

Happy New Year to all; As this New Year gets under way I want to thank you for your continued support of Pilgrims Progress in reading this section. In the life of Jesus He ministered to large numbers of both the common man and His disciples. Jesus ministered in a variety of settings, weather, and landscapes; also feeding His sheep both in Spirit and food. The Parables stretch over the first three chapters of the Bible; Matthew, Mark and Luke. There are a total of thirty Parables' in the Bible and some have brought major divisions in the Body of Christ starting at the time Jesus delivered them. Many Parable's are very famous and can be remembered easy while others are somewhat less significant and the average person does not know of their existence.

The Pearl of Great Price is one of the most unknown ones in the Bible; it is short and could be easily bypassed in finding. It is the sixth Parable Jesus gave and was given to His disciples. It is only two verses long and can be located in Matthew 13: 45-46. It is also the middle of three Parables' that I call the Kingdom of Heaven series as it relates to finding the Kingdom and what man can do with what he finds with it. These three Parables' were addressing only His disciples.

Some people I have spoken to lately struggle with just what is the Kingdom of Heaven. The Kingdom of Heaven in my mind is what you choose to make of the circumstances and life you lead. We in our fallen state have to live sometimes with two feet in different worlds. This can be a tough situation depending on where you are with your walk with Jesus. A question is presented in this Parable that should be asked to everyone that follows the Lord. What pearls are you seeking? Matthew 13:22 reminds us not to let the worry of the world and the deceitfulness of wealth choke the Word. Pearls in this context are a collection of seeking the Kingdom in all areas or going to large extensive searches to secure the best that can be found in the Kingdom. What do you seek after in looking for your pearls? From my own experience I seek after the finest that the Lord has. Do you seek the highest quality of Godliness in your life? There is an old time saying I used to use "Sold out to Jesus". Are you willing after finding the Pearl the Lord has for you; are willing to put all you process into it? Messianic Moment

Beloved,

We are living in times of great challenges and many changes that we will all be facing in the future. An important question we must be asking now is, "How do we prepare for these challenges and changes?" I would like to share some thoughts about that preparation. One foundational truth we must understand is that everything that happens to us, and indeed ultimately everything that happens in the world, is under the sovereignty of God. The Bible refers to God as Lord and

KING because He is the *final authority* and always has the *last word*. Understanding the sovereignty of God can give us a great sense of comfort if we learn how to "Trust in the Lord with all of your heart, and not lean upon your own understanding, acknowledge Him in all your ways, then He will direct your paths." (Prov. 3:5-6) Two things stand out for me in this verse: **trust** with your heart and **don't trust** your understanding. Because

we often fail to *understand* the reasons *why* certain things happen or don't happen, we can fall into the spiritual

trap of allowing our hearts to harden toward the Lord. Many have fallen prey to the devil's accusations about the character and love of God because they could not reconcile the goodness of a loving all powerful God and the pain, wickedness or evil that befell them or others. Their hearts harden, they stop trusting the Lord and turn

away from loving Him.

God surely tests our hearts through our sufferings. But if we learn how to **process our pain** and offer God our lives in a deeper and more profound way precisely because of our suffering, we will find ourselves united with

God in a way that is so utterly different than anything we have experienced before. Words will fail to describe

it. Isaiah 40:31, teaches us that they who "wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint." The Hebrew word (kav'ah - קוֹה) translated as 'wait' is better translated as 'bind together.' So the real sense of this verse is

that those who are bound together with the Lord, united with Him, tied tightly to Him, or even 'twisted together' like the fringes on the Tallit (Jewish prayer shawl) will be renewed in their strength. What a wonderful

word picture. Let your life be so joined to the Lord, so united to Him, that you will be able to mount up like an eagle and rise far above all of you earthly situations and receive new strength so you can walk through your circumstances and never become weary or discouraged. You can keep trusting even when you don't

understand. Amen and Amen!!

The Bible says that Jesus Himself "learned obedience through His suffering" (Heb.5:8) and as a result of this process of "learning obedience," He overcame His suffering and "received a name that is above every name."

He is now the "source of eternal salvation to those who obey Him," and eventually "every knee will bow and declare that Messiah Jesus is Lord." (Phil. 2:11). Just as Jesus was rewarded for His obedience, so the scripture promises us a reward. In Rev. 3:21, Jesus declares to us that if we overcome, as He overcame, then we "will sit on His throne with Him, even as He sits on

the throne with the Father." I do not think we can really fathom what this means. Paul writes in 1 Cor. 2:9, "No eye has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love him" (NIV).

