Show & Tell continued.

Simon Robbins showed us the results of his weekend at 'Down Under Turn Around' at Philip Island. Below is a small platter in ash and a bowl from an unknown wood (possibly elm) with a 1920 penny coin inserted into its base. The coin is Simon's solution to a mishap that saw a hole appear in the bottom of



the bowl during turning. At right are the tiger myrtle and Huon pine bowls as seen in last month's newsletter,



Alexander Drysdale showed us the platter, at right, that he has made from an environmentally safe and extremely durable treated pine. The process called *'acetylation'* uses acetic anhydride, which comes from acetic acid (vinegar when in dilute form) and does not add toxins to the environment.

Although not for Show & Tell, Alexander had an item of interest to show us at morning tea recently. Alexander challenged us to guess what this is. It is approximately 28cms long and feather-light with



a dry rattle sound when shaken. If you haven't guessed you aren't alone, as we couldn't guess either.



I'll show you the answer on the last page.


WANTED KNOWN.



reminder to me that we all can be in awe of this magnificent tree and what it stands for."

MACHINE DAMAGE. An unpleasant surprise greeted Club President **Len Preece** when he entered the sanding room on the morning of Friday 12th; yet another of the club's machines has been rendered inoperable following damage during use. Below is a photo of the **almost-new** sanding belt from the large sander, showing a rip that covers nearly half the length, and an additional hole.

We all know that, in woodworking, accidents can happen, sometimes with **serious** results. When a mishap like this occurs, leaving it for someone else to find can turn an **accident** into a **disaster**.

If you are the unlucky person who happens to cause some damage **PLEASE TELL SOMEONE** who is in charge so that the problem can be remedied.

You will not be "*shot at dawn*" but you could save another club member from being hurt. If you are not sure of how to use a machine please ask for advice.



PARKING IN ELM DRIVE. Old Cheese Factory staff have reminded us that we are **not** to park our vehicles in the elm drive at the back of the clubroom. Parking is permitted during **loading and unloading** of equipment only, following which we must proceed to a parking spot in the market area or in the general car par at the front of the OCF grounds.

Parking, for those who have **Disabled Parking Rights**, is still available at the rear of the potters shed.

RELOCATION PLANS. With the completion of the laying of the slab for our new premises, the committee is giving some thought to how the big move to the new building will be accomplished.

In order to leave our present premises ready for 'vacant possession' we will have to remove all fixtures and fittings from our present workshop. It is thought that the quieter period over Christmas may be useful for this project, depending on the progress of the new workshop. At present it is thought that we may be able to make the move in January 2019. With this in mind, it has been suggested that we could begin removing ducting from the dust collector following Gala Day. Although we will be without a dust collector for a while, with the exception of the drum sander, sanding machines may be used in the outdoor section outside the back door. The committee is interested in members' opinion.

FORMEN NEEDED. Anyone who has moved house can imagine what a daunting task this move will be, therefore, Len Preece has suggested that we divide the work into sections with each to be overseen by a member who can direct activities. We have been offered assistance by **Hare & Forbes Machinery House** who will take care of the heavy lifting with forklifts. MORE WD40 HINTS

21. WD-40 is great for removing crayon from walls. Spray on the mark and wipe with a clean rag. 22. Also, if you've discovered that your teenage daughter has washed and dried a tube of lipstick with a load

of laundry, saturate the lipstick spots with WD-40 and rewash. Presto! The lipstick is gone!

- 23. Lubricates tracks in sticking home windows and makes them easier to open.
- 24. Spraying an umbrella stem makes it easier to open and close.
- 25. Restores and cleans padded leather dashboards in vehicles, as well as vinyl bumpers.
- 26. Restores and cleans roof racks on vehicles.
- 27. Lubricates and stops squeaks in electric fans.
- 28. Lubricates wheel sprockets on tricycles, wagons, and bicycles for easy handling.
- 29. Lubricates fan belts on washers and dryers and keeps them running smoothly.
- 30. Keeps rust from forming on saws and saw blades, and other tools.



Each compound contributes to one or more of WD 40's properties: freeze resistance, water resistance, heat resistance, as well as lubricity. Because it is not made from synthetic compounds, it is 100% biodegradable. WD 40 was created in the early 1950's – an incredible achievement that has stood the test of time. More modern products specialize in particular applications. For example "Top savers" used for working metal surfaces include nano particle waxes which reduce friction on the surface long after the solvent has evaporated. On the down side of WD 40: don't breath in the vapours – it is bad for you. Bill Munt.

LATHE SPEED When you finish your wood turning session make sure that the power is "OFF" and the speed is set on LOW. If the machine is belt driven put the belt on the SMALLEST PULLEY at the electric motor and the LARGEST PULLEY at the headstock spindle. If the machine has a variable speed control, turn the spindle speed to its LOWEST speed setting. If the machine has a cone drive, return the speed control handle to the LOWEST spindle speed. After mounting a new piece of wood, and before you start the lathe, ALWAYS check and adjust the speed setting – EVERYTIME. - **Bill Munt**
