That can be incredibly painful, particularly for folks who have been raised and nurtured in the United Methodist Connection. More painful, though, are the lies that are sometimes being told in order to convince some long-standing United Methodists to leave the connection for the newly formed Global Methodist Church. I worry about the concern this misinformation may cause to many of you. Thankfully, one of the gifts of the Connection is access to conference staff. Our Great Plains Communications team took time to put together a clean, clear, easily understandable guide to the core beliefs we hold as United Methodists that aren't going anywhere- as well as clear facts about the disaffiliation process for those who choose to leave, and what it means for those of us who stay. I hope that you will find this resource helpful as you make sense of what you or your friends and neighbors might be hearing about the UMC.

Meanwhile, here at Baldwin First UMC, we've got great plans for worship coming up in November-:celebrating Saints, Gratitude, and Generosity, and then it'll be Advent! We hope you'll join us in person or online.

The United Methodist Church

Our Beliefs

The United Methodist Church finds itself in a season of splintering. The following document is prepared by the cabinet and conference staff following district gatherings to clarify the denomination's core doctrines and to answer key questions arising around church disaffiliations.

God

We believe there is one living and true God who is eternal, holy, all powerful, all knowing, and ever present. God is the maker and preserver of all things — both what is seen and what is not seen. In the unity of the Godhead, there are three persons in one — the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.



Jesus

We believe Jesus was born of a virgin. Jesus Christ is both fully God and fully human. Jesus is the very Word of God and the savior of all humankind who came to earth to live, to teach us how to love, and to restore us to God. Jesus willingly

endured the suffering, shame, and death on the cross in order to pay the debt for humanity's sin. He then rose from the dead and ascended into heaven. Jesus is acknowledged as the way to salvation.



Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the third person in the Trinity. The Spirit is at work in the world and the lives of individuals. It transforms, empowers, and guides believers. Through the Holy Spirit, we experience the fruit of the spirit and spiritual gifts.

Mission

We believe the mission of the Christian life is summed up in the two great commandments of loving God and loving our neighbors. Scripture informs us that this is lived out as we love mercy, seek justice, walk humbly with God and "Go and make disciples of all nations."

The Bible

The Bible is the inspired word of God and is the primary source for Christian doctrine. It contains all things needed for salvation and living a life unto God.

The Creeds

Core UM beliefs are summed up in various creeds. One is the Apostle's Creed (UM Hymnal #881). Another is the Nicene Creed (UM Hymnal #880), which is printed below:

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father: through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures: he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one, holy catholic and apostolic church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins, we look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world

to come. Amen

Resurrection

We believe that
Jesus physically
rose from the dead,
walked the earth,
ascended to heaven,
and will come again
to judge all humanity and
establish his reign over the earth.

Doctrine of Grace

We believe grace is the unearned and undeserved favor of God extended toward all humanity. United Methodists believe in three forms of grace:

- Prevenient grace that is at work in our lives drawing us to God prior to salvation
- Justifying grace that brings us into right relationship with God through faith in Christ.
- Sanctifying grace that continues to work in us to transform us into the image of Christ.

The Bible is foundational for our beliefs, but United Methodists also look to the traditions of the Church, reason, and experience to help inform our faith and help interpret scripture.



The United Methodist Church

Much information is being shared regarding disaffiliation and the disaffiliation process. Below are some of the most common questions.

Will We Change Our Articles of Religion?

While it's true that there are some United Methodists who don't share all of the beliefs in our Articles of Religion



(Book of Discipline ¶104, Section 3), the vast majority of United Methodists hold dear to the teachings about the Trinity, the divinity of Jesus, the Holy Spirit, scripture and many other aspects that are central to our faith. It is nearly impossible to change our Articles of Religion under church law, so no, these important doctrines will not change.

Where Should Our Attention Be Focused?

Jesus gave us an important directive in Matthew 28:18-20. We are to make disciples of all people. That is the mission. That is what The United Methodist Church stands for in the 21st century. And that is where all local churches are asked to place their focus.

Will Every Church Need to Vote?



No vote is necessary. The only churches that need to vote are those

with a large part of the congregation desiring to leave. In these cases, it may be wise to conduct a straw poll of the membership before a Charge Conference for an official vote is requested from the District Superintendent.

Why Should We Stay UMC?

Start by asking what you love about your church now.

And then here are some strengths of The United Methodist Church:

- Your church is already part of your community For decades, in fact more than 100 years in many cases, your church has been part of the community. It's helped in times of need. It has welcomed people who are hurting. It has been part of weddings and funerals. And it is known by people who have not even set foot inside your doors.
- Together, we make a huge impact on the world The UMC has more than 350 missionaries around the world and mission partnerships on most continents around the world. And when disaster strikes, the United Methodist Committee on Relief is there to serve as the hands and feet of Christ.
- Our appointive system ensures

 a pastor for each congregation
 Our system works to ensure
 a pastor for each congregation.

 Those outside the connection may have to recruit their own pastors and then focus efforts on retention.
- The annual conference provides expertise and resources —
 Some examples include training, consultations, grants, and 700m licenses.

Why are traditionalists being forced to leave?

No one is being forced to leave the UMC. ¶ 2553 was added during the 2019 General Conference as part of the Traditional Plan as a means for progressive congregations, who so desired, to leave the denomination. When General Conference continued to be postponed some traditionalist leaders decided they could no longer remain in the UMC. This has resulted in some traditional-leaning congregations using ¶ 2553 to disaffiliate from the UMC.

