Also, there would be no internet and no TV. I would have to settle for cold cereal and no coffee and no entertainment options. Yikes! What a hardship!

As I lay there in bed with two warm blankets, in a cozy room, even though it was cold, and with my dog snoring softly by my side, my attitude shifted from "poor me" to "lucky me." At least I have a home, a warm bed to call my own, and food in the pantry and the refrigerator. There are, of course, many in our community who are not so lucky.

Over the past several years, the number of homeless people in Stockton and the rest of California has grown tremendously. There are numerous encampments of homeless individuals who band together for comradery and protection. These people, many of whom are veterans or children, don't have any kind of power, including the power to change their lives. It is up to us to realize that these individuals are part of our community, and they deserve to be safe and warm.

Supporting organizations such as the Salvation Army, St. Mary's Dining Room, various veterans' services, and other outreach organizations financially, and with the gifts of time and service, can brighten lives and give hope for a better future to so many.

My power came back on eventually, after nineteen hours, and I was able to have hot soup for supper. I wonder how many homeless people were so lucky.

(I had missed seeing the 49ers' game on TV, but I listened to it on my trusty transistor radio).




Great things are in store for us in February when we are treated to a motivational speaker who will direct our girls to "find their voices." Watch this space for a report on that experience.

#### **DEI Interest Group: DEI Terms**

The DEI Interest Group meets once a month to discuss topics that fit into the general sphere of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. To be effective, we have found it necessary to work from a group of common definitions for terms that are used in our discussions. Some of those terms are listed below with their definitions. See which ones you know. If you don't know the meaning of some words, this is a time for you to learn. If you want to explore more about anything that is mentioned, you are invited to join the DEI Interest Group to discuss these and other terms/ideas/topics. Your ideas are most welcome.

**BIPoC:** An acronym used to refer to black, indigenous and people of color. It is based on the recognition of collective experiences of systemic racism. As with any other identity term it is up to individuals to use this term as an identifier.

**Cisgender:** A term for people whose gender identifier, expression or behavior aligns with those typically associated with their assigned sex at birth.

Critical Race Theory: A cross-disciplinary intellectual and social movement of civil rights scholars and activists who seek to examine the intersection of race, society, and law in the US and to challenge mainstream American liberal approaches to racial justice. CRT is not taught at the elementary, high school or undergraduate levels. It is a movement that is discussed by

scholars at the graduate level, law schools or post graduate level.

**Discrimination:** The unequal treatment of members of various groups based on conscious or unconscious prejudice, which favors one group over others on differences of race, gender, economic class, sexual orientation, physical ability, religion, language, age, national identity, and other categories.

**LGBTQIA:** An inclusive term for those who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, and asexual.

**Multicultural Competency:** A process of embracing diversity and learning about people from other cultural backgrounds. The key element to becoming more culturally competent is respect for the ways that others live in and organize the world and an openness to learn from them.

**Sexual Orientation:** An individual's enduring physical, romantic and/or emotional attraction to another person. Gender identity and sexual orientation are not the same. Transgender people may be straight, lesbian, gay or bisexual.

These terms are a sample of terms that are used when discussing DEI issues. You might have heard some of them on TV Shows, News broadcasts, commercials, books, etc.

Come learn with us at the DEI Discussion Group. It is a 'safe space" where you can always learn something while also teaching something to others.

Don't forget! Gov Tech Session #2

Feb 11<sup>th</sup> (on ZOOM)

Last month I introduced the World Day of Social Justice, occurring on Feb 20<sup>th</sup>. The theme this year is "Gender discrimination in the world." While we are all aware of many economic discrimination issues, we must acknowledge that American health care also suffers from systemic forms of discrimination resulting in a detrimental effect on the health and well-being of millions of American women.

For example, **heart disease** is the leading cause of death among women—6 times more than breast cancer--but many women are unaware of this, with the highest percentages of unawareness among Blacks and Latinas. Why the discrepancy? When the American Heart Association (AHA) investigated, it found that many women reported that their physicians seldom if ever talked to them about heart health, and, in some cases, misdiagnosed obvious symptoms of heart disease as panic, stress or even hypochondria.

Even our recent experiences with COVID have shown women to be more disadvantaged than men: there are more women in retail & service jobs & more women were affected by daycare &

school closures.

Look around, especially on Feb 20<sup>th</sup>, & identify other gender discrimination issues. What can <u>you</u> do? An easy thing would be to write a letter (or email) to one of your legislators addressing an issue that means a lot to you.

I'm sure you can think of more.