The reward for our obedience is beyond our ability to conceive.

One of the ways that I have learned obedience is, as I have *died to myself* and surrendered more and more of my

heart and my will to God, I have received an ever deepening relationship with Him. This process is really the

heart of what is called **Discipleship** and it is highly prized by the Lord. **The reason it is so highly prized** is

because at the end of this process, you are a mature person who God can entrust with authority in His

Kingdom and responsibility over His possessions.Jesus made this very clear in His parables of the talents

(Matt. 25:14-30, Luke 19:11-27), and also in His promise that the "overcomers" will sit on His throne with Him. Paul also referred to this in Romans 8:17 and 2 Tim. 2:12, where He spoke of the Lord's promise that those who are

faithful and obedient will reign with Him.

With this in mind, we should look at each and every situation from a *kingdom/discipleship* perspective. We should ask ourselves this question: "What is the lesson I am to learn through this?" We should then ask the

Holy Spirit to reveal to us what the Lord wants us to learn and how we should be reacting and responding. Then

we can learn, change and grow as disciples whom the King can entrust with His possessions and His authority to rule and reign with Him.

Remember that learning obedience through suffering is a lifelong process, so please be patient and forgiving toward yourself and others.

As part of the process of *learning obedience* we have to learn how to magnify the Lord. In our flesh we tend to only see and talk about the negative and magnify those things. Listen to what people talk about and how they talk about those things. Their conversations *magnify* what they are thinking about and make it bigger and bigger. As a spiritual discipline we must magnify the Lord by talking about Him and His goodness and His mercy and His loving kindness. When you do this, you will discover that your inner life is strengthened, your faith is built up and you generally feel encouraged. It is extremely important to have fellowship in the spirit and in the light with other believers. We truly need each other, but you must manage those relationships and those conversations. Do not let them go in directions

that are not *in the spirit* or *in the light* and are therefore not *edifying* (i.e. they do not correct, instruct or encourage you). You must take charge of what you hear and what you say.

You must both *guard* and *garden* your heart by not letting people put *toxic* words into your ears. And if you do

hear them, do not let those poisonous words get into your thoughts or influence your feelings. Do not allow *toxic* thoughts to be created in your own mind; cast them out! If you have not yet cast them out, do not let them

take root. If they have already taken root, then pull them out like weeds.

One of the ways we do this is by "casting down every vain imagination" and "making every thought obey Christ" (2Cor.10:5, my paraphrase). Those vain imaginations are the pictures in your mind that create negative

feelings in your soul and can even create negative effects in your body. Remember this, "As a person thinks in

their heart, so they will be." (Prov. 23:7) If you think good thoughts, you will have good feelings. If you think bad thoughts, you will have bad feelings. If you practice this, you will find that it works!

The Holy Spirit has been given to enable you to overcome everything you face. Trust Him to do that. Stay

in worship, in the word and in prayer, and watch God work!!

The promise of God is sure, "He who has begun a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ

Jesus." (Phil. 1:6). He started His work in you, and He will bring it to completion.

Amen!

May you continue to grow in the love and deepen in your knowledge of God.


Holds his language, sweet honey,

He had a radical encounter with Jesus Christ at Rhodes University in South Africa in 1983, and a long-term vision was birthed to use creative writing for the extension of the Kingdom of God. After graduating with a Bachelor of Journalism & Media Studies degree, he went to work at one of the country's leading newspapers, The Rand Daily Mail, but his passion was to be involved in Christian publishing.



PART I

Michael Faraday



"Since peace is alone in the gift of God; and as it is He who gives it, why should we be afraid? His unspeakable gift in His beloved Son is the ground of no doubtful hope."

Early years

Faraday was born in Newington Butts, which is now part of the London Borough of Southwark; he didn't come from a rich family, however he grew up in a very rich spiritual upbringing, as his father, James, was a member of the Glassite sect of Christianity. The Glassite sect was a Christian sect. They believed in literal interpretation of the scriptures, that everyone should be answerable to Jesus Christ and were very devoted to worship. The family were devout Christians and worshipped at a small chapel four kilometres away.

