## **DISSERTATION PROJECT**

- Title: Competitive Political Environment and Public Opinion on Rapprochement

- Summary: My dissertation project investigates how political conflicts and cooperation that extend beyond international rivalries affect public opinion on a foreign adversary and rapprochement. To explain public opinion on interstate peace, an extensive body of literature has concentrated on studying the characteristics of actors and behaviors directly tied to a rivalry dyad, which includes the adversary's image and the types of cooperation between rival states. Nevertheless, focusing solely on factors intrinsic to a rivalry pair might cause us to neglect the reality that individuals are frequently exposed to the varying levels of political competition involving actors beyond the bilateral dimension. To address this significant void, my dissertation investigates the impact of political competition at both international and domestic levels—specifically characterized by ally-enemy group confrontation and partisan polarization—on public attitudes concerning attempts to establish peace with a rival state. I argue that, at both levels, citizens are more inclined to endorse peace initiatives in a less polarized context because an intensified "us versus them" cognitive framework fosters a heightened negative image of a foreign adversary. I support my theoretical claims using a multi-method research strategy, including quantitative analyses of survey experiment data and machine-learning approaches to analyze social media data from the United States, South Korea, and Taiwan.
