
DRIVE FOR COLLECTION

Improve your horses collection for a smoother, more-balanced and eye appealing lope with these tips from NRHA Professional Mirjam Stillo.

From the moment your horse steps into the lope, you want to feel it balance on its hind end and be light in your hands without dropping its shoulders.

he lope is the most important gait in reining. It is the gait in which we perform most of our maneuvers.

The overall picture you present to the judge includes the way your horse performs maneuvers at the lope, and how smoothly and willingly it guides. These are connected to how your horse carries itself.

Our horses need to carry themselves properly to perform maneuvers correctly and in a manner that is pleasing to watch. This is how they receive credits from the judges in the show pen. Not all horses carry themselves correctly at a lope, and that's where we as riders can encourage them to be more balanced.

Look & Feel

The lope needs to have a distinct three-beat gait. We don't want our horses to four-beat or lack forward motion while at the lope. If your horse is not loping in a correct, three-beat gait, that most likely means the horse isn't driving from behind and is heavy in its front end. This can result in a choppy gait that lacks self-carriage.

A horse who is able to drive from behind while loping will have a better elevation in its gait and be slower-legged. It will also have the ability to elevate its shoulders much easier than a horse who is not driving from behind and not lifting its back.

If your horse knows how to collect itself, you need to know what proper collection feels like. Make sure when starting from your lope departure that your horse

is balanced on its hind end, not the front end, and that it's loping in a clean three-beat gait. Check that your horse's shoulder is not dropping to the inside when you lope off or during your circles.

It's really not possible to have a collected horse who is dropping the inside shoulder because that puts the horse out of balance, so this is a great visual to check for collection. You are also looking for the horse to be light in your hands, not pushing down on the reins because its heavy on the front end.

Feeling your horse carrying itself on that three-beat gait without losing its frame or its cadence is the goal.

It's really important to start
teaching a horse collection at an
early stage in its training, typically
after the horse has learned how
to have natural balance and carry
itself properly at a walk, trot and
lope, and through transitions.

A lot of horses have the natural ability to collect, and they do it almost effortlessly; however, some horses need to be taught how to improve their collection and how to balance themselves. It's a long process throughout a horse's 2-and 3-year-old years to guide them toward balance and collection.

Your body position is key to achieving collection. You need to drive with your seat, lining your shoulders up slightly behind your hips. Avoid balancing yourself forward over your horse's shoulders.

You also need to use both legs to encourage collection. A lot of people want to lope off by cueing only with the outside leg. That doesn't really help the horse learn how to collect and perform a correct upward transition, because with a single leg cue, you're really signaling to move laterally more than asking for forward motion.

For a lope departure, it is important to keep a horse from dropping its shoulder with a light cue from your inside leg. Keep in mind, you are not asking for a

side-pass; you're asking for a lope departure — an upward transition that needs forward motion.

Improving Collection

Trot transitions: Long-trotting is good for any stage of a horse's life. Moving from a jog to a long trot and back again teaches the horse how to stretch its stride and come back underneath itself.

I vary these two speeds a lot as I'm warming up or working with horses of any age. You can ask for a jog, then move out into a long trot on straight lines or in big circles, and then back down to a jog for a small circle to teach your horse to balance.

Just doing those transitions and cueing with your seat will help engage your horse's back while long-trotting without breaking into a lope. It is a good exercise to remind your horse to stay collected in the smaller circle without falling into a walk due to a lack of balance.

The counter-bend: Once a horse knows how to do upward and downward trot transitions, I incorporate counter-bending. Start in a small circle at a jog and widen into a larger circle. Then, holding that position, ask your horse to counter-bend in a circle going the other direction. You want the horse to stay collected, know where it's placing its feet and learn how to drive forward while bending both ways.

It's amazing how many older horses haven't done these exercises in a long time, and they may have forgotten how to be coordinated while performing these moves.

You can do these exercises at a lope when your horse is ready, and eventually start alternating between straight lines and counter-canter circles. You should also continue going back to your regular circle, moving back and forth until your horse can easily change directions and positions



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
