Monthly Demonstration

Grant and John provided a discussion and demonstration on various aspects of how routers can be used in the workshop. John gave us a tutorial on straight line routing and the procedure of obtaining glue up quality straight edges. One key point is to get a very true edge as

your template. John said there are local vendors that can provide an ultra straight edge. Also you could use commercially available edges such as Festool's edge guide. Bit selection was discussed as well as trade offs. Router selection, collet cleaning, 1/4" yersus 1/2" shank tradeoffs.

plunge router features and advantages, using a router to create mortises, various fixtures and bit selection. The final discussion: router cabinets, what to look for, dust collection, table top features and concerns. It was a good discussion with lots of audience discussion and questions..
