. Paddlers of kayaks or canoes also should physically inspect their planned takeout point to make sure it is accessible.

Tell someone your plans — Before leaving home, let someone know where you are going

and when you expect to return. Consider carrying a cellphone in a waterproof pouch, as well, in case an emergency occurs.

Wear a life jacket — Make your life jacket a statement piece and wear it, as it does no good stowed away if an emergency occurs. Children under age 13, those using personal watercraft and those being towed on skis or similar device must wear a U.S. Coast Guardapproved personal flotation device; it's required by the law.

Be wary of surroundings — According to the National Safe Boating Council, nearly a quarter of all reported boating accidents in 2021 were caused by operator inattention or improper look-out. Pay attention to other boats, personal watercraft, swimmers, stumps and other hazards. Speeds in excess of 5 mph are prohibited if within 30 yards of any other vessel, swimming area or dock. If padding a kayak or canoe, be aware of possible debris below the surface or under bridges.

Have all required safety equipment — Life jackets, throw cushions, fire extinguishers and bailing devices are required on most boats. An engine-cut-off device or switch also is a good idea

Avoid alcohol — Nearly one-third of all recreational boating fatalities occur when someone is Boating Under the Influence, a criminal violation enforced in Nebraska. Always designate a sober driver.

Watch the weather — Storms can pop up quickly in Nebraska. Check the weather in advance and monitor it during the day, if necessary.

Avoid hypothermia — Even though temperatures are rising, the water still can be cold. Hypothermia is caused by exposure to cold weather or water. Take caution to prevent hypothermia.

Keep it legal — Make sure you've registered your boat and, if a nonresident, purchased an Aquatic Invasive Species stamp at OutdoorNebraska.gov. Also remember anyone operating a motorboat or personal watercraft in Nebraska must be at least 14 years of age. Learn more about Nebraska's boating regulations at OutdoorNebraska.gov; search "Go boating."

Sunshine, Skin, and Self-checks

Yes! We are sooo happy about the sunshine and warmth headed our way this summer, but it is also a good time to remind yourself to take care of your skin through sunscreen and selfchecks. May is skin cancer awareness month—did you know skin cancer is the most common type of cancer in the US AND worldwide?


Here are some fast facts, according to the Skin Cancer Foundation:

1 in 5 Americans will develop skin cancer by the age 70

Having 5 or more sunburns DOUBLES your risk for melanoma

More people develop skin cancer because of indoor tanning than develop lung cancer because of smoking

Now that you know some of the facts, let's look at assessing your skin by performing





self-checks. It is as simple as "ABCDE". Pick out a mole on your body and ask yourself the following questions:

A – Asymmetrical. A mole is considered asymmetrical when one half does not match or look like the other half.

B – Border. Look at the borders of the mole; are they uneven, irregular, ragged or have undefined edges?

C – Color. This pertains to the actual color of the mole itself, especially if it is red, blue, or black, but also if there is color variation

throughout the mole.

D – Diameter. Moles bigger than 6mm in diameter should be evaluated.

E – Evolving. Changes in a new or existing spot or mole over variable time could mean it is suspicious.

To lower your risk of skin cancer, it is recommended to wear SPF 30 or higher, avoid the sun during the hottest hours, and perform self-checks.

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
