• A summary of correspondence from last Committee meeting was read.

President's Report.

- The compound mitre saw and small bandsaw have automatic vacuum cleaners installed that will start when the machines are started.
- The telephone is now connected using a new number 87868794. The delays in getting our own number back were unacceptable. John Damon is installing cable to the workshop for the external bell.
- The new door in the club room has been installed and will be finished soon.
- The exhaust fan in the finishing room is finished.
- We are waiting for our contractor to check one of our roller doors as it has become noisy. Also the light and fan in the toilet will be checked.
- The sensor lights on the verandah will be installed soon.
- We will be meeting with the Shire of Cardinia to discuss the closing of the 4Cs charity and its effect on us.
- We will be meeting with the charities to discuss the toys for this year.
- Two older Triton work, router and saw benches are available to members for a donation. Also some older tools are available. They will be passed to the Kimbe group if not taken.

Treasurer's report.

- The fixed term deposit will be renewed soon.
- The Farmers Market donations are lower at present but are steady.
- We have 86 financial members.
- We are waiting for the security sensor invoice when the work is done.
- New member membership fees will be adjusted until the end of the financial year.
- Our insurance is being reviewed before it is renewed. We will raise the contents cover to include our new machinery.
- We have sent our first donation to the Gippsland Emergency Relief Fund Inc. for bushfire reconstruction works. This fund is run by the local council and is suitable for our donation. The second donation will be sent by the committee when the situation is clearer. The donations are from our two January Farmers Markets donations. We will consider putting a notice at the Farmers Markets to tell customers what has been donated.
- A mobile wifi unit for direct purchases and payments is being considered by the committee.
- We were unsuccessful in obtaining a grant from the Lynbrook Hotel. We will still put variable speed on two lathes when funds are available.
- Our security package at the bank may be reconsidered because of its cost.
- We have written to Zagame's regarding their grant.
- The lowest age for new members family membership is usually 13 to 18 years. This can be reduced where insurance is available and the senior member takes total responsibility for the junior and we are satisfied our safety requirements will be upheld. The number of junior members would need careful monitoring.
- Some of our lathes need to be checked and maintained. The indexing pin on one lathe is not secure.