James Faraday moved his wife and two children to London during the winter of 1790-1791 from Outhgill in Westmorland, where he had been an apprentice to the village blacksmith. Poor health prevented Michael's father, a blacksmith, from working full-time, which caused financial hardship for his family. Michael Faraday, the third child of four having only the most basic of school educations, had to largely educate himself. At fourteen Faraday became apprenticed to a local bookbinder and bookseller George Riebau in Blandford St and, during his seven-year apprenticeship, he read many books, including Isaac Watts' 'The Improvement of the Mind,' and he enthusiastically implemented the principles and

suggestions that it contained. He developed an interest in science, especially in electricity. In particular, his main inspiration was the *Conversations on Chemistry* by Jane Marcet.

Engaged in Science

At the age of twenty, in 1812, at the end of his apprenticeship, Faraday attended lectures by the famous English chemist Sir Humphry Davy of the Royal Institution and Royal Society, and John Tatum, founder of the City Philosophical Society. William Dance one of the founders of the Royal Philharmonic Society gave Faraday these tickets to see the lecturers. Afterwards, Faraday sent Davy a three hundred page book based on notes taken during the lectures. Davy's reply was immediate, kind, and favourable. When Davy damaged his eyesight in an accident with nitrogen trichloride, he decided to employ Faraday as a secretary. When John Payne, one of the Royal Institution's assistants, was sacked, Sir Humphry Davy was asked to find a replacement. He appointed Faraday as Chemical Assistant at the Royal Institution on 1 March 1813.

In the class-based English society of the time, Faraday was not considered a gentleman due to his poor social status that when Davy went on a long tour to the continent in 1813–15, his valet did not wish to go. Faraday was going as Davy's scientific assistant, and was asked to act as Davy's valet until a replacement could be found in Paris. Faraday was forced to fill the role of valet as well as assistant throughout the trip. Jane Apreece Davy's wife refused to treat Faraday as an equal. She mistreated him by making him travel outside the coach, eat with the servants, etc and generally made Faraday so miserable that he contemplated returning to England alone and giving up science altogether. However regardless of the discrimination he was facing the trip did, however, give him access to the European scientific elite and a host of stimulating ideas.

Early Experiments

No matter how hard the trip dented Faraday's confidence he still continued to do science due to the positive experiences he had. When Faraday worked with Davy as an assistant he made a special study and discovered two new chlorides of carbon. This soon led to a mass load of discoveries that would shape our world. He succeeded in liquefying several gases and produced several new kinds of glass intended for optical purposes. A specimen of one of these heavy glasses afterwards became historically important as the substance in which Faraday detected the polarisation of light (the direction that the light wave is vibrating) when the glass was placed in

a magnetic field, and also as the substance that was first repelled by the poles of the magnet.

Faraday invented an early form of what was to become the Bunsen burner, which is used almost universally in science laboratories as a convenient source of heat. He worked extensively in the field of chemistry, discovering chemical substances such as benzene (which is used in rubbers, lubricants, dyes, detergents, drugs, explosives, napalm, and pesticides.) among other things, and liquefying gases such as chlorine. He also discovered the laws of electrolysis and popularised terminology such as anode, cathode, electrode, and ion, terms largely created by William Whewell. Faraday is best known for his work with electricity and magnetism. The first experiment that he recorded was the construction of a voltaic pile with seven halfpence pieces, stacked together with seven disks of sheet zinc, and six pieces of paper moistened with salt water. With this pile he decomposed sulphate of magnesia

Religious Beliefs

However regardless of his scientific mindset Faraday was a devout Christian as evidenced in his upbringing with his father who was a member of the Glassite sect. Well after his marriage, he served as Deacon and two terms as an Elder in the meeting house of his youth. His church was located at Paul's Alley in the Barbican. This meeting house relocated in 1862 to Barnsbury Grove, Islington. This North London location is where Faraday served the final two years of his second term as Elder prior to his resignation from that post. According to many biographers Faraday who was a member of the Sandermanian Church and was a very devoted Christian that they state that "a strong sense of the unity of God and nature pervaded Faraday's life and work." However, he kept his science and his religion separate, holding that God was not knowable through science. Faraday married Sarah Barnard (1800-1879) on 12 June 1821, although they would never have children. They met through their families at the Sandemanian church. He confessed his faith to the Sandemanian congregation the month after he married.

(Not that I ever would do that might I add!) but what I have learnt is that by saying nothing can be badly misinterpreted and often when you are saying nothing, then agreement with the persons views and mindset is quite often the case – well at least that's what they go away thinking – thus you've added fuel to their fire and argument which they want recognition of being right in.

