2024 ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

Meeting Report and Election Results

n 2023 the Club had a very good year financially, especially in comparison to 2022. During 2022 the Club was repaying for our 2017-2020 Tax Years due to losing our Non-Profit status in 2021. During that time, we ended up having to pay over \$72,000.00 in back taxes, resulting in a year end loss of \$29,360.00. In 2023 we got to start with a clean slate, and we were determined to make up for the previous year. At the end of December 2023, the Club had brought in over \$362,000.00 through our Public Range, CCW Range, and Club Matches, etc. Our largest income category was the public income from the Dillman range, which accounted for \$191,000.00, followed by membership dues which was another \$85,000.00. This, combined with the income from the Junior's Program and the Multi-Gun Division resulted in a year end Net Profit of \$36,122.65. Our biggest difference between 2023 and 2022 was that we didn't have 4 years of back taxes to repay, but we still had a larger in-

come compared to 2021 and 2020. As of the latest Board Meeting, which took place on Monday the 1st, the club has a total income of \$99, 671.38 with a total expense of \$86,833.77 for a net income of \$12,837.61 for the current fiscal year.

As mentioned, in 2021 the Club lost

Club and our Lincoln Shooting
Sports Foundation, which retained
its 501-c3 status, and created the
Lincoln Rifle Club Foundation which
is what we are today. This process
took a very long time, from 2022 to
the middle of 2023 we've been working with our attorneys at Michel &
Associates to complete the merger
and in June of last year we finally

its 501c-7 status due to taking in more than 15% of our income from the public, because of this we had to repay our taxes for 2017-2020. As much as this hurt it was even more unfortunate that we had lost our non-profit status as our Club has always operated as one. In 2022, once the tax issue had been settled, we immediately went to work trying to become a non-profit again. We we're able to accomplish this by merging together the existing Lincoln Rifle

sent in our New Articles of Incorporation and our merger was completed. At our last Annual Business Meeting, the club body reviewed and accepted the new Bylaws which adhere to c-3 standards. For all intents and purposes, the Club still behaves exactly as it had before but will no longer need to worry about the income from the public, and we can more easily apply for grants and donations.

uring the week of October 23rd, 2023, the Range closed to complete several major projects on the front and back. On Ormsby Range we worked with a two-person team from Clayton Graham Inc. to turn Bay 9 into two separate bays, bringing our total berm count to 10. While we had the machinery there, we decided to also finish some minor upkeep on several of the existing bays as well as move the extra concrete blocks from our CCW Wall build to a more permanent area. During this the Range Committee decided it would be a great use of time to complete some larger projects on Dillman Range, including repainting the safety line, sanding and repairing the entire back wall of benches/tables, and patching some of the seemingly never-ending holes around the range. All the work on the Dillman Range was completed by club member volunteers and for that we couldn't be more grateful. In total the work took about 4 days and came to a grand total of \$16,000.00 which was split between the Lincoln Rifle Club Foundation and the MGD Division, with MGD paying the majority cost of \$11,500.00. for the construction equipment on Ormsby Range.

During the range closure we also used the large equipment from Clayton to dig and fill in a Lead Trench that will capture the contaminated water that floods the front of the range. This trench will keep any lead from traveling off the range site, helping our environmental rating significantly. The trench is around 100 feet long and filled with crushed rock for easy drainage. We'd like to extend a special thank you to Mo Vander Linden, the daughter of one of our Board Members Eric Vander Linden, for running the excavator and digging the trench for most of the project. So far, the trench has worked amazingly and was even

able to handle the extreme rains we got in winter. The costs for the equipment were added into the larger Ormsby Range project, but the materials for the Lead Abatement totaled \$5,800.00.

Near the end of 2023 the Club was approached by a chapter lead for the "A Girl and a Gun" shooting organization, which focuses on introducing women to the shooting sports world and training them in several different types of shooting. During these discussions we met with Tamara Palmer-Dumont who was looking to open a chapter of "A Girl and A Gun" in Gold Country with the Lincoln Rifle Club Foundation as their home range. We agreed that this partnership could be very beneficial to both of us and now the Lincoln Rifle Club and "A Girl and A Gun" are officially working together. Tamara now hosts 3 events each month at our outdoor and indoor ranges. These events are for women who are "A Girl and a Gun" members but they do not necessarily have to be LRC Members, though we highly encourage it. Since January, the partnership with "A Girl and a Gun" has brought in at least a dozen new women to the club and we are very excited to see how it grows. The events will take place the 1st Tuesday, 2nd Monday and 3rd Saturday of each month with the Saturday event being held at the indoor range. The Tuesday event is called 'T' time and focuses on each shooter's individual skills, the Monday events will be a social gathering that includes breakfast and then range time, and the Saturday event will be a night shoot at the indoor range for .22s. All the information for these events can be found on our website calendars and all information for the Gold Country "A Girl and a Gun" chapter can be found on the "A Girl and a Gun" website.