What If ...

The margin isn't enough to leave? If a Church Conference vote does not reach 67% then a congregation will remain in the UMC. Congregations are encouraged to conduct a straw poll to see if there is adequate support of disaffiliation from the church membership prior to voting to limit further fracturing of a congregation.

We don't have the money?
The required payments were passed as part of the Traditional Plan. Churches that desire to leave must meet those requirements to disaffiliate.

A congregation disaffiliates but some members want to remain UMC?
Congregations that vote to disaffiliate should notify all members of the decision and provide options for those who want to remain UMC members. This would include assisting them to connect with another UMC either in person or online. Their membership can be transferred to any UMC where they desire to be active.

Minutes: Kathleen moved that the minutes be accepted, Darren seconded, and the minutes were approved

Finance: Finances for August were down, and we are about 7% below what is needed monthly. We will monitor fall finances to see where we are against budget. The 2023 budget will be discussed at

next meeting.

SPPRC: The staff budget needs will be looked into next meeting and trying to get through Staff evaluations.

Trustees:Tree removal is scheduled and waiting on exact date but will be done before Maple Leaf. Float on the Boiler feed tank over filled but water flow has been fixed. Pump on zone tank is not working, VIC coming to evaluate. Water heater in the kitchen has been swapped out. The ceiling fan in the kitchen is causing the pilot light to go out on the stove. The urinal in the Men's bathroom has been repaired. The AV upgrade project is almost complete, the electrician is still to come. The Deck on the parsonage is in process of repair and work is pending.

Missions: The focus has been on Maple Leaf. There will be walking tacos on Saturday out in front of the church. Many volunteer slots available for serving and materials purchase.

Worship: We have had success getting additional voices for liturgist and childrens time. The choir was well received.

UFW: UFW held a picnic in October. Twelve persons participated in a nice fellowship. There will be no bake sale for Maple Leaf. The Turkey Dinner will be November 12 th from 5-7, dine in and carry out.

Children's Ministry: Children's Sunday School has begun opening with music time directed by Madilyn. The Children will sing the last Sunday in October. We currently have two classes going and could use an additional leader to assist. Some Baker students have been helping with Sunday School and the Blast Crew. There will be a children's program in December. Youth Ministry: The Youth of the church have begun meeting monthly with youth from Ives, Edgerton and Eudora. A calendar of events was developed for the year.

Adult Ministry: A social area has been set up for parents of children who do not necessarily want to participate in Adult Sunday School. The new coffee bar in located in Beek's Chapel. In addition a TV has been placed in the nursery and fellowship hall. These can broadcast the service for nursery volunteers.

Pastor Report: Pastor Amanda will be out of town for training on the 3 rd -5 th of October. We have received the grant for spiritual renewal leave. Terresa Stewart will be scheduling some time to help the congregation plan Lenten Services while Pastor Amanda is on her spiritual leave. The Advent series will focus on mental health. Current plan is to have Christmas Eve services 5:00 at Ives, 11:00 At Baldwin. Joint Services for Baldwin and Ives on Christmas Day (Baldwin) and New Years (Ives).

Most Current Financial Update:





Alternative Halloween -UNICEF NEW YORK (September 27, 2022) – UNICEF USA announces the launch of the new, digital Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF experience, bringing the tradition firmly into the 21st century. A <u>QR code</u> has

launched across the United States and is available for download and use throughout the month of October.

Over nearly eight decades, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) has built an unprecedented global support system for the world's children. In 1950, Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF was incepted to help children affected by World War II. From collecting loose change in hand-painted orange milk cartons to distribute powdered milk to hungry children in post-World War II Europe, to the iconic little orange boxes, to a brand-new, modern and simple to use QR code, the Trick-or-Treat campaign has evolved to a rapidly

changing world. The move from the iconic little orange boxes to a QR code is a way to reimagine the campaign for an increasingly digital world.

As the longest-running youth engagement campaign in the United States, Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF has raised more than \$195 million to date: funding UNICEF and its work to prevent childhood diseases, building schools and wells, delivering humanitarian aid to children and adolescents affected by war, natural disasters and other emergencies. Donations to the Trick or-Treat campaign will aid UNICEF in assisting families where they need it most; from in and around Ukraine, to providing therapeutic food and water in drought-stricken Eastern Africa, to helping families survive harsh winters and to delivering emergency relief to children globally.

Homelessness Assistance in Douglas County - Donations for cold-weather items are currently being collected at the Lawrence Police Department, 5100 Overland Drive, Lawrence.

DARE – Drop in and Rest Center at 944 Kentucky operates as a volunteer program of the Coalition for Homeless Concerns, Inc. in offering daily refuge with basic services to provide emotional and physical comfort to persons who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. The DARE Center is currently asking for winter camping items, including sleeping bags, tents, tarps, backpacks, gloves and blankets. It is also asking for items such as deodorant, underwear, socks, razors, wipes, coffee, nutritional snacks, antibiotic ointments and bandages.

PLEASE NOTE: For the last two months of 2022, Open food Pantry dates are November (12th and 19th) and December (10th and 17th), the *2nd and 3rd Saturdays*, so neighbors get their holiday food prior to the holiday. The pantry will resume to regular schedule in January 2023 (2nd and 4th Saturdays 9 to 10 a.m.) Special thanks to Donna and Mike Curran for the donation of a freezer for use at Baldwin Community Food Pantry.

The date of ISOSLD is the date of the Saturday before American Thanksgiving.