Over time I've been caught in such similar discussions that have really little value except to tear down and destroy. The bible teaches us the exact opposite to this and says 'Build one another up' – 1 Thes 5.

We have to learn to look at things a little more objectively. We really need to know and understand the heart of the matters that often turn up in these kinds of conversations. We have to understand and know the people who may be being criticised and put ourselves in their shoes.

If we're really to understand God and if we are being transformed into his image then we really need to understand this characteristic of him which was displayed to Moses when he took the stone tables up the mountain. Ex 34v6 and he passed in front of Moses, proclaiming, "The LORD, the LORD, the compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger, abounding in love and faithfulness!"

God's compassion and grace, his love and faithfulness – 4 amazing characteristics of who he is! Surely each one of those could help us a little. What is it to show compassion and grace? What would it be like to show love to those who may be critical of others. How can we be faithful to those who are being criticised and to the person pointing the finger?

The characteristic that I left out there that I want to explore a



little bit more is the one which says 'Slow to anger'. It's something I have learned a little. To me it is the first step. The first one to tackle, understand and get to grips with. When we can understand how to be 'slow to anger' we often can step easily into the areas of compassion, love and grace.

You see if you get angered by something, you can't always think straight. People act more irrationally when they are angry. I've often said in my mind, "I'm not going to get angry about this before I know all the facts and understood the reasons why it is like this." Quite often then as I've taken a step back and looked I've learned so much about myself and others.

This 'Slow to Anger' approach can be a first line of defence! Like a shield against that tongue of fire that you can read about in James 3. How we can understand from that passage how the words we speak can bring people down and destroy rather than build and edify.

We have a choice of what we do with our tongues! "Whoever would love life and see good days must keep their tongue from evil and their lips from deceitful speech." 1 Peter 3v10

It's very easy to get angered about something when the full facts aren't presented or the truth has been watered down or misrepresented. Don't allow your emotions and feelings to be fuel on the fire of something that's burning for the wrong reasons!

There have been times where the truth is that I've agreed with some of the things that have been said, have supported

the arguments that have been presented and allowed anger to build. At that point though I've discovered the other areas can easily override negativity! Sometimes you have to let grace abound. We have to ask of course if the argument of the person we're dealing with is right or wrong. What's the truth of the matter? We measure against the word of God. Not many can do this on the spot so of course we need to take time to think about some of the implications. The next step is being at the stage where you can turn a criticism around and into a positive and help that person see the good things in why something is being done in a particular way.

Especially in the area of leadership! There are many people who are tearing down leadership. Of course we've seen leadership in our churches often in bad press when at the end of day we're all human – but there are many good leaders out there who want to lead positively, see change, growth, good teaching, discipleship and all the rest.

This is where the heart of a true servant can eclipse all of this. Sometimes a leader will get things wrong. Take a wrong direction. Make a mistake. But we have to know their hearts and intentions. We have to understand that they are balancing a much bigger picture than we can see. Give them a break and let them get on with the job! (Of course if the issues are much more serious they have to be addressed – I'm not talking about morality here, but smaller issues)

There are times to speak out. There are times to ask questions, to correct or to share what's on our minds. But the right way of doing this is by going to the person we take issue with. This has been the very answer that I've given to more and more people in recent years when it comes to this stuff. "I'm really sorry but I don't agree with what you are saying... Can I suggest the best thing is that you go and speak to them yourself about it..." or "It's actually not how you see it and I'm sure if you go and chat with them, you'll understand why".

If the enemy is going to attack us in any area of course he will try and cause us to rise against each other and tear one another down. God in our lives, in our characteristics and approach is the weapon against Him!

A COMPLETE GOSPEL

He defended the cause of the poor and needy, and so all went well. Is that not what it means to know me?" declares the LORD. (Jeremiah 22:16)

Over the beginning of this year I was recommended a book to add to the 'must read' pile - 'The Hole in Our Gospel' by Rich Stearns. As I find myself at the midway point I am repeatedly challenged, continually shocked and often broken.

During the first twenty something years of my Christian life I busied myself for God - or so I thought. I was a regular attendee at services, involved in leadership, helping where I could and so on. I believed I was living life to the full and serving my God to the very best of my ability. It wasn't without its blips here and there and there were occasions when the path was somewhat bumpy – but onwards I went! Nearly three years ago that changed dramatically when God faced me with the horrors of child sexual exploitation in Cambodia and the wider world. I didn't realise then that there are two-million young children around our world being sold for sex to predators who seek to satisfy their carvings through this avenue. This issue is not confined to countries thousands of miles away to children who we will never see and meet. It is happening under our noses to children in our own nations.

