Halloween

Halloween is an annual holiday celebrated each year on October 31. It originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honor all saints; soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating, carving jack-olanterns, festive gatherings, donning costumes and eating sweet treats.



Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Day is a national holiday celebrated in Canada, the United States, some of the Caribbean islands, and Liberia. It began as a day of giving thanks for the blessing of the harvest and of the preceding year. Similarly named festival holidays occur in Germany and Japan. Thanksgiving is celebrated on the second Monday of October in Canada and on the fourth Thursday of November in the United States, and around the same part of the year in other places.

Christmas

Christmas is an annual festival commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ, observed primarily on December 25 as a religious and cultural celebration among billions of people around the world. A feast central to the Christian liturgical year, it is preceded by the season of Advent or the Nativity Fast and initiates the season of Christmastide, which historically in the West lasts twelve days and culminates on Twelfth Night in some traditions.

The tradition of the Christmas tree originated Germany in the 16th century, when trees were brought into homes to be decorated. The first person to decorate the Christmas tree with lighted candles is believed to be Martin Luther. Evergreens had been a symbol of life in several ancient religions, such as the Druids.

Most Christmas colors and their meanings come from the western/northern European traditions and customs, when Christmas is in the middle of winter and it's dark and cold. Evergreen plants, like Holly, Ivy and mistletoe have been used for thousands of years to decorate and brighten up buildings during the long dark winter.

Valentine's Day



Valentine's Day, also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is celebrated annually on February 14. Originating as a Western Christian feast day honoring one or two early saints named Valentinus, Valentine's Day is recognized as a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance

and romantic love in many regions around the world, although it is not a public holiday in any country.

Other Important Events on February 14:

- Oregon became the 33rd state admitted to the Union on Valentine's Day of 1859, while Arizona attained its statehood in 1912.
- In 1962, U.S. First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy appeared on the first televised tour inside the White House.
- On Valentine's Day of 1876, Alexander Graham Bell applied for the patent of the telephone.
- On February 14, 1929, Alexander Fleming introduced penicillin.

Vehicle Preparedness for Winter

Emergency Kit for the Car

In case you are stranded, keep an emergency supply kit in your car with the addition of these automobile extras:

- Jumper cables
- Flares or reflective triangle
- Ice scraper
- Cell phone charger
- Cat litter or sand for better tire traction

Have a mechanic check the following on your vehicle prior to an emergency:

- Antifreeze levels
- Battery and ignition system
- Brakes
- Exhaust system
- Fuel and air filters
- Heater and defroster
- Lights and flashing hazard lights
- Oil
- Thermostat
- Windshield wiper equipment and washer fluid level

Driving Safety in Winter

Plan long trips carefully, listening to the radio or television for the latest weather forecasts and road conditions. If bad weather is forecast, drive only if absolutely necessary.

Keep gas tank full in case of evacuation or power outages. A full tank will also keep the fuel line from freezing.

Install good winter tires and ensure they have adequate tread.

Do not drive through flooded areas. Six inches of water can cause a vehicle to lose control or possibly stall. A foot of water will float many cars.

Be aware of areas where floodwaters have receded. Roads may have weakened and could collapse under pressure.

Leaves

Please do not rake or blow leaves onto the street. The sewer drains can get obstructed if leaves accumulate on them. Fill approved paper bags with leaves and place them on the curb on your normal collection day.

Snow

Public sidewalks need to be cleared of snow and ice within 24 hours after a snow event to provide a safe route for your neighbors, school children and postal carriers.

Basic Supply List for Emergency - FEMA

- ✓ Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation.
- Food, at least a three-day supply of nonperishable food
- ✓ Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries.
- ✓ Flashlight and extra batteries.
- ✓ First aid kit
- ✓ Whistle to signal for help
- Dust mask, to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- ✓ Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- √ Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and backup battery.
