

TURN AROUND DOWN UNDER - by John McMahon.

Turnaround events are held in various locations around Australia on an almost monthly basis throughout the year. While each event is different, they all follow a common format. They are live-in weekends for wood turner's, with accommodation & meals provided. Some events cater for other activities as well, such as pyrography and scroll-sawing. Attendees need to bring all their own equipment, including lathes, tools, safety equipment and wood. In Victoria, Jim Carroll, and Neil Ellis from U-Beaut, will also have pop-up shops for supplies. The format of these weekends is, I believe, unique to Australia and New Zealand, as turners spend the time working on their own projects, talking and sharing ideas and experiences with others, and learning lots from some exceptional turners. Attendees range from complete beginners who have never turned on a lathe, to some of the world's best demonstrators and teachers.

Recently I attended the Forest Edge Turnaround in Neerim East, near Warragul, in July, and the Down Under Turnaround at Cowes, Phillip Island in September. About 40 attendees were at Forest Edge, including a number of scrollers and pyrographers. The photo shows some of the lathes set up for the weekend.

Phillip Island is where these events originated, and this year was the 23rd event. Although numbers were down slightly on last year, there were still more than 80 attendees, including a number of lady turners. Several attendees came from Queensland, NSW, Tasmania and South Australia. Many of the male attendees were accompanied by their wives, and a number of craft activities and shopping excursions kept them occupied. A lot of the attendees go to several of these events on a regular basis, and friendships are formed between people that would otherwise never cross paths.

Both events were very enjoyable, with lots of friendly people. Everyone is there ready to lend a helping hand, provide advice, and share their experiences. I learnt lots, and would thoroughly recommend both of these weekends to anyone interested in woodturning, no matter what your level of experience.

Refinishing Wood With Coconut Oil

One of the best, most versatile finishes, coconut oil can be used for a warm, not too shiny and easy to take care of wood finish. Whether you are new to woodworking or a seasoned DIY pro, if you have not tried finishing wood with coconut oil, you should definitely try this idea out. Much easier to deal with than traditional wood oil, the coconut oil finish will leave your wood glowing. Hides imperfections and scratches, too!

Accidentally gluing your work to the bench is a mistake that usually only happens once. Keeping a roll of wax or parchment paper under your glue-up will not only keep your workbench clean by catching glue drips, but will also prevent your work from sticking to the bench while it's drying