For me this represented a major paradigm shift in the way I approached my faith. No longer did church services present the complete picture. I begin to realise that my life was only partially fulfilling the call that God places on each and every one of us. We spend way too much time looking to God for direction of what to do and where to go. Don't get me wrong on this matter – I wholly recognise the need to seek God in all things – but sometimes we have just got to get busy.

As I read Scripture now I see that it is littered with directions about feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, providing shelter for the homeless and speaking up for those who have no voice. God has already spoken to us countless times through his Word and now it's a time to act. I like Pastor Bill Wilson's posture on this when he says 'The need is the call'.

All we need to do is take a look across the street, turn on the news or pick up a book to see the often burning needs of others around the globe for which Christ died. One person every 4 seconds dies because they have no clean water, one every 30 seconds of malaria, two million die of TB yearly – and so it goes on. Each of these is preventable.

I am faced with the question, "Are you willing to be open to Gods will in your life?" A question we could answer without thinking – but that's what I'm asking you to do. Think this through before you answer. Are you willing to lay it all down and follow Gods will? Am I?


Two-million children violated many times every day. It's easy to lose sight of this a mountain too hard to climb. It is also easy to get back to our everyday lives and forget that this is going on. These faceless and nameless children

who we will never know are not in our constant field of vision and subsequently are easily forgotten. Children like Champei who in one instance was indebted to her employer for \$6 — an amount that ultimately kept her captive for two years, forced into prostitution, facing sexual exploitation by up to 10 men each night. Eventually, a police raid on the brothel set her free, only to put her on the street alone, yet again.

With nowhere to go, she was trafficked again and forced to work in yet another brothel. But three things are certain:

- Children like Champei represent individuals created in the image of God and loved by Him
- Each situation has a solution
- Each one of us has a responsibility and can make a significant difference.

A couple of weeks ago, I was in my son's bedroom praying about some difficulties that I had been having. I was kneeling on the carpeted floor but my knees soon got tired so I sat back on my heels to give them a rest. I noticed that the wooden ledge on the window was chipped quite badly underneath. I hadn't noticed this whilst on my knees but dropping down a little made this guite visible. The Lord spoke to me and said sometimes it is good to change tact or behaviours because we notice things that we have not noticed before. We can notice problems, hindrances or even revelation from looking things at a different angle. (On a side note, it is interesting that the lower I got, the more I noticed the chipping. Sometimes we need to humble ourselves before God so that He can lift us up). For the last few days, the Holy Spirit kept leading me to the scripture in Isaiah 42:18 20 which reads:

"Hear you deaf, look you blind who do not see... You have seen many things but pay no attention, your ears are open but you do not listen."

Many of you know that sometimes we pray and pray about our problems, but God doesn't seem to answer. This incident showed me that in some instances: maybe we need to look at things differently. We can be gazing straight ahead and not see anything. This is especially true when we worry. Worry clouds not only our judgment but from seeing the true glory of God. I remember a time when my husband and I decided to migrate from Zimbabwe to Europe. We did not have much money, but we talked about the move a lot and I knew that it was

God's wish. One day, the Lord reminded me that I had many wedding presents at the top of my cupboard that I had never even opened. The Holy Spirit told me to sell them and that is what I did and six months later, I was in Northern Ireland. I was blind and I needed the revelation of Jesus to see what was right before me.

You have all heard the expression "new level, new devil." When I dropped down on my heels, I saw a problem that needed to be dealt with. If humble ourselves and walk righteousness, the enemy will bring about a new problem, but we thank God for His grace to see us through. He shows us the chips before things really crack up and tumble all around us. He reveals things that are hidden from our sight, but not from His.

A child that is misbehaving may be a sign of deeper problems. We may be worried about the child losing his way, but God may be pointing out things that need to be dealt with beneath the exterior. Trouble at work may cause stress, but it may be God pointing you to a different career that will lead you to walking in your destiny. I usually pray and read the word in the bath or in the sitting room, but this time. I was in my son's bed room. Closing word? Get out of your comfort zone and you will discover things that could change your life forever. It may mean bigger battles, but that just means bigger triumphs.
