Dear Judith,

On behalf of the Ontario Association of Children's Aid Societies (OACAS), I extend warm greetings to you, your Board of Directors, and your staff at the League of Ontario Foster Families as you convene the 11th Annual LOFF Conference and AGM.

The Ontario Association of Children's Aid Societies (OACAS) is a provincial membership organization representing 47 of Ontario's 50 children's aid societies and Indigenous Child and Family Well-Being Agencies, as well as two-pre-mandated agencies. OACAS supports our members with practice tools, communications, professional development, and training opportunities and is committed to working towards an effective system that supports all children, youth, and caregivers. We work with provincial partners across sectors and with the government to improve outcomes for the children, youth, and families across Ontario.

I would like to share with you some recent initiatives and areas of priority for OACAS:

- On May 9, alongside young people with lived experience in the Ontario child welfare system, OACAS and the Children's Aid Foundation of Canada visited Queen's Park as part of the <u>#ForgetMeNot campaign</u> to ask the question: *Are you there for kids in* care? We also met with several Members of Provincial Parliament (MPPs) and Minister Parsa to talk about better supports for youth in the areas of mental health, housing, education, and employment.
- One Vision One Voice (OVOV) hosted its fourth PowerUp! Youth Symposium in March.
   PowerUp! is specifically designed for Black-identifying children and youth actively
   involved with child welfare and allows Black youth to build connections, community,
   and to celebrate Black identity. OVOV is a program funded by the Ontario Ministry of
   Children, Community and Social Services through the OACAS to address the
   overrepresentation and experiences of disparities faced by African Canadians after
   coming into contact with the child welfare system.
- In February, we hosted the first ever Q-Munity Youth Symposium, an event that welcomed and celebrated 2SLGBTQ+ children and youth with experience in the child welfare system. The event provided youth the opportunity to meet each other, share experiences, and be empowered.
- OACAS continues to engage with First Nations, Inuit, and Metis organizations, including ANCFSAO and Chiefs of Ontario, to support their work to help families in their communities.

We value the role of foster caregivers and their tireless efforts to open doors to reunification, stability and permanency, safety, and well-being, and recognize the critical work foster carers do to support primary caregivers, where possible, so they can address issues that have put their children's safety and well-being at risk.

Thank you for your work to support the continuous learning and engagement of foster caregivers across Ontario. We look forward to further partnership opportunities.
