# **Report on Beekman Street Corridor Coalition Traffic meeting**

**Bill Heimbrock:** Two city council members and a representative from each Beekman Corridor Neighborhood spoke about traffic concerns in their neighborhood. Department of Transportation representative did not attend. Council members agreed to pursue community requests for complete streets design on Queen City and Westwood Northern Blvd, updated traffic signal patterns, and improved communication on traffic projects in our neighborhoods.

Heather clarified that "complete streets" are designed to meet the needs of commuters using automobiles, bicycles, and pedestrian modes of transportation. This is a design alternative to our current style of streets which prioritize the convenience of automobile commuters.

Ernistine elaborated Councilman Scotty Johnson committed to attend the traffic committee's February meeting with an update from the Department of Transportation and Engineering.

#### 2. Engine 21 report

Fire prevention: Be careful with Christmas trees and lights. Check for frayed cords. Don't run too many cords on one circuit. Don't run cords under carpets where they can become damaged without noticing.

Smoke detector install signup for CPS families: Contact 513-357-7584 Fire prevention department.

Residents without kids can call Engine 21 as they have smoke detectors donated from time to time. To check availability call 513-352-2321

Stats for this month: 171 responses, 5 working fires (more than typical), 152 EMS runs

Something cool: Engine 21 has a new ventilation unit, purchased from Point Pleasant Kentucky. The unit gets 2-3 calls each month from the Greater Cincinnati area to clear smoke out of large indoor areas.
