Our Delaware Garden Clubs are busy with their plans for community gardens, projects, and flower shows. The beneficiaries of their energy are too numerous to list. As a Federation, there are four organizations we support on a state level with our time and expertise.

The Delaware Nature Society was founded in 1964 and is the state affiliate for the National Wildlife Federation. It is known for its educational programming, conservation, and advocacy. DFGC Board member Suzanne Smith serves on the Nature Society Board. DFGC members volunteer at the numerous nature centers, parks, and a working farm in addition to enjoying the fun and interesting programs.

The DFGC was a founding member of the Delaware Center for Horticulture in 1977. The DCH is the only statewide nonprofit membership organization that focuses on community greening of urban environments. DFGC Board Member MaryBeth Johns represents the DFGC on the Board of Directors and is co-chairing the current capital campaign. Other DFGC members serve on the Council of Advisors.

The TREE-mendous Tree Project began as Lisa Arni's President's Project in 2017 and raised thousands of dollars to plant the woodland area adjacent to the meadow. In addition, club members donate countless hours to maintain the Botanic Gardens. We are all looking forward to the DBG's newest project, the Eagle Cam, to watch the local wildlife.

- Our annual meeting speaker, Jane Godshalk, demonstrated 5 different eco-friendly design techniques.
- We created a Climate Pledge for Clubs and Members.
- We have given 7 grants to clubs for projects designed to improve the environment or educate the community.
- On May 1st we will hold “Campaign for Nature” a one-day environmental event with five speakers followed by Garden School Course 4 and then Environmental School in the Fall.

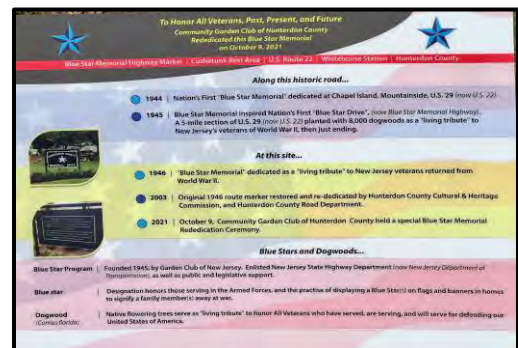


The Blue Star Memorial program is a great source of pride for New Jersey, with the project originating here back in 1944 as a remembrance of veterans from World War II. Dedication ceremonies for two Gold Star Memorials and two Blue Star Memorials are planned for this spring. Blue Star markers will be dedicated in Sussex County on April 27 and in Hudson County on May 4.

Today, Blue Star Memorial markers are scattered throughout New Jersey with at least one memorial installed in every one of the state's 21 counties. Additionally, New Jersey has 2 Gold Star Memorial markers with the first one installed in Gloucester County in 2022 and a second Gold Star Memorial installed in Sparta Township being dedicated on May 18.

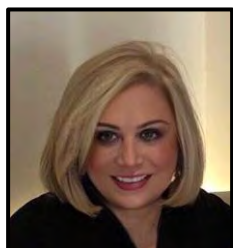

Why Grow Your Own Basil, Oregano & Thyme?

Need a little incentive to plant patio or garden herbs this year?

Lisa L. Gill's article published in the November 2021 Consumer Reports magazine reported the results of testing 126 products (15 types of dried herbs and spices NOT usually used in baking) from McCormick, Trader Joe's, Whole Foods, Great Value (Walmart), and others. Testers found that 40 had heavy metal (arsenic, lead and cadmium) levels high enough to raise neurological health concerns in children and even adults. If the spices are consumed regularly, that is, ¼ teaspoon or 0.5 g per eating event. In 31 of these products, lead was so high that it exceeded the amount anyone should have in one day. All of the thyme and oregano products were most concerning. A significant finding was that there was no single predictor to signal which products contained higher levels of heavy metals since the brand name, "organic" or "packed in USA" did not correlate to toxicity. The article recommends that anyone using a lot of basil, oregano and thyme should grow and dry their own! Central Atlantic Region Club members are encouraged to grow all three this summer as thrillers, fillers and spillers in a very large patio pot with well-

drained soil under full sun, and then harvest and dry their young leaves as gifts for the kitchens and health of friends and family.

