This year's exhibition of members' work will be held over the weekend of Friday July 12^{th} 5pm - 8pm, Saturday July 13^{th} and Sunday July 14^{th} 9am - 5pm both days.

Interest in the Expo has grown steadily over each of our previous exhibitions, with approximately 700 visitors attending last year. 39 members displayed 645 items in the exhibition and on the sales stand, and more than \$6,400 in sales resulted. Hopefully this year's will be the best yet and everyone should be getting stuck in to their pieces by now. Remember that this is an exhibition of members' work at all levels of expertise, so we are not expecting gallery quality work, although our standard is generally pretty good! We have some really talented woodworkers in our club.

Our Expo sub-committee has commenced meetings, and planning is well under way. However, new members are always welcome. If you want to be a part of this, please contact **John McMahon** (0437096840). Flyers have been printed to promote the Expo, and we will be looking for volunteers to distribute these in the coming weeks. Our raffle tickets will be available shortly also, for sale at the markets. Help will also be needed in a number of areas as the Expo approaches, and, like last year, there will be some limitations on workshop availability in the last few days leading up to the Expo. 


That is all from me, stay safe until next time.



COLIN'S PLANE COLLECTION. Colin Radley has sent me some photos of the cabinet that he has made to house his beloved planes. Here's what Colin has to say.

I've been collecting and using hand planes for many years.

A lot of moulding planes came from Boot Sales in the UK but I've continued buying planes from Trash & Treasure Markets here in Australia. Most are Stanley or Record but in more recent years I've added a few Pope models. When I was making a bow rocker for a rocking horse a few years ago I really wanted a Compass Plane (also known as a Shipwrights or Circular Plane) as this has a flexible sole that can be adjusted to be concave or convex. I managed without one but a year or so later one came up for sale on Gumtree.

It wasn't complete, the adjustment knob was missing but it was cheap. I thought I could make the knob but it needed a left-hand thread inside the shaft and a right-hand thread outside so it remained incomplete. Another year passed by and I was looking on Gumtree again and someone was selling parts of a Compass Plane and I managed to buy the knob for a few dollars plus postage!

I had boxes of planes in the garage plus those regularly used stored in a tool chest indoors but I decided it was time to make a dedicated plane storage chest so they were all in one location. If I made the chest look 'attractive' I could get away with storing it indoors!

Some cheap pine boards were purchased and I sketched out a design.

Parts were cut at the Club but I found that some of the boards warped (I should have purchased some decent pine!). I flattened them using a hand plane much to Bill Bradshaw's amusement.

Joints were hand cut dovetails, the cheap pine caused a few more issues as no matter how sharp the chisel, it tended to tear rather than cut.

I found some nice fold flat handles for the drawers (in 304 stainless) These had to be recessed into the drawer fronts so I made a router template to machine the four cutouts. As the drawer pulls were stainless, I selected stainless hinges & lifting handles.

Slots for the drawer bases were cut with a plough plane then, once everything was glued together, I stained then sealed the surface and polished with beeswax.

I have another box with some large old wooden planes but most are now in one location (indoors).

As for the collecting.....

I'd still like a No 7 or No 8 plane plus I have a few planes that are surplus to requirements.
