

100th ANNIVERSARY OF LAKE SHORE RAILROAD TO BE NOTED JUNE 17

How many of us have taken a walk or ridden bicycles along the trail that runs along the old railroad tracks? It gives us 20th century people a taste of what 19th century people saw on their ride from Lakeport to Alton Bay on the Lake Shore Railroad.

On Sunday, June 17, Alton will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the official completion of the Lake Shore RR. At 1p.m., at the Community Center in Alton Bay, a brief ceremony will take place with Selectmen Chairman Bob Calvert as the speaker. Also, ground-breaking for the Alton Bay Revitalization and dedication of the new sign designating "Railroad Square" will occur. Al Wilder, the railroad enthusiast who got the celebration going, is trying to raise funds for a commemorative plaque for the station-house.

The ice went out of Lake Winnipesaukee officially at 12:10p.m. on the 22nd. The last ice had its hold near Black Cat Island and Becky's Garden in Centre Harbor.

Kissel will enjoy dinner for two at the Victoria Pier compliments of owners, Ann and Bill Bunker.

Records of ice-out date back more than 100 years. The 1990 melting falls about in the middle of the range of early and late dates. In 1989 ice was last seen on April 25.

Ice-out is cause for much local speculation and serves as a standing topic of conversation. More importantly, the annual occurrence is an omen marking warmer days and the advent of another tourist season.

10,000 NEW RESIDENTS

I bet you haven't noticed the new residents in town. At least 10,000 of them have moved in. How could you miss that many, you may ask? They moved in quietly, by truck, in broad daylight. But you had to be very observant to notice. Need some more hints?

If you use "The Lake" you might have noticed. If you are an informed fisherperson you might have heard. If you drive a boat on "The Lake" slow enough, you might have noticed our new residents. Any guess who they might be?

Their biological name is Salmo gairdneri, more commonly called the Rainbow Trout. The NH Fish and Game Department has stocked them in Winni to take some of the fishing pressure off salmon and lake trout.

Rainbow will tolerate warmer water than both salmon and lake trout. During June they can be found feeding on insect hatches. If you are on the lake this month you may see a school of rainbows feeding on the surface where a dry fly or nymph can catch one of these trout.

Be careful! Sneak up on the school because they spook easily. You may want to just sit until the school moves into your range and then make your casts. Trying to follow the school may put them down.


Any fishing method may catch these "new residents" but they can become very selective. Casting spinners at a school feeding on insects may not produce a strike. When you do hook a rainbow you may have trouble landing it. Like salmon, rainbow trout are a leaping fish and will often jump clear of the water. Gooood Luck!

Make sure you know the difference between rainbows and salmon. Rainbows always have a pinkish/redish lateral stripe. Salmon must be 15" long to be legal for keeping with a two fish limit. There is no length limit on rainbows and you may keep 7 trout or 5 pounds, whichever you catch first.

As these trout grow in Winni they should provide some fine fishing into late spring and early summer. In a year or two they should grow to 3 to 5 pounds apiece.

Till next month...If we want fish to catch we shouldn't pollute their environment either.

RAILROAD ANNIVERSARY

The Lake Shore Railroad was 40 years in the planning. What was started by the Cocheco RR in 1847 was finally completed by a company formed by the Boston, Concord & Montreal RR. The final nickel-plated spike was driven in Alton Bay at 5:30p.m. on October 25,1889, and the Lake Shore RR was completed at a cost of \$250,859.

Prior to its official opening on June 17, 1890, the line was used extensively that winter for the ice market. As the February 14, 1890, Laconia Democrat wrote, "Massachusetts and Rhode Island would soon insist on being furnished with the pure stuff instead of the ice cut from mud holes and slimey frog ponds down in their own states." That season nearly 500,000 tons of ice worth about \$2 million was harvested from Winnipesaukee and transported out on the Lake Shore RR.

Four 5-car trains ran from Laconia to Alton on dedication day. Two trains were filled with "officials". Another carried Rublee's Band for entertainment at each stop and a "brass field piece" (cannon) manned by



G.A.R. veterans for gun salutes. As Dana Philbrook wrote in his article in the <u>B & M Bulletin</u>, "The exhuberant cannonading impressed all within earshot. Most of all, the directors of the Concord & Montreal Railroad, who discovered at Alton Bay that the concussion from the field piece had cracked the windows of their elegant parlour car, the Webster.



VIEW OF RAILROAD SQUARE FROM THE NORTH


For \$1.75, a passenger could go from Lakeport to Alton Bay, take one of the Lake's steamers (also owned by the parent company, Concord & Montreal RR) to Long Island, then take the Maid of the Isles and sail to the Weirs, and then return to Lakeport by train! \$2.50 would take the passenger from Concord, through Alton Bay and over to Old Orchard Beach in Maine and back. Of course, it was a



ten hour train ride!

During its heyday, the Lake Shore RR carried lumber and ice out to connecting lines. During the summer season, there were up to 20 passenger stations along the line with trains stopping every one to three minutes! By the mid-1930's, however, the RR was in decline. In 1930,2068 passengers rode the line while only 965 passengers were logged in 1934. Freight revenues fell from \$4335 to \$482, from 18,749 tons to 548 tons. In 1935, the Lake Shore Railroad was torn up.Its life span was almost the same length of time as the struggle to get it built.

Of the ten official stations of the Lake Shore RR, amazingly, seven remain today - Loon Cove, Spring Haven, West Alton, Lake Shore Park (Carr's Point), Gilford, Lakeport and Alton Bay (which was built in the 1900's by the B & M RR).

In researching this article, I relied heavily on Dana Philbrook's article, "Lake Shore Railroad: The First Forty Years", published in the <u>B & M Bulletin</u>. I also found a great enthusiast and information source in Al Wilder of Alton Bay. On June 17,1990, the celebration of the railroad line will attract railroad enthusiasts, novices to expert. Plan to attend the ceremony to hear more about the history and catch a glimmer of past glories.


