Katerina Zorin, who favours the band saw, has been working on the animals below. Katerina has also made the key ring in the shape of a heart.










Katerina was taken by surprise recently when she visited her letter box to be greeted by this strange looking spider.

RADIAL ARM SAW

Stock must be held firmly on the table and against the fence for all crosscutting operations.

The ends of long boards must be supported level with the table. Before turning on the motor be certain that all clamps and locking devices are tight and the depth of cut is correct.

Keep the guard and anti-kickback device in position.

When sawing, allow the blade to run up to speed before beginning the cut.

Use a feed which allows the blade to spin without stalling. Do not remove them without your Mentor or Session Leader's permission.

Always return the saw to the rear of the table after completing a

crosscut or mitre cut.

Never remove stock from the table until the saw has been returned.

Maintain a 6 in. margin of safety.

Shut off the motor, wait for the blade to stop and disconnect power before making any adjustments.

Be sure the blade is stopped before you leave the machine.

Keep the table clean and free of dust, sawdust, wood scraps, tools and excessive amounts of sawdust.

Secure approval from your Mentor or Session Leader before making ripping cuts or other special setups.



DUST COLLECTOR CRISIS: Recently the club's dust collector that is situated in the breezeway, sent out an S.O.S and began spilling dust all over the work bench. This is not the habit of our normally well behaved dust collector and an explanation was quickly sought. When the machine was dismantle it became obvious that the poor thing hadn't been emptied for a long time and was hopelessly choked up with sawdust. As can be seen in the picture on the left, even the hose was clogged solid.

A notice has now been put on the machine to remind members to make sure to empty it every Monday.

There is no designated member to whom this task has been allocated; it is the responsibility of whoever is using it at the time.

ANOTHER REASON TO WEAR A MASK: Like many hobbies and leisure activities, this craft that we love has an element of

danger. Wood dust is hazardous and should be treated with the respect it demands. I recently heard an ABC radio interview with a woman whose son had spent a lengthy time in hospital, struck down by **Cryptococcal meningitis** which was caused by a fungus called **Cryptococcus**. While the fungus is commonly found in soil and bird droppings, the variety that caused this illness, **C.** *gatti*, is associated with several trees, including **eucalyptus**. It happened that the young man had been doing some woodwork and **sanding redgum**. Due to the fact that he had not been wearing a mask he had, of course, inhaled the sanding dust causing an infection in his lungs which travelled to his brain. Pretty scarey stuff. The man nearly died. A mother nearly lost her son. A good reason to wear a mask when sanding and also a good reason to look after the club's dust collecting equipment.

The club's dust collectors are provided for the benefit of each member.

TIME FOR A SMILE:


