

In the meantime on behalf of the team at 3-in-1 The Voice, we wish each of our readers a very happy and peaceful Easter...

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
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

HISTORY OF THE MISSIONARY Part 1

According to the documents of the Lausanne Committee for World Evangelization, the biblical authority for missions begins quite early in Genesis 12:1-3, in which Abraham is blessed so that through him and his descendants, all the "peoples" of the world would be blessed.

In this view, the early historical Jewish mission is that of being a people placed in the midst of the other nations, situated so that they could proclaim the Creator God that blessed them. This view is confirmed in many OT scriptures, (for example, Exodus 19:4-6, and Psalm 67) as well as the nature of the temple (its outer court was "the court of the gentiles").

Several teachers including John R. W. Stott believe that a prominent prophecy in the Old Testament often unfolds continually and is certainly manifested in three situations, an immediate historical situation following the prophecy, a church-based intermediate situation, and an eschatological, end-of-time situation. Of course, Gen. 12:1-3 is such a prominent passage. One of the first Christian missionaries was St. Paul. He contextualized the gospel for the Greek and Roman cultures, permitting it to reach beyond its Hebrew and Jewish context.

In the early Christian era, most missions were by monks. Monasteries followed disciplines and supported missions, libraries and practical research, all of which were perceived as works to reduce human misery and suffering, thus enhancing the reputation of God. For example, Nestorian communities evangelized much of North Africa. Cistercians evangelized much of Northern Europe, as well as developing most of European agriculture's classic techniques.

In the 16th century the proselyization of Asia was linked to the Portuguese colonial policy. With the Papal bull Romanus Pontifex the patronage for the propagation of the Christian faith in Asia was given to the Portuguese, who were rewarded with the right of conquest. The Portuguese trade with Asia was profitable and as Jesuits came to India around 1540the colonial government in Goa supported the mission with incentives for baptized Christians Later, Jesuits were


sent to China and further countries in Asia. With the decline of the Portuguese power other colonial powers and Christian organisations gain influence. After the Reformation, for nearly a hundred years, occupied by their struggle with the Roman Catholic Church, the Protestant churches were not missionary-sending churches. But in the centuries that followed, the Protestant churches began sending missionaries in increasing numbers, spreading the proclamation of the Christian message to previously unreached people. In North America, missionaries to the native Americans included Jonathan Edwards, the well known preacher of the Great Awakening, who in his later years retired from the very public life of his early career. He became a missionary to the Housatonic Native Americans and a staunch advocate for them against cultural imperialism.

As European culture has been established in the midst of indigenous peoples, the cultural distance between Christians of differing cultures has been difficult to overcome. One early solution was the creation of segregated "praying towns" of Christian natives. This pattern of grudging acceptance of converts was repeated in Hawaii later when missionaries from that same New England culture went there. In Spanish colonization of the Americas, the Catholic missionaries selected and learned among the languages of the Amerindians and devised writing systems for them. Then they preached to them in those languages (Quechua, Guarani, and Nahuatl) instead of Spanish, to keep Indians away from "sinful" whites. An extreme case was the Guarani Reductions, a theocratic semiindependent region established by the Jesuits.

From 1732 onwards the Moravian Church began sending out missionaries. Around 1780, an indigent Baptist cobbler named William Carey began reading about James Cook's Polynesian journeys. His interest grew to a furious sort of "backwards homesickness", inspiring him to obtain Baptist orders, and eventually write his famous 1792 pamphlet, "An Enquiry into the Obligation of Christians to use Means for the Conversion of Heathen." Far from a dry book of theology, Carey's work used the best available geographic and ethnographic data to map and count the number of people who had never heard the Gospel. It formed a movement that has grown with increasing speed from his day to the present.

Carey's example was followed by a number of missions to seaside and port cities. The China Inland Mission (later the 'Overseas Missionary Fellowship') is one of the more famous.

Messianic Moment By Dr Howard Morgan

The Resurrection of Jesus Hoax or History
Part 1

Imagine yourself a judge facing a courtroom filled with attentive spectators. They are intently listening for your verdict as you weigh the facts presented by the prestigious attorney. He speaks to you: "The issue before you, your Honour, is the case of the Resurrection of Jesus. Was it a hoax? Or is it history? Your Honour, you must base your decision upon the evidence presented. We expect you to be impartial, to weigh the facts as they are without prejudice."

