From the Ground Up: Garden club brings home the silver

Last month, nine mem-bers of the Uwchlan Gar-den Club made the 260mile trek to

Monroeville, PA, outside Pittsburgh, to attend the den Club Federation of Pennsylva nia (GCFP) State Conven-

tion. The group were eager to gather and mingle with members of other clubs within the GCFP, learn from the various speakers and seminars on tap, and browse vendors' booths. They had no idea that they would be returning home with the prestigious GCFP Governor's Trophy, honoring the club's achievement as the Most Outstanding Large Garden Club in the GCFP in 2022.

The actual, physical tro-phy came in two forms: an engraved silver punch bowl with tray, and an en-graved crystal vase. The punch bowl is a "perpetual" trophy, meaning that it is passed on from one winner to the next each year. The crystal vase will stay with the club. Uwchlan Garden Club

tle background on the Governor's Trophy. She told me that the silver bowl was first awarded to The Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania in March 1954 by then Pennsylva nia Governor John S. Fine for "The Most Meritorious Amateur Exhibit" in the Philadelphia Flower Show. In 1955 the GCFP began awarding the trophy to "The Most Outstanding Garden Club" in the GCFP.

Within the Federation there are approximately 4,700 Pennsylvania garden

Walsh shared with me a lit- club members, ten Districts and over 100 garden clubs. In an understatement, Walsh said, "We are so proud to have been recognized for our work

throughout the year." To enter, the UGC members provided a Book of Evidence, consisting of 25 two-sided pages that in-cluded documentation and pictures about Club Meetings, Civic Activities, Con-servation Activities, Club Organizational Activities, and Club Supported State Projects. Walsh observed that, "It certainly was a total club effort. And-this is the first time UGC has won this award!!

Walsh said that to level the playing field for clubs of different sizes, each year a different size club is eligible for the Governor's Trophy: Small clubs (1-20 members), Medium clubs (21-50 members), and Large clubs (51+ members). The rotation repeats every three years. Currently, UGC has 74 members, putting it

in the large category.

I love this story. First,
because I have friends who are members of this gar-

den club and I'm so happy for them at their achieve-ment. And second, because it demonstrates something it took me years to dis-cover, which is that most garden clubs have little to do with the stereotypcal perception of a garden club. These are not groups

of "ladies who lunch" and who putter about their gardens dressed in dainty summer frocks, wielding tiny pruning scis sors to manicure their flower beds. The garden club members I've met engage in constant learning and sharing of informa-tion, growing tips, plants, cuttings, and seeds. They build and tend community gardens. They host annual plant sales, usually of native specimens that will at-tract pollinator species of birds and insects. Sometimes they delve into the history of local gardens. The Uwchlan Garden Club has the unique project of helping to maintain and preserve the 1756 Uwchlan Friends Meeting House in Lionville, where they hold their monthly meetings.

Yes, garden club members tend to be primarily women, and they do enjoy lunch together, but these

are garden-clogs-on-the ground people who are de-voted to learning, sharing, and building community, who literally dig in to ac-complish their goals. Our communities are richer for
