"The vote is precious. It is the most powerful tool we have in a democratic society, and we must use it."

These words were spoken by John Lewis, the late civil rights activist. In recent years, precious voting rights have come under persistent attacks by a cynical culture or movement that has become more and more prevalent in our country.

In 2021, 19 states enacted 34 laws restricting access to voting. These laws impose a wide range of voter suppression measures such as obstacles to voting by mail by limiting the availability of ballot boxes; new voter ID requirements, such as demanding proof of citizenship; limiting what election officials can do to promote voter access; not allowing water or snacks to be distributed to those waiting in long lines to cast ballots, and other measures designed to make voting more difficult. These laws place a heavy burden on voters, especially on communities of color.

We should be encouraging more people, especially young people, to vote, not making it harder for us to exercise our rights as American citizens.

Voting rights organizations, including the League of Women Voters, are actively seeking to overturn these restrictive measures and, once again, guarantee every citizen's sacred right to cast a ballot and have it counted. Our democracy depends on this.

(The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Act, which would strengthen the Voting Rights Act of 1965, has passed the House of Representatives but is stalled in the Senate).


- Education

-unfortunately still due to Covid, we will not be having a home tour this year, in person or virtually.


-this year will be a mailing fundraiser, keep a look out for the invite. Our current mailing list has over 500 people.