Please remember this, the meaning of the resurrection is a theological matter, but the fact of the resurrection is an historical matter. The question must be decided upon by the historical evidence.

Who are our Witnesses?

In evaluating evidence, we must consider not only what the witness says but also his character and his trustworthiness. Ancient historians were usually paid by royalty who desired to be flattered. They were not motivated to make truth known. The New Testament writers were not paid by anyone. On the contrary, they risked loss of liberty and even death for what they wrote. No impartial court could lightly dismiss the evidence of witnesses ready to suffer such hardships for what they assert. They declare unanimously that they saw, heard, and touched the reality of Jesus' resurrection. If we trust pagan historians whose motives are suspect, why not trust historians whose motives are pure – as evidenced by their willingness to suffer.

We have only three options when it comes to examining the disciples' trustworthiness as eyewitnesses:

- 1) Either they were all liars motivated by some evil desire, or
- 2) They themselves were deceived, or
- 3) Their testimony is the truth.
- Would liars knowingly preach that which would bring them hardship, suffering, persecution, torture and death? Not likely! Liars would proclaim that which would ensure their own comfort and prosperity. Liars would even change their message to avoid negative responses, yet the disciples

adamantly proclaimed the resurrection message despite the reaction it brought.

- 2. Could they have been deceived? Many have said that they all suffered hallucinations wanting to see Jesus so badly. But the nature of a hallucination is that it distorts understanding and brings confusion. It does not bring positive transformation as in the case of the disciples. Hallucinations never work to integrate a personality - they are signs of personality disintegration, i.e., psychosis - and certainly never impart a new hope, positive motivation and fearlessness. Before the resurrection the disciples were confused cowards: afterwards they were confident and fearless. Moreover, these men were not likely candidates for such mental confusion. They were practical, down-to-earth, hardworking fishermen, pragmatic businessmen; sceptics themselves, whose lack of faith and other character flaws were often rebuked by Jesus himself. At the first hearing of the resurrection none of them believed. Only after personal encounters with the resurrected Jesus, did they believe.
- 3. The disciples report that at different times and places, sometimes together, sometimes apart, they had very similar experiences. The nature of hallucinations is not like this. Each hallucination would be as different in nature as the men themselves. They would not have uniform experience. They report that they talked to, listened to, ate with, and even touched the Resurrected Jesus. Could eleven men have the same detailed experiences with the resulting transformation, and it be a mental delusion? Would not one of them doubt the 'reality' of his experience under the pressures of intense persecution? They knew the reality of these experiences. They could not doubt. Thus the only logical conclusion we can come to is that the disciples were not liars and they were not deceived. They simply told the truth of their experiences. Jesus rose from the dead!

'He is not here, but is risen!' Luke 24:6

PASTOR BILL WILSON

Snr Pastor & Founder – METRO MINISTRIES

Bill Wilson is the People's Pastor...In one of the World's most deprived and violent ghettos he has literally driven, encouraged and ministered to the children and people of Brooklyn at his church to hear about the love of Jesus for over 40 years. The yellow cabs of New York are famous around the world but with his unparalleled commitment to Christ, Bill Wilson has ensured that another vehicle - a Yellow Sunday School bus has almost replaced the iconic status of the NY yellow cabs! Mugged, attacked and even shot, Pastor Bill Wilson is undaunted. With over 160 full-time staff in New York and bases all around the world, the work of saving these children both physically and spiritually continues.

A great teacher and expounder of the Word of God, I had the privilege in January to interview Pastor Bill in Ballymena, Co. Antrim. Little did anyone know that just 48 hours before this interview, the Haiti Earthquake would strike, sending the region and Metro Ministries (who have a base out there) into chaos. 3-in-1 The Voice has decided to ensure, that you the reader have the opportunity to read this unique interview in its entirety, and therefore we will be incorporating all of it into a Part 1 & Part 2 series, with a special emphasis on the Haiti Disaster, which still needs urgent support...

Q1 Firstly thank you so much Pastor for agreeing to take time out of your busy schedule in Ireland. I would like to ask first of all for our readers who are not familiar with you or your work, what was the defining moment when you came to know The Lord Jesus Christ and accept Him as your Lord and saviour?

