Our first Westie party of the year will be held in honor of Chinese New Year, also known as Lunar New Year. The color red denotes good luck, fortune, happiness and abundance in the Chinese culture and is often worn or used for decoration in other celebrations.

The dragon is present in many Chinese cultural celebrations as the Chinese people often think of themselves as descendants of the mythical creature. The dragon represents prosperity,



good luck, and good fortune.

When they encounter problems, they do not give up. People with the sign of the dragon are polite, sympathetic, self-aware, have a creative attitude, and are motivated.

They abhor hypocrisy, defamation, and all that sort of thing. Dragons don't back down from a confrontation, yet they hate being taken advantage of or exploited by others.

Red lanterns hang in streets; red couplets are pasted on doors; banks

and official buildings are decorated with red New Year pictures depicting images of prosperity. If you're born in a Dragon year, the following are deemed lucky for you:
