MAY GENERAL MEETING.

Our speaker this month was **Robert Low**, from **SACHYS Industries**, accompanied by his wife **Anne**, and colleagues **Paul** and **Stephen**. Robert demonstrated the **Robertson Square Drive** screw for us.





Photos above show the unique square drive head of the screws and varying self tapping threads.

"Robertson" screws were invented in Canada by Peter Robertson in 1908. The drive system is reputed to be better than the conventional drives, and the quality of the screws superior due to their 33% carbon steel content, making them extremely strong.

The screw will not break under a heavy load. The tapered driver locks into the square drive, griping the screw. The driver doesn't jump out of the screw head and the screw will stay put even when the driver is held at an angle.

With the self tapping thread, pre-drilling is unnecessary except in extremely hard wood.

The photo above right shows Robert demonstrating the strength of the screws when used in pocket-hole joinery. Timber will break before the joint will. Robert used a 10 amp drill, proving that high powered tools aren't necessary. Members were given the opportunity to buy some of the merchandise on display and the club received a gift of a package of screws.

DUST EXTRACTOR NEWS. The club's dust extraction unit is up and running now. Starting procedure for the machine is as follows:

Turn shaker switch to manual. Run it for 10 seconds. Return switch to off Turn shaker switch to manual Run for 10 seconds. Return shaker switch to auto.

When using a machine, the gate on the dust collection duct **must be opened** (picture at right) then **closed** when work is finished. To close a gate, push it toward the duct, as indicated by the red arrow. The three duct gates in the breezeway must be open at all times.

There are 3flexible dust hoses, connected to the ducts throughout the workshop, that can be used instead of the vacuum cleaners.

When the Micronair bins under the dust collector are full, they can be emptied onto the mulch heap at the back of the children's garden.

NEXT CLUB LUNCHEON: Following the success of the last club luncheon in April, at the Lynbrook Hotel, the committee has decided to use the same venue for our next luncheon on August 15th.

FARMERS' MARKET. We are enjoying continued success with this venture. The market has developed a regular clientele and the income provided serves to benefit all club members as we no longer need to run an annual raffle to raise funds.

Compared to the "all day" session every week for 3 months, that the raffle entails, the market involves only half a day twice a month throughout the year, in a relaxed, social atmosphere. We ask members who are able to spare an hour or two, once or twice a month, to come along and give us a hand. We need help with the setting up of our 3 gazebos, directing traffic for parking, greeting patrons and collecting donations at the entrance, or helping to dismantle the gazebos at the end of the market.

The income from, the gate donations is used to buy the materials for our toy program, the tools and equipment that keeps the workshop humming, and the maintenance of the club room.

MACHINE MAINTENANCE: Following the recent discovery of one of the bandsaws in a state of needing considerable maintenance, club members are asked to keep a watchful eye when operating a machine. Being in constant use as our machines are, it doesn't take long for vibration to take effect, working bolts loose to the point of parts falling off. If you suspect that something is wrong, please ask for an inspection.

FABRIC DONATION: The club has received from, **Impact Blinds & Curtains in Fountain Gate**, a generous donation of several metres of brocade curtain fabric to make some of the 84 little mattresses needed for the beds, cradles and prams that are part of our toy program.

MAIL BOXES FOR FIRE VICTIMS. Following the severe bush fire damage in March this year, Berwick Woodworkers received a request from a Facebook group called '*Victorian Bushfire Horse Help'* for some mail boxes that would replace those that were burnt out.

The absence of mail boxes has created a problem for insurance companies making it difficult for them to locate properties in the area.

Club members made up 30 boxes using timber donated by *Van Steensil* in Officer, and paint donated by *Wattle Fountain Gate*. Vermont Woodworkers also helped out, making 40 boxes.

They recently sent off just over two hundred and fifty pens to troops in Afghanistan and Iraq and now plan to send another five hundred pens late September so they can be handed out for remembrance day. This will be an ongoing project as we currently have around four thousand five hundred troops in various overseas postings. It is hoped other pen makers will step up to help this project achieve its goal. After the first batch were distributed a letter of thanks was received from a senior officer who thanked those involved and went

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MORE USES FOR AUSTRALIAN TREES: By Keith Towe

Many of our Acacias have astringent qualities often use by our Native Australian people. The Bark was used to make a decoction or infusion and used to treat Diarrhoea or Dysentery, also for some eye infections and a number of other severe and minor ailments.

There are many other Australian shrubs, trees and plants that have been used by Aborigines for these purposes, but as a wood worker I have only discussed Trees.

My first remembrance of Wattle Bark was when a truck load arrived at our local playground from the Tannery to be spread beneath the Slides, Swings and Monkey Bars to absorb the numerous falls we had as children. The smell of the newly spread Tanbark was quite distinct.

Most woodworkers know and recognise Blackwood, and eagerly source, it so little advice is needed.

Possibly the most widely known essential Oils in Australia are Tea Tree Oil and Eucalypt Oil. Both are steam distilled from the leaves and small green branches of these species.



More Uses for Australian Trees (continued)

Tea Tree Oil has been used for many 100's of years by early settlers and for many 1000's of years by our Native Aboriginal's as an antiseptic to treat Ringworm, Head Lice, Psoriasis and toenail infections. There are now many Tea Tree Plantations in NSW and Queensland for the cultivation of Tea Tree for Oil Production.

An aside, in 1858 Eucalyptus Oil was first used for lighting the first Street Lights in Kyneton, Victoria. The Oil was converted to a Gas then used to light Street Lamps. There are also reports of Gum leaves used as a bandage around severe cuts to the body with remarkable results.