Right, well my mother left me on a street corner when I was 12 years old in Florida. She was an alcoholic, she left me on a street corner and never came back. I sat on the corner for 3 days of all the people that drove by, of all the people that walked by only one man stopped, he was a Christian. He was on his way home from work, he ended up getting me some food paying my way through Christian Youth Camp. That evening it was five hours after the original connection after he stopped that was first where I heard the story of Christ and accepted Him as my personal saviour. That was in 1961

Q2 How did you establish Metro Ministries?

'I have been in the ministry 42 years and I had worked in two of the largest churches in America up 'til that point. Then around 1980 I just realised that there's a bigger need in the inner cities of America as there is anywhere in the world. Most of the folks said it was hopeless, these kids were hopeless, the neighbourhoods were hopeless and I said 'no they just don't have any hope'. So I decided to just pack up and went alone to New York. I had no connections no denominational support, no help, and I thought 'well let's give it a try'. So I went there I rented a building went to the church on Saturday in one of the toughest neighbourhoods in New York City and got started! Rented some buses, rented a building got a couple of drug addicts to help me hand out flyers to the kids during the week. The first weekend we had Sunday School we had 1002 kids that showed up on the first day, so that's how we started. We now average 40,000 in all of our locations, so that's within 30



Q3 Whenever Jesus Christ walked this earth He frequently went into places and situations that no-one else would. How important is the practical witness of Christ in your life and the work you do, how does that relate to what you do?

'I think because we live in that neighbourhood, we don't live in a nice neighbourhood and commute to the ghetto, I've lived always in an old abandoned warehouse. Our entire staff lives there 160 full time staff. By living there you automatically become salt and light, and that's where most Christians miss it cause they isolate themselves and insulate themselves from the world. Most Christians, their friends are other Christians! Whereas we have embedded ourselves into this neighbourhood, into that part of society, into that culture, and just by our very presence has created a witness that those people have never seen before. So it's quite extraordinary, that's why the adult church has grown the way it is, why Metro Ministries is now growing around the world. What is known as 'Kid's Clubs' here in the UK was actually started by people coming to New York 15 years ago who read my book 'Whose Child is this?' and realising what's being done in New York could be duplicated in the UK. They came and they started it in Liverpool and now it's known as Kid's Club all over the United Kingdom.

Q4 So just leading on from that would you consider then that your main role would be to envisage other people and try and encourage them to do the same?

No it's a by product, that's all it is — it was never our dream or our desire I mean how would we have known, when we started out. I mean you don't even know if you're going to live or die, let alone get a ministry that's been duplicated. There's an Asian Sunday School Association over in China last year it selected us as one of the 10 most influential mission organisations in the world today. Now I mean who would known that 30 years ago. We were just trying to survive, raise money, get people, make connections but as the Lord continues to open doors and we walk through them — and that was one thing I always say the need is the call. I saw a need, I stepped up. That was the call of God for me at that point. Big doors open on very small hinges, unfortunately most Christians never find the will of God in their life, cause they're waiting for the big door to open, the

audible voice, the burning bush, if they would just do the thing, the small thing today that God opens for them that opens the next door, that opens a succession of doors that moves them into where they need to be; and most Christians aren't smart enough to know that.

Q4 You have literally been on the front line in NYC for many years and been attacked and even shot. You

have stated that there have been times you just wanted to give up, what convinced you to stay?

You're commitment has to be stronger than your emotions. That's why most Christian's don't stick at anything, cause the minute it, doesn't feel right, they're tired, somebody spits in their face or slaps

them hit them in the head, they take it personally and they go... it's nothing to do with how I feel, when you

make a commitment, your commitment has to override whatever emotions you're dealing with. For church folks it's a decision...

HEROES



"Amazing Grace how sweet the sound that saved a wretch like me. I once was lost by now I'm found was blind but now I see." When I first heard these words I never knew what they meant but after hearing about the writer John Newton and his testimony I knew that this song was not just about how God saved him, but, also as well about how God saved me! I decided to look into the story of how such a man came to write such a hymn that has touched inspired and moved the world ever since.



EARLY LIFE

John Newton was born in London July 24 1725 he was the son of John Newton Senior a commander of a merchant ship, which sailed the Mediterranean and Elizabeth Newton

(nee Seatclife) a

devout nonconformist Christian. His mother was a shy woman who lovingly read the Bible to her son and sang hymns with him and gave him religious instruction. She died of tuberculosis when John Newton was only six-years-old. At the age of eleven John went to sea with his father and made six voyages before his father retired.

