The result, according to Prior Lake-Spring Lake Watershed District Board Chair Fred Corrigan was the removal of 2.575 carn totaling over 34,000 pounds (17 tons) from Spring Lake! Based on the preliminary population estimate, this seine may have captured nearly 50% of the carp in Spring Lake. Future tracking and seines are to be conducted as well.

Meanwhile, more than half of the carp caught were sold to a buyer in North Carlina for consumption with the contractor hoping to find another buyer for the remainder of the

# **Further Treatment Will Be Considered For 2018**

sediment core analysis, alum dose determination and application plan called for two to three phases of alum treatment with half of the total dose delivered in the fall of 2013, and additional phases of alum treatment spaced by three or more years. depending upon the need for additional

In 2015, the District's Board of Managers hired Barr Engineering, who managed the treatment, to conduct an analysis to see if an alum treatment in 2016 was warranted Given the favorable water quality monitoring results. Barr indicated that an alum treatment was not necessary this year.

In 2016 Barr conducted a sediment core sampling and analyzed water quality data to determine if an alum treatment was needed in 2017. Monitoring data between 2014 and 2016 indicated that total phosphorus, which is a key factor in algae growth, was lower than or at the new MPCA standard of 60 micrograms/liter.

According to Watershed District Administrator Diane Lynch, sediment core samples were collected in August of 2016

As a result of the favorable water quality results and analysis of the sediment core sampling, Barr drew the following explained Ms, Lynch,

 The first phase of alum application resulted in a significant drop in the releaseable forms of phosphorous in the sediment.

· A flood event in 2014, followed by high flows in 2015 and 2016 have resulted in the delivery and sedimentation of more phosphorous in the lake.

· Surface water quality is much improved since the alum treatment.

The District will continue to monitor the status of Spring Lake and will determine later this year if an alum treatment should be scheduled in 2018.

Part of the plan to improve the water quality of Spring Lake, explained Lynch, includes participation from local residents.

### **Stormwater and Flood Study Completed**

now complete. The initial study was is a short-term goal and the responsibility commissioned, as a result of the 2014 flood, by the City of Prior Lake and the Prior Lake-Spring Lake Watershed District in cooperation with Spring Lake Township Barr Engineering was hired to complete the four project phases: 1. Undate the Watershed's Model, 2, Identify Flood Reduction Options, 3. Evaluate Flood Reduction Options and 4. Develop an Implementation Plan.

The study had several stakeholder components and the Spring Lake Association was represented on the Advisory Group providing input on flood mitigation alternatives and the final recommendations. There was also a Technical Advisory Committee of staff from the District, City of Prior Lake and Spring Lake Township as well as strategic meetings with local farmers and policymakers from the three entities.

Out of 20 alternatives, the policymakers selected three that met the following goals; protect public safety and maintain emergency access: protect public utility infrastructure; maintain traffic flow through the County Road 21 corridor and maintain access to private properties. The three alternatives selected were: actively manage the Prior Lake Outlet; enhanced protection and secure upper watershed storage.



High water was a common occurrence during the summer of 2014 on Spring Lake

The Watershed District's flood study is Actively managing the Prior Lake Outlet Save Thousands! of the District. The District will create a process to analyze weather forecasts, storage capacity of existing wetlands and

lakes and flooding notential and will undate its procedure to allow the Outlet Structure's low flow gate to be opened more often. Currently, the District is only authorized by the Department of Natural Resources to open the low flow gate in response to spring snowmelt. Enhanced protection is also a short-term

goal. The City of Prior Lake will lead lefforts to coordinate temporary enhanced protection measures, such as sandbagging, during flood events. The City will develon a written policy which will be reviewed and adopted by the City

Securing upper watershed storage is a long-term goal. This goal will identify potential storage areas that could provide flood damage reduction in addition to providing water quality improvement benefits. The storage areas will be carefully considered and landowner willingness will be a key factor.

# No more shooting at the quack of dawn

At the November 2015 Spring Lake Township meeting, a group of concerned lake home residents proposed, for safety reasons, that hunting, primarily duck hunting, be restricted on Spring Lake. Two local sportsmen groups and Spring Lake duck hunters provided opposing viewpoints at that time but the motion was delayed until the December Spring Lake Township meeting so the Sheriff's Department and the DNR could attend and

At the December meeting, various lake home residents provided examples of unsafe or unethical hunting practices on Spring Lake. In addition, factual commentary on the legality of duck hunting laws and future potential enforcement in regards to Spring Lake was offered by both the Sheriff's Department and the DNR. After consulting with the township attorney, the board approved the following ordinance 16-001. Any firearms discharge violating this ordinance will be handled by the Scott County Sheriff.

The following is Ordinance No. 16-001 as approved by the Board of Supervisors for Spring Lake Township on the 11th day of February, 2016: The ordinance prohibits the discharge of a firearm on or within the boundaries of Spring Lake and within 300 feet inland of the ordinary high water elevation thereof. Further, no firearm shall be discharged so that the projectile or shot falls within the boundary of Spring Lake or within 300 feet inland of the ordinary high water elevation thereof. Violation of the

A printed copy of the ordinance is available for inspection by any person during regular office hours at the office of the Town Clerk at the Spring Lake Township Town Hall at 20381 Fairlawn Avenue. This ordinance will take effect upon its passage and publication.



#### How can you help improve the lake?

1) Stop fertilizing your lawn or only use fertilizers that are non-phosphorous-based. 2) Leave as much aquatic vegetation in the lake as possible. Plants help increase

water clarity. 3) Clean up leaves in the street where storm sewers drain directly into the lake. 4) Install shoreline buffers, rain gardens or rain barrels.

5) Participate in the Carp Fishing Contest and other lake clean-up events.

Prizes will again be awarded for the yearly harvest of the damaging carp which may be done by bowfishing, spearing or netting.


