## ALLELUIA! CHRIST IS RISEN!

By the time you read this Easter will NOT be over! In fact, you have fifty days to celebrate these days of resurrection. In his famous hymn "Come, You Faithful, Raise the Strain" (LSB 487), St. John of Damascus called Easter "the queen of seasons" (stanza 3). And indeed, it is! Why? Because Easter is the Church's primary celebration of Jesus' triumphant victory over death!

On Easter we recall that early morning when the company of women went to the tomb in search of Jesus' body. Instead of a closed tomb, they find it open and vacant. Two glowing angels appear and greet the women with the good news: Jesus has fulfilled His promise that He must suffer, die, and on the third day rise again (Luke 24)!

Easter Day is the third and final day of the Paschal Triduum - the Latin term for the "three days" from Maundy Thursday evening until Easter Sunday evening. But it's not the last day of Easter! The "Octave of Easter" comes to an end on the following Sunday (eight days).
But Easter isn't over then, either! Rather, the Easter season lasts a full fifty days until the feast of Pentecost, more than counter-balancing the forty days of Lent.

Starting with Jesus' resurrection, the Easter season is filled with the manifestation of Jesus' divine glory. Throughout the fifty days, we hear of Jesus' miracles and His encouragement to the disciples, whether it's on the road to Emmaus, on the Mount of the Ascension, or in the upper room.

The holiday that we now know as "Easter" was originally called Pascha, the Greek word for Passover. Christians carried over the tradition of Paschal, acknowledging Christ as the new Passover Lamb (I Corinthians 5:7).

It's not surprising, then, that Easter traditions sometimes echo Passover traditions: for example, the Jewish date of Passover was based on the lunar cycle, so the date of Easter moves according to the stages of the moon.

Similarly, just as Passover was an eight-day event, so is Easter. The "Octave of Easter" is the name for the eight-day celebration of our Lord's resurrection. The Church fathers saw in these eight days a symbol of a new life and a new creation. And so you are!

One of the characteristic moments of the Easter Sunday service is when the pastor cries out the Paschal Greeting: "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!" The people respond with joy: "He is risen indeed, Alleluia!" This greeting remains the customary Christian greeting throughout the fifty days of Easter. Don't get tired of hearing these words of promise or of responding with joy during these fifty days of Easter because the risen Christ has given us new life! And that is worth celebrating.

# PSALM 4: "PEACE! BE STILL!" 

Peace in Christ to you! Last month you may recall that I began a series for this newsletter on various psalms. Each month I will pick one, and then include a brief blurb of commentary or insight from three sources I routinely use when looking at the psalms. The idea is that you can study the psalm, then check out the first blurb. The next day you can read the psalm again and check out the second blurb, and the third day, you can meditate on the psalm yet again followed by the final blurb. This process should draw us into a deeper appreciation of the individual prayers and songs that make up this deep yet relatable book of Scripture.

On the agenda today: Psalm 4. For my own two cents, ltd like to draw your attention to verse 4 and the translation, "be angry." Note that it can also be translated "tremble," or "be agitated," which I would prefer. Indeed, the context of the verse indicates how quickly anger can disrupt a good night of sleep. So, this Psalm is calling us not to fan our anger into flames, but rather, cool our anger off by putting our trust in the Lord.

Day 1. Study Psalm 4, then consider: "Evening is the occasion but not the main theme of the psalm, which is concerned with inward peace (8) in a distracting situation. The approach of night, with its temptation to brood on past wrongs (4) and present perils, only challenges David to make his faith explicit and to urge it on others, as a committal of one's cause and oneself $(3,8)$ to a faithful Creator. Absalom's revolt, which gave rise to Psalm 3, could still be the background here; for David is, as he was then, humiliated and surrounded by lies (2), exasperation (4) and gloom (6). But such trials can arise on more occasions than one, and. . . in any person's life." Kidner, Derek. Psalms 1-72, Inter Varsity Press, Downers Grove, Illinois, 2008, pp. 71-72.

Day 2. Read Psalm 4, then consider: "The man of faith begins and ends his day on the battlefield; warfare attends him everywhere. Since the very first verse of the very first psalm, the just man has found himself in conflict with the counsel of the ungodly, the way of sinners, the seat of the scornful. In Psalm 4 these latter are described as the 'sons of men' who 'turn my glory into shame.' The reason for this battle is that the just man has been chosen and set aside. He walks not in the counsel of the ungodly. He stands not in the way of sinners. He does not sit in the seat of the scornful. He is not of the world just as Christ is not of the world. 'But know,' says the psalmist, 'that the Lord has set aside the godly for Himself.' . . . . Thus says the 'blessed man' who is the key to the psalms: 'If the world hates you, you know that it hated me before it hated you. If you were of the world, the world would love its own. Yet . . . . you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world." (John $15: 18$ ) Reardon, Patrick Henry. Christ in the Psalms, Conciliar Press, Ben Lomond, California, 2000, pp. 7-8.

Day 3. Meditate on Psalm 4, then consider: "David complains that his enemies are speaking ill of him as king in an attempt to shame him. He reminds them that God sets apart the godly from those who behave in such a manner. How often do we find ourselves speaking ill of people in positions of authority? Of colleagues and peers? God's Word condemns unjust complaints. Through David, God encourages us to turn from our sinful wants and 'trust in the LORD.' Such trust brings peace of mind and eternal peace. ~ You alone, O Lord, make me dwell in safety. Teach me to judge rightly and dwell in peace. Amen." The Lutheran Study Bible. Concordia Publishing House, St. Louis, Missouri, 2009, p. 849.

## VICAR’S APRIL MESSAGE

With the busyness of Lent and Holy week behind us, we now bask fully in the light of our Lord's resurrection as we continue into this Easter season. Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia! The weather is also heating up. Back in Michigan, it would be typical to still have some cold weather during Easter, sometimes even snow! But there is a noticeable difference once Spring comes. Thinking of different seasons, I can't help but ponder the words from Ecclesiastes which I shared with our preschool a few weeks ago:

1 For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:
2 a time to be born, and a time to die;
A time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;
3 A time to kill, and a time to heal;
A time to break down, and a time to build up;
4 a time to weep, and a time to laugh;
A time to mourn, and a time to dance;
5 a time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones together;
A time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;
6 a time to seek, and a time to lose;
A time to keep, and a time to cast away;
7 a time to tear, and a time to sew;
A time to keep silence, and a time to speak;
8 a time to love, and a time to hate;
A time for war, and a time for peace. (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8)
The change of yearly seasons can be refreshing, especially since we know what to expect. But the change of our own personal seasons is difficult. That's because our lives aren't circular like the seasons of the year. When we move from a season in our lives, we won't get that season back. I am experiencing this now with Seamus. He is already 1 year old!!! We will never have that season of being brand new parents with a newborn child ever again. In a way this is sad, but it is also encouraging and comforting, because it shows me and my wife how we got here. The past seasons have brought us to the current season. To embrace nostalgia and long for past seasons of life, where things were "better" from our perspective, is very tempting. But it takes our focus away from the season we are in now, and whether that season is easy, difficult, sad, or happy, we are in our current seasons for a reason. It's important for us as God's creatures to live in the time and the place He has graciously given to us. Jesus reminds us, "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble."
