RECREATION DEVELOPMENT MOVES ON TO PHASE

It's a happy day for Alton taxpayers when \$3,000 in the town budget buys a project with a price tag of \$71,060. And that's exactly what appears to be taking shape with Phase II of the Parks and Playgrounds Commission master plan.

A recent meeting of the Commission's Chairman Jonathon Downing, representatives of the State Recreation Services Office in Concord and Alton selectmen cleared the final hurdle for the realization of the development referred to as "Phase II". The project hit a snag earlier when officials of the U.S. Department of the Interior, National Park Service in Philadelphia, disagreed with a land appraisal figure, in effect causing a reduction of the grant to about one half of what was originally approved.

The good news is that Alton's Parks and Playgrounds Commission did not give up, but is now securing pledges of cash, labor and materials to make up the difference and thus requalify for the \$30,750 grant originally approved. Chairman Downing reports that the Barbershop Jamboree Committee has pledged \$5,000 toward the project, while Alton Youth League volunteers will contribute \$13,000 in labor. Downing himself is contributing all architect fees. Other individuals are pledging services, use of equipment and materials. But Downing stresses that other gifts are still needed and he will be happy to hear from anyone who would like to help. Any gift (cash, labor or materials) will be matched equally up to the maximum of the grant.

Phase II is based on the original Jones and McGuirk land gift along the Merrymeeting River, which together with the former Ballou land will provide a parking area and footbridge across the river to a multi-purpose recreational area that will include a baseball diamond. a "tot area" for young ones, drinking fountain, signage, park benches and the starting point for a jogging/hiking trail and cross-country trail that ultimately in Phase III would be the final connector to Alton Bay and the Alton Bay State Forest.

NEW VIETNAM MONUMENT TO BE DEDICATED MAY 30

Stuart Carmichael, an aide to Congressman Bob Smith, will be the guest speaker as a new monument in honor of those who served their country during the Vietnam War is dedicated in Monument Square on Memorial 1987.

The monument, erected by the Town of Alton and Post #72 of the American Legion, will be presented by Ed Russell and Jonathan Downing as the roll call of Vietnam veterans is read by Steven Temple. Post Commander Kim Kroeger will preside over the ceremony.

Prior to the dedication a parade from Monument Square to Riverside Cemetery will begin at 9:45a.m. with the invocation by Monsignor Leo Hines. Parade participants include Parade Marshalls A.W. AMANDA S.SKINNER NAMED TOWN PLANNER FOR ALTON

In accordance with a Town Meeting vote to seek professional assistance in planning town development, the Planning Board has solicited and reviewed applications for the position of Town Planner.

Chairman Stephen Barsanti announced on May 22 approval of Amanda S. Skinner for the post. She undertook her duties on May 26 in the Town Hall, where she will work and be accessible to the public on a schedule to be announced.

A native of Maryland, the Town Planner is 29, lives with her husband in Kearsarge while seeking a home in the Lakes Region. With bachelor and master degrees in geography, Skinner is a cartographer and geography instructor. She served in Michigan as Project Planner in a 123-community regional planning agency, and since 1985 as Planning Coordinator for the Kalamazoo Downtown Development Authority, where her responsibilities included land use planning, site development, project planning and developer assistance.

Skinner, who is employed by the Lakes Region Planning Commission, will work half-time for Alton. The function of the Town Planner is to provide professional support to the Planning Board in assessing the impact of development proposals on the Town, particularly in relation to pertinent Town and State regulations and policies; to make appropriate recommendations to the Board; and to facilitate the review and approval process for such proposals.

RESTORATION OF OLD GRAVE SITES NEEDS VOLUNTEERS

Traces of the pioneers who wrung a living from the harshness of New Hampshire are fading from view. You can find their cellar holes in the woodlands they once cleared to farm, the arrow-straight stone walls quartering the forest. And here and there the markers, plain or fancy, where friends and relatives laid them to rest.

Within the limits of Alton are perhaps 125 identified cemeteries or graveyards(designations for public or private grounds), probably more lie still hidden in the woods. Trust funds provide for perpetual care for a few; some are still under family care; the larger part are, in effect, abandoned.

Cemetery Trustee Tom Hoopes and Judy
Fry of the Historical Society believe we owe
it to these tamers of the land, as well as
to ourselves, their beneficiaries, to give
these graves the care and respect their occupants have earned.

In March, the Town voted \$1,000 toward this end, but what is most needed is citizen commitment, backed by time and effort, to restore to the many neglected sites an appropriate dignity.

Accordingly, Hoopes and Fry have set a meeting at the Gilman Library at 7:30p.m. on Wednesday, June 17, as an opportunity for citizens with a sense of historical propriety to come together and discuss what can and should be done.



FOCUS ON: JENNIFER MYNTER

Jennifer Mynter has dedicated her tire life to athletics and helping young people. She started out on the slopes at the age of two with downhill skiing. Her father, the ski coach at Norwich University, gave her all the necessary hints to become a successful skier. At the age of 16, she was the head archery counselor at a day camp in Vermont, where she emphasized the need for outdoor education.

When Jennifer graduated from high school she attended St. Lawrence University in Cantin, NY, where she decided to become a physical education teacher. "I became a phys ed teacher because I believe that education needs to be creative. If the kids are doing something active, then they are learning more than they can in a classroom." This school year is her first year as a physical education teacher and coach in Alton and she is hitting it big with the kids. Mostly because she understands the day to day problems a kid has and discusses ways of finding solutions with you.

Before Jennifer came to Alton she was employed at Brewster Academy in Wolfeboro, where she was coach of the ski team that finished second during the 1985-86 season. She also introduced lacrosse and coached the team to two winning seasons. "I love to compete in sports. I think athletics is the game of life. You have your wins and losses."

In her case, athletics does have its wins. In December, Jennifer took on the new challenge of Telemark downhill skiing on cross-country-type skiis with metal edges. She competed during the winter Eastern Circuit and was selected by the U.S. Ski Association to participate in the North American Telemark Championships in Aspen, Colorado, in March. There were two qualifying rounds for the 50 entrants, with 16 women qualifying for the finals. Jennifer placed 12th, losing by half a second to a Norwegian woman who eventually took first place. She plans to continue the sport and hopes to find a

The New Hampshire State Bird, the Black Fly, is with us again, as you can tell by the gyrations of the summer folk who venture too near the tree line.


Often overlooked in this annual confrontation is the fact that these carniverous creatures will dine off any red-blooded snack they can get at.

You can earn your pet's gratitude by spraying target areas with insect repellant prior to letting them outdoors.
