

date. The Expo committee would like help from club members to deliver the flyers - around your local area on your morning walk will do the job nicely. Flyers are available at the clubroom.






We spent a few days round a small town called MacLean. Its main claim to fame is that there are in excess of 150 power poles each with a Scottish Clan tartan painted

NAIL GUN SAFETY ADVICE:

There are many types of portable hand-held nail guns. They are powered by either:

- electromagnetism
- compressed air-pneumatic
- highly flammable gases—such as butane or propane
- powder actuated—requiring an explosive charge.

Since their introduction, the compressed air/pneumatic type nail gun has become the most commonly used form of nail gun.

Use totally enclosed eye protection when operating a nail gun. Use a leather apron when operating a nail gun.

Operators are responsible for the safe operation of Nail Guns. Keep your finger off the trigger.

The Handyman Hints and Tips

Books and binders tend to take up a lot of space in an office and aren't always in an easy-to-reach spot. Solve that by creating a sliding bookend. To corral shelf-dwelling books or other media that like to wander, cut 3/4 inch thick hardwood pieces into 6 inch x 6 inch squares. Use a band saw or jigsaw to cut a slot along one edge (with the grain) that's a smidgen wider than the shelf thickness. Stop the notch 3/4 inch from the other edge. Finish the bookend and slide it on the shelf.


FROM THE MINISTRY OF MYRTH (Alias Michael Berry)