Our Range Master Mike Davis will be resigning on the 1st of May after over

a decade of RSO work on the Dillman Range. Mike was gracious enough to take over as Range Master 3 years ago on short notice as we knew he would be a perfect candidate and he knew we needed him. Mike has been an extremely helpful and important figure on the range since he got here but the last 3 years really showed just how knowledgeable and committed he is. The Board knew they could always rely on Mike to handle any issues on the range in the best way possible and the other RSOs knew they could always count on him to have their backs. We can't thank him enough for all that he has done for us. We look forward to seeing him out at the range getting to enjoy some shooting time instead of having to run it, Thank you Mike!

The Board of Directors had 4 of the current Directors rerunning and one of the seats open. On the Range Committee there were 4 open seats. After elections took place, it was determined that Robert Lusk would be the newest addition to the Board of Directors, with Leo Rosko and Dan Burghardt joining the Range Committee.

Thank you all for another successful year and thank you again for your participation in our Annual Business Meeting. We will see you again next year!

LRC Junior's Division Update



The Lincoln Rifle Clubs Junior Division is doing amazing. We have 11 kids on the advanced team and about 60 show up for beginning Monday nights. The advanced team practices 3 nights per week and from January to April, they compete on most weekends. In addition to the regular competition season, the kids also shot in the USA Shooting Junior Olympics qualifier where we qualified 5 out of our 11 shooters.

The Junior Olympics is an NCAA level competition, where the kids compete against the nation's best junior and Olympic shooters at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. The girls all competed first in Air Rifle, then Smallbore, to which the boys all started in Smallbore and ended in Air Rifle. Since we had 4 girls qualify and 1 boy (for both disciplines), the LRC represented

at the Olympic Training Center for almost two weeks.

This year was a little bit different in that the Junior Olympics was also a qualifier for an international match, so the RO's were very strict and followed every rule to the T. Gear check generally takes about an hour and this year took 7 hours...what I would call a Charlie Foxtrot.





fter the gear check, the kids were given 2 separate times to practice, then they had 2 days of competing. On the line, the RO's were calling out every possible violation, from a pistol grip barely touching a jacket to failing to have the gear check form on the chair behind the shooters. Not gonna lie, it's hard to keep a smile on your face when the RO's are actively trying to call out and disrupt the kids. But all of our shooters kept a good attitude and Alex Watts (one of the team captains) helped her teammates to make sure they knew what to do to pass the gear check, then she was there to support them when they shot (in turn they were all behind the line when Alex was shooting too). After the kids shot, if there was a problem, Alex was there to offer some words of advice.

That said, all of the girls did amazing! Alex Watts and Hypatia Shen both shot their best score ever in a National Competition. Hypatia even took Silver in her age group for Air Rifle and Gold in her age group for Smallbore. Mary Jane Diaz was able to work through her gun breaking and still shot better each day. Eva Carbajal, at her first National Competition, did amazingly under pressure and also shot better each day (though she looked like she might throw up). Logan Michael stepped up to the plate and put up some great scores, coming in at 15th place out of 200 shooters...not bad at all. I was so proud to see these kids shooting at the Olympic Training Center and be able to coach them on a national stage.

SUPPORT OUR JUNIOR'S PROGRAM TODAY!

he Lincoln Rifle Club's Junior
Precision Team is geared up and
ready for the 2024 match season! In
the coming weeks the kids will have the
opportunity to compete against some of the
best shooters the west has to offer. We'll be
competing in matches all over Northern
California for the next 7 weeks, including
hosting a State Championship Match for the
CRPA. So far this season we've shot the
Best in the West for the CMP, a local 60 shot
Small Bore match, and the American Legion
Postal Match.

The American Legion Postal Match is shot in advancing stages, where the final 15 shooters are invited (all expenses paid) to shoot at the Olympic Training Center. With a total of 600 points available, the shooter must have shot a 575 to make the 2nd round and out of our 12 shooters, we had 3 make the cut for the 2nd round. Alex Watts shot a 580, Hypatia Shen shot a 581 and Logan Michael shot a whopping 597. If they make it to the 3rd round, they will have the opportunity to compete against the best junior shooters in the Country.

In addition to the American Legion, the kids are getting ready for the Junior Olympics. The qualifying matches are slated for February 11th and 18th, wherein

COMBAT ACTION PISTOL MATCHES

(CAP Matches)

he last year within the club there has been a progressive movement forward relative to pistol shooting which has illustrated the need for a match with an emphasis on the basics of action pistol, or the ability to handle a pistol in a variety of positions and deliver an accurate volley of fire. The history of the CAP matches goes back to the older PPC match where police and law enforcement were engage the target with two hands, on hand, and use both dominant and non-domination hands as well as position changes during particular strings of fire. The emphasis and goal of the match is to help pistol shooters develop an increased skill set with their handling of the pistol under the pressure of a match while being force to balance basic pistol marksmanship against time. The last season was characterized by good standing at distances from five yards to fifty yards.

