#### ONE YEAR ON THE JOB: A VISIT WITH SCOTT DUNN

The soft-spoken and hard-working Town Administrator celebrates his first anniversary in that role on July 13. In that year Scott Dunn has moved to Alton and his family has increased by one. He's very positive: "I like my job and working with the people we have here." Regarding progress after one year, he says "I'm very pleased! We've got a good staff and a really good Board of Selectmen." He is very proud to have secured such strong new personnel as Kellie McGrath, Pat Rockwood, Richard Canuel, and Kenneth Ortmann.

Priorities just ahead, according to Dunn, include an intense road reconstruction project in the fall; completing the Railroad Square grant project; gearing up for 1994 budget preparation; and the rather complex and more longrange landfill closing operation. "We have been able to hold the line so far on the budget", he says, "and we hope to continue. The answer is the wise use of the tax dollars available."

As we talked, Dunn was "on site" checking progress of the wall being constructed near the Community Center at Railroad Square. Other challenges facing the town include the need for many more volunteers for the new town committees proposed. Also high on the challenge list was updating several regulations and policies, including road layout policy and protection of town roads. Considerable time since last fall is being spent on negotiations with two unions and on public assistance (welfare) issues because of the economy.

Any surprises in the first year? He smiled as he responded that he was surprised at the time it takes to tackle the total job and to do it right. One gets the impression that he is a perfectionist and that he wouldn't do

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

#### SUMMER CONCERT SERIES OFFERS FIVE PROGRAMS IN JULY






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# ADDITIONAL "CAREGIVERS" NEEDED IN ALTON

Caregivers of the Wolfeboro Area is an interfaith volunteer coalition, and part of a national movement, started in this area five years ago. A totally volunteer operation, it originally served the residents of Alton, Wolfeboro, Sandwich, Melvin Village, Wakefield, and Ossipee. More recently, Sandwich, Melvin Village and Wakefield have their own program.

They offer short-term, non-emergency volunteer services such as local transportation, out-of-town transportation for medical treatment, friendly visits to elderly or disabled, respite hours for those caring for someone at home, light household chores or yard work, or providing a meal. About 90% of the service is transportation.

With the small number of caregivers in Alton, several Wolfeboro volunteers often come into Alton to cover our base of operations. It is hoped that more Alton Volunteers can step forward as well as a local volunteer coordinator so that we can handle our own.

The service is very fulfilling to the volunteers and one serves only when one can. The organization will have someone come in and meet with those in Alton who wish to learn more or possibly serve on the local Alton list. Volunteers include both men and women. 





#### PROTECTING THE OUTDOORS

July is the month to get outside and see Alton's outdoors. There are a lot of people who vacation in Alton this month and next. They certainly enjoy our outdoors. Sometimes many of us take the environment for granted. We must do our part to preserve what we have.

Abuse of the land is the leading cause for lands to be posted. This abuse does not have to be a major environmental issue. It can be as simple as people leaving trash on another's property. Think how you would feel

coming home to a trash-strewn yard.

Carelessness is another form of abuse. A local piece of land has been posted because the owner found an arrow with a sharp hunting head attached. The archer failed to make an effort to recover the arrow. The landowner was concerned for his livestock that could have stepped on the arrow or eaten it. All it takes is one careless person to prohibit many people from enjoying the land.

The solution is really quite simple. Always ask permission to use another's land, pick up after yourself and, hopefully, after others - always take out what you take in and more. Just respect the land - somebody owns it.

Remember to respect the water, too. We are fortunate to have many lakes, streams and ponds to swim, fish and boat in. They are not to take baths in. I have seen so many people bring soap to local lakes, lather up and dive in. The products used in soaps are not good for our lakes and streams, the water life or you.

If your boat motor leaks gas or oil, fix it. With 10,000 boats using the big lake on a single busy weekend, if a quart of oil is spilled for every five gallons of gas - think about it. You can see black oil rings around many dock supports and rocks around Winni. Think locally, act globally, as the saying goes.

Get out, enjoy, and respect.

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



The casino squares will be numbered on the field and if you ticket has the matching number of the square where the cow drops a meadow muffin you win \$250.



Ben Nevis where the poet Keats took a walking tour 175 years ago. He found the mountain wreathed in clouds and wrote a thoughtful sonnet on the subject.