Healthy Herb Tonic

(from Container Garden Magic by Jerry Baker)

Mix the ingredients listed below in 1 quart of warm water and mist herbs every week:

- 1 Tablespoon of liquid dish soap
- 1 Tablespoon of antiseptic mouthwash
- 1 Tablespoon of ammonia, and
- ¼ cup of tea

The mist takes care of any insects and diseases while giving the plants a gently nutrient boost.

Sustainable Gardening

The single most important requirement for a lush garden is soil. Soil is the medium in which plants grow. Do you know what type of soil you have?

Yes, there are types of soil.

There is clay soil. This is heavy soil that retains water and cracks when dry. It is difficult to dig and inhibits plant growth. During the frequent heavy rains the northeast has been experiencing, this type of soil is not a gardeners' friend! Adding compost or worm castings will help break up the soil and provide nutrients. Using a pitchfork and someone with a strong back will aid in digging a hole!

There are some plants referred to as “clay busters” these are plants with fibrous root systems which consist of multiple, fine roots that spread out allowing the plant to absorb water and nutrients. Artichokes and Daikon Radish are two vegetable examples. There are many perennial flowers; Aster, Amsonia, Baptisia, Bee Balm, Black Eyed Susan and Coral Bells (Heuchera) to name a few.

Another type of soil is sandy. This soil is quick draining and does not hold water so plants often die from lack of water. Bearded Iris, Blanket Flower, Butterfly Bush, and Butterfly Weed are all examples that do well in sandy soil.

The last soil types are silt and loam which are composed of mostly sand and a smaller amount of clay. Silty soil becomes powdery when dry. Loamy soil breaks apart easily if formed into a ball.

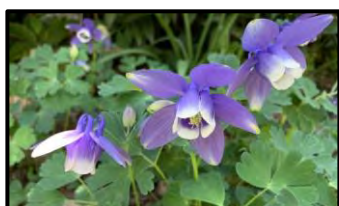
If you don’t know your soil type there are inexpensive test kits available online or you may want to check your local nursery.

Early spring is a perfect time to take some soil samples so you can plant the right plant in the right place and later enjoy the beauty of a thriving garden.

Wanted: Herbaceous Perennial Flower Show Entries

If an NGC Flower Show has exhibits with at least 20 herbaceous perennials during 2024, it is eligible for CAR-SGC’s American Horticultural Society Herbaceous Perennial Award. Documenting photos and a list of botanical names are required. Each of our 7 states can have a winner.

on the day of an NGC Flower Show. Gathering information later is more of a challenge.

Air Quality/Water Conservation

Latest data from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and university researchers show that global ocean temperatures have been breaking daily records. Average ocean temperatures were 0.25 degrees C warmer than the previous year.

Summary:
Frogs do a lot for our environment, but their homes and lives are in danger.

Science Topics:

- Life cycle
- Human impact on nature

Questions to Discuss:

- What are some ways the frogs could be helped? Go back through the book and think about solutions to each problem.
- In what ways do frogs help people?
- How do people impact frogs?

Related Activities:

- Draw a picture of the frog's life cycle. Remember to include the egg and tadpole stages.
- Visit a local park or nature preserve to observe frogs in their natural environment.

This project was inspired by a NY State project called the Book Bag Project. A book, a bag and an activity were donated to local libraries. As the book was checked out, it came in a fun bag and included an item related to the story. The child could keep the item when the book and bag were returned to the library.

The library staff would replace the giveaway item and the book would be ready to be checked out again.

2024 NGC Youth Sculpture Contest

The winners of the 2023 NGC Youth Sculpture Contest will be announced at the NGC Convention in Denver. The 2022 first place winner was a fourth grader who created an owl with ten recycled items some of which were egg carton, plastic forks, soda can and pipe cleaners. CAR-SGC had very few entries. Our goal for this year is to have an entry from each state in our Region and we need your help to accomplish this. The contest rules are simple:

- Children in 4th through 8th grade are eligible.
- Sculptures must consist of recyclable, reused and reduced materials.
- Width of the sculpture can be no more than 8 ½ X 11 inches and height should be in proportion to width.
- Entries may include as many photographs as can be printed on the back of the entry form, but two 4x6 photographs are recommended. THE SCULPTURE ITSELF IS NOT SUBMITTED.

the sculpture in 3-5 sentences, send photographs and that's it.
