If you know only one Hebrew word, that word is likely "Shalom" (שֹלוַם). What comes to mind when you hear this word?

The word "shalom" is used in a variety of expressions and contexts in Hebrew speech and writing. Shalom by itself is used as a greeting and farewell ("hello" and "goodbye"). Shalom is also often translated as "peace," but it encompasses a broader sense of harmony, prosperity, welfare, and tranquility for society as a whole. In Judaism, shalom is one of the underlying principles of the Torah: "Her ways are pleasant ways, and all her paths are shalom."

Shalom Aleichem is an expression meaning "well-being be upon you," and is used to greet others. It is also a song sung just before the Sabbath kiddish. Oseh Shalom ("peace maker") is the part of a passage commonly found as a concluding sentence in much Jewish liturgy. Shabbat Shalom ("peaceful Sabbath") is a warm and meaningful greeting exchanged on Shabbat. The greeting encapsulates the Jewish principles of observing the Sabbath. seeking peace and tranquility, fostering community, recognizing the sanctity of time, and pursuing spiritual growth.

Let us embrace the Peninsula 2030 project as we share the biblical vision of shalom as a community vision—a vision of human flourishing and a community that is holistic, healthy, and vibrant; a place of harmony, joy, and welcome.



# **UJCVP Partners with Newport News Police Department to Integrate FUSUS into Newly Updated Video Surveillance System**

In August, the UJCVP completed a comprehensive project to upgrade and centralize our video surveillance system. Made possible by your generous contributions and a grant from the UJCVP Endowment, the project aimed at addressing security vulnerabilities by uniting all campus organizations under one shared server and upgrading to state-of-the-art IP cameras that offer enhanced picture quality, longer recording time and motion sensing capability. Additionally, the project expanded the coverage of cameras on the campus to eliminate gaps in coverage.

Last year, the UJCVP convened a conversation with Newport News Police Department (NNPD) Chief Steve Drew and his Command Team to review security needs of the Jewish community and areas of improvement in our security alignment with local law enforcement. One suggested area of improvement was for the UJCVP to formally partner with NNPD by integrating the FUSUS real-time video system into our surveillance system.

FUSUS is a camera integration platform that allows law enforcement to monitor video feeds from multiple public and privately-owned sources, in one place, all in real time. With FUSUS, in the event of an emergency,

law enforcement could immediately access video footage and gain a rapid awareness of the situation inside. FUSUS keeps law enforcement officers and the communities they protect safer by enabling law enforcement to function more efficiently and with improved operational intelligence, by creating a common operating picture. By fusing public cameras like street and transit cams with private security cameras, FUSUS enables communities to collaborate to create safe zones that are secured and monitored. Police departments



have the ability to keep an eye on parking facilities, external building cameras, and surrounding streets to keep community members safe.



The UJCVP is the first faith-based organization in Newport News to partner with the police department to integrate the FUSUS system.



# The Virginia Birthright Experience

"Birthright changed my life," said CNU student, Shula Hochster. "I never would have invested as much time exploring my Judaism if it had not been for my Birthright trip with Rabbi Litt."

Twice a year, students at ODU, William and Mary, Christopher Newport University and other universities have a unique opportunity to take advantage of going to Israel with a group from Virginia. "Hampton Roads and the Peninsula does not have one big university with a large, Jewish population, but when you bring all the local universities together, they can be a real force," said Rabbi Gershon Litt, the Hillel director at William & Mary and rabbinic advisor for CNU Hillel. Litt said, "Local Virginia students cannot compete with larger universities like Texas, Maryland, or Penn, and therefore cannot guarantee buses of students going to Israel on Birthright trips, but if we all join together as one then the results are very powerful."

Since 2005, Rabbi Litt has led Taglit Birthright trips and has surpassed 40 trips. "It is one of the most rewarding parts of my job. To see the students experience Israel for the first time gives me tremendous inspiration and keeps me focused on continuing to educate college students about the importance of Israel as part of their Jewish identity," said Rabbi Litt. The students love the idea that they can go to Israel with someone they know, experience everything Israel has to offer, and then come back as a group. Students have reunions, get together for Shabbos meals, bring Israel advocacy programs to their respective

campuses, and have a new family of fellow students who experienced

Israel together with them.

