President's Message - Wendy Eisner

The last few months have been difficult for all of us. Since the horrific attack on October 7th in Israel, I have gone from shocked, sad, angry, and back again. I keep asking myself: how can this be happening? Asking this question has only led to more questions. However, the one that I've continuously come back to is: what can I do to help?



To answer this question, I've turned inward to think about what I can possibly control during a time when the absence of control is the norm. To date, this is what I've come up with.

First, donate to Jewish organizations that support relief efforts in Israel. The people of Israel are suffering immensely and are in need of many things. These needs include crisis counseling, medication, and ambulances, among many others. Any donation to the Jewish Federations of North American (JFNA) helps to support the citizens of Israel.

Next, reach out to your local representatives and let them know you support Israel and its right to exist. This is not a time for silence, we must make our voices heard.

Third, educate people that may not understand the complexities of the conflict. Discuss the meanings of words like genocide and colonization and explain why these words should not be used interchangeably with Israel.

Lastly, if you use social media, post and repost your support for Israel. Post about the hostages and their families. Post about what happened on October 7th.

Although these are just suggestions, they are actions I've taken to help me feel like I am contributing something to show my support for Israel during this time.

As always, my gratitude for our small but mighty community overwhelms me daily. We have raised more than \$700,000 for the Israeli crisis fund. We have rallied in support of Israel, and we have come together in our mutual need to support each other. Never again is now.

The holidays are over and now it is time to create a stress-free, cozy, and comfortable environment in the home during the winter months to promote a sense of well-being. Here are some ideas to create that ideal space.



- Warm lighting: use soft, warm-toned lighting like table lamps to create a cozy ambience, avoiding harsh, bright lights.
- Soft textures: plush blankets, throw pillows, and soft rugs add comfort to furniture and living spaces.
- Create a reading nook: set up a cozy reading corner with a comfortable chair, soft blankets, and a good selection of books for a perfect escape.
- Hot beverage station: set up a hot beverage station with a variety of teas, hot chocolate, and mugs.
- Fireside simulations: if you do not have a fireplace, consider using an electric or virtual fireplace to replicate the comforting feel of a crackling fire.



- Soft music or sounds: play soft, calming music or nature sounds in the background to create a soothing atmosphere.
- Mindful moments: introduce mindfulness practices like meditation or deep breathing exercises to alleviate stress and improve mental clarity.
- Limit exposure to the news: this can help reduce anxiety and stress. Set specific times to stay informed, choose reliable sources and be mindful of how the news affects your stress levels. Creating a healthy news routine allows you to stay informed without becoming overwhelmed.





Rabbi David Ellenson, a Newport News native and leading figure in Reform Judaism, dies at 76

Rabbi David Ellenson, who served for 12 years as president of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion and mentored a generation of rabbis and scholars as a historian, adviser and confidant, died December 7 at his home in Manhattan.

A renowned scholar in his own right — whose interests ranged from the origins and development of Orthodox Judaism in Germany to the relationship between religion and state in Israel — he was known and admired among such a wide circle of colleagues

and students that the New York Jewish Week tagged him "everyone's favorite rabbi" when he stepped down as president of HUC-JIR in 2013.

"It is impossible to overstate David's importance to the Jewish People, Reform Judaism and to

Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in particular," Andrew Rehfeld, the current president of HUC-JIR, said in a statement. "His scholarship and depth of knowledge were world-renowned, and his humility, warmth, generosity of spirit, and deep concern for each individual inspired all of us who had the privilege to know him. I feel blessed to have had him as a friend and mentor and will miss him dearly."

As president of HUC-JIR, Ellenson made a year of study in Israel for rabbinical students a priority, even during the violent second intifada. He also shepherded the institution — which has campuses in Cincinnati, Los Angeles, New York and Jerusalem—during the financial crisis of 2008 and '09. Under Ellenson's stewardship, HUC-JIR expanded the role

of women on its board of governors and regional boards of advisors, according to the school. During his tenure, HUC-JIR expanded professional leadership through a variety of fellowships, and introduced new distance learning initiatives.

He also led efforts among Reform and Conservative Jewish leaders to ease the Israeli Orthodox rabbinate's grip on religious ritual in Israel and expand acceptance and funding for non-Orthodox movements there.

David Ellenson was born in 1947 and grew up in an Orthodox family in Newport News. At a tribute dinner in 2014, Skip Vichness, a lifelong friend and former board chair of the Foundation for Jewish Camp, recalled growing up a few blocks from Ellenson and how the two skinny kids played for the local JCC basketball team. When the team won the local championship, said Vichness, the headline in the southern town's daily newspaper read: "Upset Of The Year: Jews Win."

Growing up in the small community, Ellenson recalled in a podcast interview in 2018, he observed "the tensions between what I would call a commitment to Jewish tradition and Jewish identity on the one hand, and a desire to participate fully in the larger world on the other." He came to the conclusion that Reform Judaism, which does not accept that Torah is the literal word of God, appealed to him as "an ongoing narrative where each generation of Jews writes a different story in which they attempt to capture what it is they feel that God commands in their age."

Ellenson received a bachelor's degree at the College of William & Mary in 1969 and a master's degree in religious studies at the University of Virginia in 1972. He received his Ph.D. in 1981 from Columbia University, where eminent Israeli historian Jacob Katz guided him to the study of modern responsa — rabbinic opinions that applied Jewish law to changing social conditions.