NAVY CAREER

Newton's father made plans for his son to become a slave master at a sugar plantation in Jamaica. However Newton did not comply and instead became a captain of a slave ship. In 1733, while on his way to visit some friends Newton was captured and forced into the naval service by the royal navy. He became a midshipman of the man-of-war (the most powerful type of armed ship from the 16th to the 19th centuries) the HMS Harwich.

Newton found the conditions on the man-of-war intolerable and attempted to desert his duties. He was found out and then striped to the waist, tied to the grating; he received a public flogging in front of the crew of 350 and was given ninety-six lashes and reduced to the rank of a common seaman. Following the disgrace and humiliation Newton initially contemplated suicide. He soon recovered both physically and mentally and at his own request transferred to the "Pegasus" a slave ship bound for West Africa. The ship carried goods to Africa, and traded the goods for slaves to be shipped to England and other countries.

Newton was problematic for the Pegasus crew to the point that they left him in West Africa with a slave merchant Amos Clowe. Clowe took Newton and gave him to his wife the African Duchess Princess Peye. Newton was abused and mistreated along with the other slaves; at this point Newton said that he was a non-believer and a libertine, a servant of slaves in West Africa. Early in 1748 a sea captain who had been asked by Newton's father to search for him rescued John Newton.

THAT 10TH OF MARCH

Sailing back home on the merchant ship "The Greyhound" John Newton was going to mark a very important night in his life. Although his mother had given him some religious instruction in his early years, since her death he had long given up any religious convictions. On March 10th he was about to experience what he would refer to for the rest of his life as his "great deliverance."

Newton's words about that date and that experience were

'That 10th of March...is a day much to be remembered by me; and I have never allowed it to pass unnoticed since the year 1748. For on that day the Lord came from on high and delivered me out of deep waters."

Dave Bemment is a Christian and runs the UK's most successful Christian Celebrity Agency. Established in 1998 Dave helps the kingdom by bridging the gap between the celebrity and the church. offering the celebrities a unique opportunity to give of their talents and be a powerful witness and role model not only to believer but the non-believer. In an exclusive interview 3-in-1 The Voice asked Dave all about the The Lighthouse Agency...

Q Firstly Dave how did you first get involved in working with celebrities?

A It all started in 1989 - my job at the time was a General Manager of a Jaguar Car dealership in Chelmsford. We had raised some money for Children In Need and needed a celebrity to receive the cheque. Helen Shapiro lived a few miles away and she agreed to come in for a photo session for the handover of the cheque.

To cut a long story short, it turned out that Helen and her husband - actor John Judd were Christians, and Helen wanted to set up a more formal Christian management company to take some of the administrative weight off her husband John who managed her gospel gigs. Helen also wanted to make a Gospel album.

Having experience of business I got involved and it went from there - Manna Music was born and I have 4 invaluable years of learning about show business, recording etc from Helen's husband John, which set me up for the future ministry that God had planned for me.

The Lighthouse Agency is a unique type of business, how would you best describe it?

It is a bit different to the norm - The Lighthouse acts as a bridge between Churches and celebrities. There are several Christians who are well known in their particular field and would love to go out and give their testimony/story but don't have the contacts or wherewithal to do so .Equally churches would love to have a special guest but don't know how to contact them or what to do in organising events. We act as the bridge – we are the management agent for the guests and an advice line/facilitator for the Churches.

Q How long has the Lighthouse Agency been established?

A I went on from Manna Music in 1993 to help set up Connections Personal Management, and then independently set up The Lighthouse Agency in 1998.

Q Do you make first contact with a celebrity or do they come to you?

A it depends – sometimes a celebrity hears about us and contacts us and sometimes we hear that they are a Christian and we offer our services to them. This may sound a bit pie in the sky - but it's not - we feel that ultimately God puts us in touch with each other. We have very strict criteria for taking on representation and like to feel that all our quests are reliable in every sense

Q When you conduct an interview for a church with a celebrity do you have a set format i.e. questions etc that you always follow or is each interview different?

