TOWN MEETING VOTE RESULTS IN BUDGET CUTS

A close six-vote margin on the bottomline budget at the March Town Meeting has resulted in several cuts to adjust to the new lower figures.

Non-personnel cuts of \$22,109 have been effected to include the following: dropping membership in the Lakes Region Planning Commission, elimination of taxpayer-paid fireworks at the annual 4th of July celebration, elimination of the special police officer in the Bay during the summer, deferral of the crime prevention education program, and postponement of completion of the backflow prevention program on town-owned properties. Small cuts have been made in the following, while maintaining service: Landfill contract services, Old Home Week, Gilman Library, maintenance, maintenance for old graves, fuel oil. Town Hall repairs and professional services.

Personnel cuts and layoffs totalling \$49,896 for the 3/4 fiscal year remaining have been made to include: two Highway Department laborer positions(including employee benefits), the summertime assistant building inspector position, the clerk in the Selectmen and Building Inspector offices, a part-time clerk in the Town Clerk's

office, and a 5% cut in Selectmen salaries. A re- shuffling of some Town Hall

assignments will attempt to compensate for the 58 hours per week lost there as well as pursuing some possible volunteer services.

The total budget as originally presented showed no increase over 1990. An additional \$10,000 had to be found to fund the petition article approved for the Senior-Community Center. With the cuts now made, the town portion of the tax rate projects a 27 cents per thousand decrease under 1990. When grouped with the anticipated school increase of 24 cents per thousand and the County projected increase of 33 cents per thousand (including Gunstock debt service) a probable overall tax increase of 30 cents per thous-

and is currently projected. Still posing a challenge is the state's threatened cut of revenue sharing funds by 76%. Such an action will add another 11 cents per thousand to the overall tax rate.

A team from the 6th grade of the Alton Central School recently took first place in the regional competition of Odyssey of the Mind at Kingswood Regional High School.


Odyssey of the Mind is an international program which fosters creative thinking skills that involves planning innovative solutions and spontaneous problem solving.



BUG OR TROUT SEASON?

Some call May "Bug Season", but I call it "Trout Season." The hatching bugs bring forth feeding fish like brook, brown and rainbow trout. Local streams that are small and brushy are best suited for live baits and spinning rods or short fly rods. Larger rivers like the Suncook provide good fly fishing opportunities.

If one searches hard enough, there are a lot of beaver bogs around that hold some nice "natives." Coldrain Pond in New Durham and Jones Pond in Middleton require a bit more work to get to, but provide a pleasant fishing experience, trout or no trout! (Remember those two ponds are fly fishing only.)

Remember those rainbows that were stocked in Winni last spring? They are alive and well in Alton Bay. Alton's waters have been good to them because they are now 15" - 18" in length, stocky in body, and pink-fleshed.

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
FREE SOCCER CLINIC TO BE HELD JUNE 2

A team from the 6th grade of the Alton Central School recently took first place in the regional competition of Odyssey of the Mind at Kingswood Regional High School.


Odyssey of the Mind is an international program which fosters creative thinking skills that involves planning innovative solutions and spontaneous problem solving.
