TOOL SHARPENING VIDEO:

We had an additional speaker this month when **Keith Towe** showed us a video on sharpening lathe tools. A subject dear to his heart, Keith has often lamented the poor sharpening that has sometimes taken place in our workshop. As Keith points out good quality lathe tools are extremely expensive to replace and ruining a tool with inexpert sharpening is not only wasteful but can

make it dangerous to use. Keith believes that every turner should learn to sharpen his/her tools properly. A reminder too, to always wear protective glasses when tackling the job.

Before he resumed his seat **Keith Towe** took care of **SHOW & TELL:** At right is **John McMahon's** lidded box. The wood is aurucaria, a plantation timber similar to balsa but denser and often used to make surf boards. The trim is second-hand merbau.



Chris Drysdale's pens are next. At left is blackwood inset with a saw & plane. The other is a pine cone set in resin.



Keith Towe turned the small vase from Casurina obesa (swamp oak) which is becoming more rare due to the increasing salinity of the water in which it grows.

Richard Gething turned the bowl

at right using a piece of Brazillian pine left behind by **Gary King** when he moved North.

The Cost of Craftsmanship:

Keith Towe

For Bespoke woodworkers, the cost of quality timber is an aspect that many <u>buyers</u> often, (very often) fail to consider, be it in Cabinet Making, Box Making, Turning, Carving or Natural finished Toy Making, the Timber materials used are a major cost that needs to be factored into the price they set for their work. I recently saw an Internet article offering a section of a well-known Australian Timber for sale. It was 150mm x 25mm x 1Mt long, and was \$60 a lineal Mt.


Now few small crafts persons buy their material by the Cubic Metre, and many of us still measure our material by the Super Foot (12" x 12" x 1") therefore the above material at 150x25x1 Mt would equal -6" x 1" x 39" equalling 234 cubic inches, or 1.6SF, and each cubic inch would cost about \$0.256, so costing say a 6" x 6" x 2" (72 ci) small Turned Bowl, the Timber material cost would \$18.43, and when the Time, Skill and Profit factors are added, the Turner would need at the very least a \$60 return on his time and investment. Now, will Crafts buyers pay \$60 for a Bowl? or a nicely made Box or Carving using this equation?

The object of this article was to highlight that **All Timber** has a Value, and depending upon the Species and the Quality, many Species are **VERY VALUBLE**, but unfortunately, an acknowledgement of the value of Timber rarely reaches the buyers of Hand Crafted Items.

Lastly, it is also often acknowledged that if you/we sell (give away) well- made Craft Work very much below its true value, we Under Value that Craft within the Community to the detriment of Crafts people trying to establish a living within their chosen Craft.

I have attached a file that shows the English prices for some exotics at 2009 prices in UK Pounds, and as exotic they would be more expensive than say our Australian Blackwood, although Olive could hardly be classed as exotic, but the idea is to awaken people to the **TRUE** cost of good quality timber wether it comes from a backyard tree, or from the Timber supplier.