It depends on the guest - but it is usually different in every case. . The interviewers are very experienced and the questions asked and the format used, are

carefully put together and are tried and tested. The main aim is to get the whole of the celebrities story out in a clear, understandable and professional presentation so that all the audience, irrespective of age or whether they are used to Church or not, can understand fully.

Q Do you feel that The Lighthouse Agency could be considered a beacon to the unbeliever as well as a blessing to the Church? If so how?

A We often say that our ministry is the first step in evangelism — i.e. awareness of the central message of the Church — the Gospel. Often our guests are the catalyst for people attending who would not normally attend a Church event. Our presentations are clear and non-threatening — by this I mean that non -church goers will be made to feel comfy and listen to often inspiring stories about real life from ordinary people with a high profile reputation. Often the general public can identify with the guest's story and this can be a real help for them in dealing with their own problems/needs.

Q Finally Dave, are there any other branches of The Lighthouse Agency in the world and do you have plans to expand this to other countries?

A None to my knowledge. Every country is different and I feel that we have our hands full in covering the UK

Men Hurt Too...

Last week, the news that, after forty years of loving fidelity a friend's marriage had crashed against the jagged rock of adultery, sent shock waves through our circle of friends. Initially, details were sketchy and it surprised me that, the female members of our group immediately assumed the husband was at fault. But then, isn't that the way it has always been? After all, throughout history, men have had a reputation for possessing a roving eye and an inherent weakness to wander. Princes and Kings as far back as David and as recent as Charles, could not resist the allure of forbidden fruit.

But, the sight of our friend's unshaven face and red rimmed eyes, revealed the truth. Women, as well as men, are equally prone to temptation. Still, regardless of gender, the chief consequence of an adulterous affair is pain. The Bible may be silent on the pang of marital jealousy that ripped through King David's palace but there is no doubt that the death of their baby caused his mistress an immeasurable amount of grief. In more recent history, the sad eyes of a princess revealed that betrayal had lost none of its sting.

Nevertheless, while a husband's surrender to seduction pricks the most sensitive part of the female heart, a similar weakness on his wife's part, kicks at the very core of masculinity. Both sexes may wrestle with the aftermath of severed trust but many men have the added burden of hiding their grief. It may be socially acceptable for a woman to vent her heartache with an avalanche of tears but somewhere there is an unwritten law that men must maintain a stiff upper lip and absorb the blow.

Recently, a candid and emotional interview with Mr. Peter Robinson, Northern Ireland's First Minister, proved that even a seasoned politician is no match for the backlash of an adulterous affair. Throughout his career, Mr. Robinson has proved an able contender, delivering as well as receiving many political wounds. But judging by his haggard expression and pain filled eyes; the deepest cut of all was wielded by the woman he loves.

A forty five, John Cameron can empathise with the Minister's struggle to come to terms with his feelings. "My wife and I had been together for fifteen years when she confessed to having a brief affair. I have to confess the upper most feeling was shock. I just couldn't get my head round the fact that my wife had slept with another man. I mean to say, I would have trusted her with my life. I found myself scanning her face, searching for the woman I thought I'd known but all I could see was a stranger. Initially, I was numb but

as the shock began to wear off I felt a fury I'd never known before. I was surprised that I was capable of such anger. I said some terrible things but all I wanted was for her to feel a little of the pain she'd inflicted on me. Friends tried to comfort me but their words sounded hollow and meaningless. All I wanted to do was get my old life back. It may sound stupid but I wanted to feel like a man again. Many nights I cried myself to sleep, stifling the sobs in case our son heard them. Tears may have washed away some of my pent up emotions but they didn't do much for my self esteem. I was brought up to believe a man should be strong and in control of his feelings. I now know that gender doesn't come into it. I think being able to cry goes a long way toward healing. It's nature's way of easing the pressure. In the end, we decided that our marriage was worth saving. Trust had been severely wounded but it wasn't dead but there was no short cut to finding a new basis for our relationship. We just kept searching and eventually found enough to let us beain "



No doubt many men, like Peter Robinson are trying to find a way through their pain. But others like John have travelled the same path have proved that, with time it is possible to emerge from the maze and start laying the foundation for a second chance at happiness.

Yet it was impossible to look into the eyes of our friend without realizing that he knew what it's like to cry. The only difference is that he usually weeps alone. When forty five year old John, a seasoned barrister and well used to controlling his emotion, discovered that his wife had cheated on him, he wasn't prepared for the emotional onslaught.