The CAP matches established this last Spring embrace this same spirit and require shooters to engage the target with two hands, on hand, and use both dominant and non-dominat hands as well as position changes during particular strings of fire. The emphasis and goal of the match is to help pistol shooters develop an increased skill set with their handling of the pistol under the pressure of a match while being force to balance basic pistol marksmanship against time. The last season was characterized by good standing at distances from five yards to fifty yards.

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The matches are held at the back of the range in the Ormsby range (bay #4) and are held every Wednesday from May through September from 1700 through 2100. There are two relays and the first relay is at 1730 and the second at 1900. During the hour and a half relay each shooter is required to shoot 110 rounds for record and all shooting is done from the holster. The match itself is "revolver friendly" meaning it limits all shooters to only six rounds in each magazine and each shooter should come with at least four magazines. All shooting with be done in a single line abreast, meaning that all shooters in a single relay will fire together.

There is a total of five target changes and engagement distances are from five to twenty-five yards, with a reduced fifty-yard target used at the twenty-

five yard line. The course of fire requires that shooters engage the target with two hands, one hand, and use both dominant and non-dominant hands as well as position changes during particular strings of fire. The emphasis and goal of the match is to help pistol shooters develop an increased skill set with their handling of the pistol under the pressure of a match while being forced time. The last season was characterized by good weather, a good shooter turnout, and I truly believe that everyone increased their individual skill level with their pistol of choice. The equipment required to shoot the match include a pistol, a holster, (a gun belt might also be a good idea), 110 rounds of ammo, and either four magazines or four speed loaders for reloading. I would arrive early and sign up as the relays are filled on a first come and first serve basis. The cost of each match is five dollars and a twenty dollar sign up fee is required for the first match and covers the cost of awards at the end of the season. We have had a good turnout for the last few years the club has been hosting the matches and would like to see it grow in the coming years. We would also like to encourage all club members to partake in the club matches in order to further promote the sport of shooting while increasing your skill level.

We hope to see all of you at the range.

OMP REPORT

or this month, we held our match on April 13th (second Saturday). There was a light rain present, which would tend to make paper targets soggy and cardboard backers sag a little, but thankfully, Dillman Range has a covered firing line. Five shooters braved the conditions and used an array of approved by CMP rules rifles.

Iain McIntyre used a AR-15 with iron sights and regulation weight / trigger pull requirements. He shot a score of 271-2X which earned him a bronze award pin. Cary Triplet, celebrating his birthday, used a K-31 Swiss straight-pull bolt rifle, to shoot a score of 259-5X to earn a bronze pin in the Vintage Foreign Military category. Jaime Bagtas, used the matches namesake, John C. Garand M-1 rifle, to shoot a score of 271-10X!!!! This earned Jaime a Silver award pin in the as issued M-1 category.

Alan Tier came out after recovering from an injury. Alan shot his scoped AR platform in the Unlimited Modern Military category. This category requires a high scoring threshold in order to get an award.

We had a new shooter, who has not fired at our range, Theodore, who borrowed my M1903A1 and completed the match. Theodore was interested in completing a match in order to submit his application permit for obtaining an M-1 Garand through the CMP. After obtaining his M-1 he could compete in future matches with his own rifle.

As a sidenote, Thank you, all members who attended the 4th of April voting general business meeting. I appreciated your vote in electing me to serve the club on the nine member Board of Directors.

CLUB HIGH POWER

he Club High Power match is one of the longest, if not the longest running match sponsored by the LRC. It is conducted like a practice match for shooters wishing to learn how to shoot high power competitively or just want to improve on their marksmanship skills. At the Dillman Range, on the 2nd & 4th Thursdays of each month, beginning in April through September, (October is the 2nd and 3rd Thursdays). The 1st match of each month has shooters firing in the standing slow fire & rapid prone shooting positions. The second match of the month has shooters fire from the slow prone & rapid sitting positions. All courses of fire are fired on standard NRA 200 vd. targets. CMP & NRA high power rules allow for the use of scopes. While NRA & CMP specifies specific rules for the type of rifle used in the Service Rifle or Match Rifle categories, we are very lax on these rules for the club event since the scores are not sent into the NRA. Please come with a rifle that can easily be reloaded with a magazine or striper clip that holds at least 5 rounds of ammunition and can easily fire 10 rounds in 60 seconds. You will need 25 rounds of ammunition for this match. Match fee for this

match is \$5.00.

This match is a great way to improve your marksmanship skills with your rifle and have fun in the process. Most shooters are shooting some type of AR-15 chambered in .223. While this is not a requirement for this match, it is the easiest rifle type to use for these matches. We do have a limited number of Club Rifles that can be used for this match, but these will need to be requested in advance of the matches to be made available. Club ammo is also available for a fee. Please let me know in advance to make sure we have ammo available.

Please contact me if you would like more information about the Thursday Night Club High Power matches and I hope to see you on the range.


