THE BIG QUESTION: "What can I make to enter into this year's **Woodworking Display and Expo?**

We kicked off our Expo sub-committee this week & things went pretty well. Here are a few points for you to consider:

- This year's Expo will be on Friday 7th July 5pm 8pm, Saturday 8th July 9am 5pm, and Sunday 9th July 9am 5pm, in the clubrooms and workshop.
- The Expo sub-committee is looking for new members, so if any club member is interested in joining, please see John McMahon.
- The next sub-committee meeting will be in the clubrooms, 10.30am on Wednesday 5th April, the same day as our next general meeting, which is at 1pm following a barbeque lunch at 12noon.
- We are looking for members to donate prizes for our Expo raffle. If you have an item of woodwork you think would be suitable, let John McMahon know as soon as possible. We need to know all the prizes & their value before we can print the raffle tickets, & would like to photograph the prizes for publicity purposes. Tickets will be sold at the Farmers & Craft Markets leading up to the Expo, so the sooner we can get the prizes, the more opportunities we will have to sell tickets.
- The Club commission on sales this year will increase to 15% to offset increased costs and the club's cost of using electronic payment processes, which now constitute the vast majority of sales. This percentage is still considerably less than the commission charged by other clubs and galleries, whose commissions are generally 30% or more.
- Club members are encouraged to get working on their Expo pieces now. Remember that anything exhibited at previous Expo's can't be entered as an exhibition piece this year, but can still be included on the Sales stand that we will also run. The aim of the Expo is to display the varied woodworking interests of our members, at all levels of expertise, so exhibition pieces do not need to be gallery quality.
- We are also looking for volunteers to demonstrate at the Expo. We intend demonstrating woodturning, bandsaw, scrollsaw, rocking horse making, Dremel & pyrography, so we need people to man these stations for an hour or so at a time throughout the exhibition. If anyone would like to demonstrate other woodworking crafts, eg carving, intarsia, marquetry, etc., that would also be great. Please let John McMahon know.

As we all know Treated Pine is prohibited from being used in any shape or form at the Club. Off cuts have actually been found in our kindling bags of firewood as well.

For the safety of all concerned, can members please refrain from using Treated Pine while at the club.

Please check the timber you are bringing in - is **not Treated Pine**.

SCROLL SAW SAFETY ADVICE

Know and follow the general safety rules for operating power tools. Make all setups and adjustments with the power off. Use the correct blade for the stock (thickness) and curve (sharpness) being cut.

Never try to turn a small radius with a wide blade. The radius should not be more than three times the blade width.

Clamp the blade securely in both chucks with the teeth pointing down.

Adjust the guides so they properly support the blade.

Adjust the hold down so that it applies light pressure to the stock. Rotate the motor by hand to check that all adjustments have been made properly.

Plan cuts to avoid backing out of curves.

Do not force the work into the blade. This can cause the blade to bend then break.

Keep your fingers out of line with the saw.

FROM BUTCHER TO WOODWORKER: THE SAUSAGE-MAKING SECRETS OF GROMPY THE BUTCHER - DON BUCHANAN (70) by Lauraine McDonald.

Don Buchanan (70) or "Grompy" as he is known to his grandchildren has spent most of his life working in the meat industry.

As such, he knows a bit about 'killing fussy customers (and his favourite coworkers) with kindness'.

In the shop, the fussy customers always wanted fresh nicely cut meat and that sometimes meant retrieving the 'best and freshest' meat from the front, not the back, of the display tray.

In the abattoir, throwing fat, putting lumps of fat into gumboots and sewing up the sleeves and trouser legs of co-workers' uniforms eased the boredom. Born in Mordialloc to a carpenter father and council cleaner mother, Don

ended up at Jordanville Tech, which he described as a 'bit of a rough school' at the time. Co-incidentally it was the same school **Brian Crowe** attended.

He left school at Form 5, completed a three-year butcher apprenticeship, then returned to study at William Angliss College of TAFE night school to become an accredited Meat Inspector, an enviable position at the time because it was a government job which delivered more pay for less hours.

The role of a Meat Inspector involved post-mortem animal inspections in abattoirs to ensure the meat produced was fit for human consumption. The post-mortem checked every carcass for any diseases and condemned affected parts. Those parts would be removed, and the remaining carcass returned as a so-called "Anzac" for processing into meat.

At one stage Don was investigating joining the Upper Beaconsfield Men's Shed, but the mandatory morning meetings and relatively small wood working area did not appeal. He met **John McMahon** at the Casey ARC swimming pool one morning and he suggested the Berwick Wood Workers. He was so impressed with what he saw that he joined straight away.

Don is now the Secretary, a role which involves regular sausage-making demonstrations (not!), setting meeting agendas, writing up minutes, managing club correspondence, producing market reports and event management.

After marrying a customer's daughter in 1974, Don (Grompy) and his wife **Heather** (Gronny) now have two children (a daughter and a son) and nine grandchildren.

PROPOSED SAFETY PROGRAM: As advised by Don Buchanan.



Just for fun I looked up the link, for free wooden toy plans, suggested by **Nigel Dukes**. All sorts of interesting plans there, from very simple to more complicated.








Amelia (Brandy) Rogers has sent me copies of some old advertisements. Can you imagine getting away with publishing them these days. I think somebody would get lynched!