"We'd been married fifteen years and as far as I was concerned, were a happily married couple. Granted, in the early years, we did have a lot of stress as money was tight and I had to spend long hours at work building my career. Ironically, it wasn't during those stressful periods that my wife chose to have an affair. Maybe I could have understood it better".

One of our newest projects to help raise funds is our BAKE A DIFFERENCE Project.

One of the basic necessities of life - FOOD. Tons of it is wasted every day in the western world. Unsold food thrown into skips; large quantities thrown into household waste bins, every day ending up on landfill sites. In the UK alone 30-40% of all food is never eaten and as of 5 years ago, over 17 million tons of food was being ploughed into landfill sites annually. Across the other side of the world, for example in the Philippines where Metro Ministries works among children living in the garbage dumps in Manila, every



day our children and their families forage for food among the tons of rubbish dumped every day. We hold Sidewalk Sunday School right there in the middle of the garbage dumps.

It is of no effect to tell these people Jesus loves them and then leave them hungry or thirsty. We have to address this need...In some of the poorest areas in Romania live the Roma gypsies, another area where Metro Ministries

holds Sidewalk Sunday School. While we are giving them the bread of life and teaching them about the love of God, there is a truck that stands behind the Sunday school truck where we bake 400 loaves of bread an hour. The recipe is nutritionally enriched and fortified so that if all the family has to eat that day is this loaf of bread, they would receive all the nutrients their body needs. So, we feed them the Bread of life to feed their souls, and then feed their bodies with the bread that sustains their physical bodies.

Thousands of Christian pilgrims every year from all nations around the World would come to meet at the Old City of Jerusalem so that they can celebrate the Holy Week of Easter. The places where they celebrate are at the biblical sites of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection

As well as international visitors, Jerusalem also welcomes hundreds of Palestinian Christians from Bethlehem, the site of Jesus' birth. However, their pilgrimage is often determined more political rather than that of religious considerations, which is why Israeli security forces frequently restrict Palestinian visitor permits as tensions tend to run high on a regular basis.

These important festivals in Holy Week in Jerusalem start on Palm Sunday, which is one week before Easter Sunday and this follows with a pilgrim procession from the Mount of Olives, to the Old City.



Good Friday. pilgrims would retrace the steps that Jesus took while He walked along the cobbled stoned Via Dolorosa, carrying the cross. During this moving Via Dolorosa procession, pilgrims can be seen

carrying large wooden crosses - some as big as15 feet tall. What is more moving is that they also recite prayers at each of the fourteen Stations of the Cross. The re-enacted march along the Stations of the Cross is one of the many features of Jerusalem's most historic sites.

This procession starts at the Sanctuary of the Flagellation, this is the place where Jesus was judged, brutally beaten and scourged. procession then ends at the Church of Holy Sepulchre, this is where Jesus was stripped off His garments, He was then nailed to the cross and died.

According to the Roman Catholic and Orthodox traditions. Jesus was buried in the chamber of the sepulchre and was later resurrected from there, and this makes the Church of the Holy Sepulchre a focal point of the modern day pilgrimage. Protestant denominations believe that Jesus was buried in the nearby Garden Tomb.



In Palm Sunday, according to tradition, the procession follows the same path that Jesus took on His triumphant return to Jerusalem. As Jesus rode on a donkey two thousand years ago, followers laid palm branches along His path. To this very day, pilgrims march on foot as they wave

palm leaves and olive branches.



Pilgrims and local Christians would celebrate together Jesus' resurrection and His rebirth. There are special vigils and services which are held throughout the Old City, and this

includes more than twenty separate masses are conducted within 24 hours at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, and Christians would go to the Church of the Nativity to hold personal candlelit prayers there.

During the Easter week, Jerusalem's Old City works very hard to accommodate the six Christian sects who are represented in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre: These sects include: Roman Catholic, Armenian Orthodox, Greek Orthodox, Egyptian Coptic, Ethiopian, and Syrian Orthodox. The Eastern and Orthodox churches follow a different calendar than the Protestant and Roman Catholic churches. Their Easter is often as much as two weeks after the Gregorian calendar celebration. This scheduling difference is often the best way to helps to reduce territorial tension in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. The Church also gives each denomination its own separate schedules and space for permitted prayer times.
