The toys for our Annual Toy Program always attract attention and had their own display.






A GIFT FROM THE POXON FAMILY.





John McMahon showed us the engraving that he has done in the piece of redgum at far right. John has called it 'Forest Nymph'



The bowls at left are John's also, far left is redgum, the other pearwood. John also showed us photos of some bowls he has made for members of his

family. Here is the touching story accompanying John's work.





- 6 bowls approximately 140mm diameter and 70mm high, with a wall thickness of 4mm. Black highlighter pen on the rim & finished with 5 6 coats of Livos Countertop Oil. These bowls were made for each of the children raised in the house, & although they all look similar, like the children, each bowl is slightly different.
- A vase made for my mother, approximately 320mm high and 140mm diameter, with a wall thickness of 3mm to the bottom of the leaves, where the internal walls are rounded to leave a thicker base for stability. Leaf texturing is done with a Dremel, all black outlining & the number are pyrographed, and the leaves and stems coloured with green u-Beaut wood dye. Finish is 8 coats of Livos Countertop Oil. The number 301 is the old house number, engraved over two heart-shaped leaves melded into a single unit. The stems of the leaves form an unbroken band around the vase, encompassing 6 large leaves and 17 smaller leaves, representing the children and grandchildren that were nurtured in this home.



As anticipated, being so old, this wood was pretty hard to turn, requiring frequent visits to the grindstone.



However, there was a surprising amount of movement in it also, which became evident when trying to get a snug fit of the box lid. It was also an interesting exercise in maintaining tool control when cutting into the endgrain of this timber with an overhang over the tool rest in excess of 300mm. Luckily we had no mishaps.