Former CNU student and past president of the CNU Hillel, Hannah Kaye, commented that Rabbi Litt's Birthright trip, "Changed my perspective on Israel and connected me to Judaism in a way that I never thought possible. All I want to do is give other students that same opportunity." Each semester the Hillel students plan a program on the CNU campus to raise awareness of that semester's upcoming trip to Israel being led by Rabbi Litt.

Tristan Schnader, former president of the Alpha Epsilon Pi fraternity at William and Mary, also went to Israel on the IFS Birthright trip with Rabbi Litt. "I learned what it meant to be Jewish and how important it is to bring that back to my fraternity," said Tristan. In the past few years many AEPi brothers have gone to Israel with Rabbi Litt.

"I have been offering Jewish programming to university students in our area since 2007. The Jewish students here are wonderful, dedicated, and committed to learning more about Israel and Judaism. Birthright is a critical step in building the relationship between the Holy Land and the individual Jewish student. It brings the students back and empowers them to stand up, be advocates, continue to learn about their heritage, and make a difference for other Jewish students," said Rabbi Litt.

Birthright Israel trips with Rabbi Litt offer a great combination of Jewish heritage and history, political insight, and travel. The tour guides are some of the best in the industry and each trip gets to take advantage of IES's years of expertise.





## Virginia Peninsula Jewish Voter's Guide

The Community Relations Council (CRC) of the UJCVP is excited to share with you the 2023 Virginia Peninsula Jewish Voter's Guide. This year's election will be based on new legislative districts approved by the Virginia Supreme Court on December 28, 2021. This Guide will provide the information you need to be an informed voter. You can use the links below to determine which district is yours, which candidates are running, and where and how you can cast your ballot. Get started at Who's My Legislator from the Virginia General Assembly to find your current legislators and your legislative district designations.

Once you know which district is yours, you can look for the corresponding candidate statements in these pages. We have collected statements only from candidates with districts on the Virginia Peninsula, including those running in uncontested races. The statements in this Voter's Guide were compiled by inviting each candidate to provide a photograph, a link to their campaign website, and a 300-word statement to the Jewish Community. We have provided the responses (in full) for each candidate who replied. For candidates who did not submit a statement, their bios were copied from their campaign websites and marked with an asterisk (\*).

Election Day in Virginia is Tuesday, November 7, 2023. In-person, early voting is open between September 22 and November 4 at local voter registration offices. Check the Virginia Department of Elections website to register to vote or check your registration status to find your polling place, and to apply to receive an absentee ballot. ### Senate District 23

# Mamie E. Locke (D) - incumbent www.senatorlocke.com



I am Senator Mamie E. Locke. I have represented the 2nd District for 20 years. This district has now become the 23rd district following redistricting, covering the entirety of the City of Hampton and half of Newport News. Prior to serving in the Senate, I served on the City Council and as the Mayor of Hampton. I recently retired as Professor of Political Science

from Hampton University. Through the work of the latter and my membership in the Southern Poverty Law Center, I am a strong advocate for equality and justice. That is why my priority is funding for early childhood education (education is the great equalizer) and ensuring that a constitutional amendment for restoration of voting rights is enshrined in the Virginia Constitution. It is through the SPLC that I continue to learn about the proliferation of hate crimes, most notably antisemitism and holocaust-denial conspiracies. The organization publishes a hate map and publishes information about issues pertinent to racism, antisemitism, voting rights, and criminal justice reform. I use this information in my advocacy for ensuring that equality becomes a reality, not just for the 23rd District, but for the Commonwealth.

## Senate District 24

I am J. D. "Danny" Diggs. I have been married for 43 years and have 2 daughters and 4 grandchildren. I have been a law enforcement officer for 45 years with the last 23 years as the Sheriff of York and

Poquoson. I retired on January 1 to be a full-time candidate for State Senator. My reason for running is to serve the people of the 24th District as a common-sense conservative representative.
