- Vienna, Va., Post 180 First Vice Commander Dave Wallace, following a July 1 5K walk/run that promoted the national American Legion Be the One initiative; the National Executive Committee passed a resolution in May urging local posts to have a Be the One event on the first day of each month.



Bills addressed by American Legion Veterans Benefits Policy Analyst Joshua Hastings in a July 12 hearing before the Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations, House Committee on Veterans' Affairs. Legislation supported by the Legion in the hearing included measures to expedite and improve accuracy of temporary VA disability rating processing; require training of VA employees on the reporting of internal wrongdoing (whistleblowing); establishment of a VA Acquisition Review Board; and restoration of the VA Accountability Act.



Bills drafted and submitted by the 100 American Legion Boys Nation senators during their 2023 session in Washington, D.C.; included were measures to support teachers and to improve mental health care/reduce suicide rates.



"The current programs in many installations are very impressive. They assist veterans with employment. You have various pathways ... The issue is, for Black veterans, is if they're going to improve the economic outcomes, they have to take advantage of the resources that are already there. In order to be able to do that and learn of the resources and the various programs the federal agencies have and the private sector has, they have to be allowed to take full advantage of those programs. That's currently not happening. A lot of it is due to commanders' input. They're not allowing these individuals to get to these programs and take advantage of what's out there in a timely fashion."

Former American Legion Baseball players who have been inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y., following the July 23 enshrinement of five-time Major League All-Star first-baseman Fred McGriff, who played for American Legion Post 248 in Tampa, Fla., and third baseman Scott Rolen, who played Legion ball in Jasper, Ind., was named an All-Star seven times, and was the 2005 American Legion Baseball Graduate of the Year.
